Maurice brings plenty of big match experience to his refereeing. He refereed the All Ireland Senior Final between Kerry and Tyrone in 2008 and Donegal and Mayo in 2012.



Early in 2008 he took charge of the All-Ireland Club Senior Semi-Final between Nemo Rangers and Ballina Stephenites.

He walked into history in 2005 as the first Laois man to referee an All-Ireland Minor Final. That year he also controlled All-Ireland finals at Intermediate Club and Under 21 levels. In 2011, he took charge of the Ulster Senior Football Championship Final.

He won two Senior Football Championship medals with Stradbally.

Welcome to the 2016 Ulster Senior Football Championship fixture between Donegal and Fermanagh here in Pairc MacCumhaill, Ballybofey today. The record books show that Donegal have collected the USFC on 8 occasions and all since 1972. Seamus Bonnar (RIP) recording 6 goals and 4 points in 1974 is the highest goal scorer recorded, in any one season in the Ulster Senior Football Championship. Joe Winstone in 1972, Martin McHugh in 1989 and Manus Boyle in 1990 were the championships top scorers in those years.

Fermanagh have contested the final on four occasions, came close to their first title in 2008 after missing out on a replay. P.T. Tracey in 1966 and Rory Gallagher in 2000, 2001 and 2002 were the championship top scorers during those years. Both counties had solid league campaigns with Dún na nGall and Fear Manach both retaining their Division 1 and Division 2 status respectively.

The GAA is stronger as a family and that is why I am pleased to state that discussions continue to integrate all our codes into one community based GAA catering for all. In Ulster, we are proud that we have had this process in place since 2006 and we are a stronger association for it. Today we welcome the camogie teams from Aontroim and Doire to display their skills in the Ulster Senior Camogie Final, today they share equally the biggest stage that is the Ulster GAA Championship.

The half-time games continue to be a source of eagerness and joy for our stars of the future. We appreciate the input from the teachers and parents of the Cumann na mBunscol children as they display their skills at mid-point in the senior game. I acknowledge and thank all the Ulster Council and Dún na nGall GAA personnel involved in hosting today's games. Everyone plays their part; supporters and stewards, medics, match officials and players, sponsors, local authorities, media, County Boards and Provincial Council.

I also wish all four teams, their County Boards and management every success in their respective outings today. To our match officials I wish them an enjoyable day and one that they play a significant role in ensuring fair play within the rules of our game.

Finally, to you the supporters; your attendance here today makes these summer Sundays the special events they have become. Your support, attendance and attention is highly valued and we hope the experience of today will encourage you to join us again at some stage over the summer before the 2016 resting place of the Anglo Celt Cup is confirmed.



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Johnny Robinson (Pettigo GAA)

The heartbeat of every parish in Ireland is its GAA club, and within those clubs there are some people that just epitomise the selfless dedication without fanfare that Cummann Luthchleas Gael gets from its members. In Pettigo Johnny Robinson is such a man.

Born and bred in Pettigo, Johnny grew up playing Gaelic Games in an era in Pettigo where the local accents on the field were supplemented by the passing imports of An Garda Siochana and The Customs. While most clubs look to their past footballing henours, Pettigo's victory was keeping a club going with very few players in this small rural community.

As the GAA bug had bitten Johnny he decided at the end of his career to get involved in coaching underage players, to build the base of players around Pettigo. Married to Helen and being the parents of 5, Johnny had the start of a team inside his own door with the 3 boys and two girls

all playing. With funds low, transport was Johnny's car helped by a few more locals. On one such journey Johnny's car had four eager faces in the front beside him and the six defenders in the back. Thankfully the West of Ireland accents were all watching Mayo lose another final that day.

Game over, win lose or draw the jerseys made there way to Helens kitchen and onto the clothes line. As the old adage goes "behind every Great man is a Great woman".

They say to get a job done "give it to a busy man" and so it was, with Johnny at times, manager, coach, secretary, treasurer, grounds man and all this while working with Marine Harvest Fish Farms. Johnny introduced Marine Harvest to the word Sponsorship with the result that Marine Harvest have provided jerseys, footballs and gear regularly to Pettigo.

With immigration, recession and dwindling numbers Johnnys taxi had to bring the Pettigo kids - U13, 14's, 16's and minors the 20 odd miles to Pairc Naomh Brid to form Naomh Brid/Pettigo. Then in 2016, in true Johnny style he got Marine Harvest to sponsor a Naomh Brid / Pettigo jersey an amalgamation of clubs and now an amalgamation of club colours.

As Club Chairman Colin McFarlane says "Johnny's done everything, he even togged out a few years ago, and scored a goal, to help field the team." Lining the pitch, doing referee, umpire, water carrier, fundraiser, representing the club at County Board Meetings his huge frame, houses a huge heart, driven by his love of Club and County.


THE proud traditions of past and present-day success will be laid on the line during today's Ulster Camogie Final. It's a game which brings together two of the dominant forces in the province.

But while Derry are going for a fifth consecutive title, Antrim are aiming to reclaim past glories. Both teams will also be aiming to put difficult league campaigns behind them. The Saffrons barely got off the ground in the competition, although Derry at least can look to some good moments against top teams including Limerick, Waterford and Kilkenny. Derry defeated Armagh fairly comfortably in the Semi-Final with Antrim accounting for Down.

Derry manager, Ciaran Cunningham, has absolutely no doubts about their intentions entering this latest final.

"I'd be massively confident in the ability of our girls to produce a strong performance and record the win. You have to go into a final with the one aim of winning it," he said.

"To be honest, there's no point in winning a semi-final if you're not going to go out and produce



in the final and that's our aim. But the fact that we're going for a fifth title in a row does bring extra pressure and Antrim have some good club teams who are now the backbone of their side".

"The players have also been lining out with their clubs over the past few months to get that extra match practice. We're finding that it's very effective to see them putting the effort in at that level when it can be so difficult to get challenge matches down south. Our ultimate target has to be to reach an All-Ireland Senior Quarter Final."

Antrim captain, Una McNaughton, meanwhile, believes that their win over Down at the penultimate stage has significance. She is one of a large number of the Antrim panel who are hoping to win their first Ulster medal. The team is managed by Conor Campbell.


"We'd be happy enough with how our preparations have gone. The panel is fairly big, so there have been a couple of very competitive in-house matches," she said.


"The last time we played Derry was in the Ulster Semi-Final last year and they beat us fairly comfortably. They should benefit from the fact that they've been in Division One, but we're going into the game with a positive attitude.

"We have been trying to put things back on track over the past few months and the work put in by the players and management has been immense."

Both counties will enter their All-Ireland campaigns later this summer with the hope that an Ulster success provides them with the perfect platform.



LAOCHRA ULADH

DÚN NA NGALL SA BHLIAIN 1916



Chuaigh Éirí Amach na Cásca i bhfeidhm ar Dhún na nGall ins an dóigh céanna a raibh tionchar ag imeachtaí an tseachtain stairiúil sin i mí Aibreán 1916 ar an chuid eile den tír. Cé nár tharla morán ó thaobh troid sa chontae, bhí daoine as an chontae a raibh baint acu le cuid do na príomh imeachtaí agus daoine eile, cuid acu i measc na ceannairí a raibh dlúthchaidreamh agus leoga dlúth cheangailt acu le Dún na nGall.

The GAA in the County a century ago was practically non existent. Donegal was the only county in Ulster not affiliated to the Ulster GAA Council. In his report to Ulster Convention early in 1917 secretary Eoin O'Duffy reported that "Despite the best efforts of Derry, Donegal has not yet come under the jurisdiction of Ulster. It is the only county in Ireland not to have its own County Board. In fact at that time the County Derry GAA League contained five Donegal teams-Cahir O Buncrana, Killea Harps, Burt Hibernians and Newtowncunningham Harps. A Derry motion to the Ulster GAA Convention - "That pending the formation of a County Board in Donegal that the northern portion of that county be included in Derry for GAA purposes" was agreed.

Donegal was very far away from the action in Dublin during Easter Week. So much so that Wednesdays edition (26th April 1916) of the Derry Journal (main local paper) could only report that there were "rumours of disorder" in Dublin. By Friday, news was still not getting through and the paper complained that the lack of telegraphs was leading to "alarmist and exaggerated reports" of the disturbances in Dublin.

Mary Emily, a step sister of Patrick Pearse lived in Carrowkeel Glebe, Fanad. She was a qualified midwife and married to Alfred Ignatius McGloughlin. The 1911 census states that her daughter Margaret and son in law James McGarvey were living with her. This family connection undoubtedly resulted in Patrick being a frequent visitor to the county. The Derry Journal of January 1918 reports that Margaret (Patrick's mother) and one of her daughters visited Derry after spending a holiday in Donegal.

Pearse visited Donegal a number of times to promote the spread of the Irish language, on behalf of the Gaelic League. It was for this purpose he came to visit Coliste Uladh in Gortahork where he gave a lecture and toured the Donegal Gaeltacht where meetings were held to increase recruitment of the Irish Volunteers.

Roger Casement also visited Donegal on numerous occasions where he learned Irish and visited many areas including Fanad, Portsalon, Tory Island, Cloughaneely and Glenties. Casement attended Coliste Uladh and donated £100 for the building of the college hall.

The landing of arms by The Asgard in Howth in 1914 is regarded as one of the pivotal roles in the Easter Week Rising of 1916.

Amongst the crew of six were two Donegal men from Gola Island. Paidí Dhónaill Mac Fhionnghaile (1890-1970) and his friend Séarlas Ó Dúgain (1878-1958) who like Mac Fhionnghaile was a fisherman, sailor and native Irish speaker.

Among those at the GPO with Pearse was Joseph Sweeney from Burtonport (1897-1980). Sweeney was then a 19 year old student at UCD. He had been a pupil of Pearse's in St Enda's and still lived there in 1916 acting as a courier and explosive maker. He was one of James Connolly's stretcher bearers following the surrender. He was interned in Frongoch after the Rising.

Others from Donegal who took part in the Easter Rising in Dublin were brothers Connor and Eunan McGinley sons of Cu Uradh (Peter Toner McGinley) cousins of Dr. J.P. McGinley Letterkenny. Donnchadha McNelis (1887-1954) of Glencolmkille an expert toolmaker was one of the first to join the Irish Volunteers at their inception in Cork.

One of the first people to die on Easter Monday was Charles McGee from Innishbofin Island who was a constable in the R.I.C. stationed in Castlebellingham Co Louth.

FEAR MANACH SA BHLIAIN 1916





Sa leabhar a scríobh Peadar Livingstone "An Scéal Fhear Manach" (The Fermanagh Story) luaitear dáréag as Fear Manach a throid san Éirí Amach 1916. Ina measc bhí tríúr Protastúnach, (Scott, Wilson agus Irvine), tríúr as Doire Ó gConaile, Mag Uidhir, Ó Dufaigh, agus Ó Miacháin chomh maith le Seán Seosamh Ó Scollain, Eoghan Ó hUaine, Pilib Ó Casaide, agus tríúr as Lios na Scéitheach níl a fhios again cad is ainm dóibh.

In the book written by Peadar Livingstone, "The Fermanagh Story", 12 people from Fermanagh are mentioned who fought in the 1916 Rising. Among them there were 3 Protestants, (Scott, Wilson, & Irvine), 3 from Derrygonnelly (McGuire, Duffy & Meehan) as well as John Joseph Scollan, Owen Greene & Philip Cassidy and three men from Lisnaskea and we don't know their names as so far they haven't been revealed in records.

San alt a scríobh Máirtín Ó Catháin "Mícheál Ó Coileáin agus Alban", cuireann Máirtín Ó Catháin síos ar Thomás Mac Domhnaill as an Iompú Deiseal mar dhuine a bhunaigh Sinn Féin in Albain. De réir Ó Catháin, bhí Mac Domhnaill i mBaile Átha Cliath i rith Éirí Amach na Cásca ach níor ghlac sé páirt ann.

In the article Máirtín Ó Cathain wrote about "Michael Collins and Scotland" he described Thomas McDonnell from Tempo as someone who founded Sinn Féin in Scotland. According to Ó Catháin though, McDonnell was in Dublin during the Rising but didn't take part in it.

Bhí na mná as Fear Manach chun tosaigh san Éirí Amach freisin agus thug Cáit Níc gCinn tacaíocht dá beirt mhac, Romuald agus Conway, agus bhí Cissí Nig Uidhir, deirfiúr PJ, i gCumann na mBan. De réir dealraimh, chaith Eilís Ní Scolláin tamall i bpriosún de bharr imeachtaí Poblachtanaigh.



De réir scéalta, bhí Ó Donnabháin Rossa i bhFear Manach

ag deireadh an Naoú Aois déag chun an IRB a eagrú. Tháinig sé ón Bhoth i gCo Mhuineacháin go dtí Ros Liath agus Lios na Scéithe. Agus ba é ag torradh Ó Donnabháin Rossa a ghlaoigh Pádraig mac Piarais na daoine chun dul chuig Réabhlóid agus ba é seo mar phríomhchúis le Éirí Amach na Cásca 1916.

According to stories, O'Donovan Rossa came to Fermanagh at the end of the 19th Century to organise the IRB. He came from Scotstown in Monaghan to Roslea and Lisnaskea. It was at the funeral of O'Donovan Rossa that Pádraig Mac Piarais called people to rebellion / revolution and this was the main cause of the 1916 Easter Rising.

THE last time Fermanagh travelled to Ballybofey for an Ulster Senior Football Championship game, Rory Gallagher was a central figure.

The year was 2001, May 13 to be precise, and Mac Cumhaill Park played host to a Preliminary Round clash between the counties. The previous season, the Ernemen had knocked their more illustrious neighbours out of the provincial race at the Quarter Final stage, with Gallagher scoring 1-6 as his native county won by four points, 1-13 to 0-12, at Brewster Park.

Some 11 months later, Gallagher was at it again, knocking over six points as his side forged ahead of their hosts, before a late surge from the Tir Chonaill men forced a draw. Six days later, back in the Erne County for the replay,


Gallagher, at the peak of his scoring powers, fired 0-7 as his team won by a single point, 1-9 to 0-11, to reach the last four in Ulster.

Fast-forward a decade-and-a-half, and Gallagher is in the other camp, tasked with masterminding Donegal's effort against Pete McGrath's Fermanagh this afternoon. He was the scourge of the Tir Chonaill men at the turn of the century, and all conventional wisdom suggests he will once more be on the winning side this time around.

This is an intriguing clash between a seasoned, muchdecorated unit in Donegal and a promising team on the up in Fermanagh. Yet the bookies see it as a one-horse race, with Donegal as short as 1/4 to progress to a provincial semi-final, with their neighbours available at 4/1. So will it be as easy as that for Gallagher and his warriors?

Well, no, it won't be easy. The Ernemen are definitely on the rise, and in many ways they can play today's game without any pressure. While all the pre-National League talk was of a tilt at promotion, consolidation in Division Two was probably the main aim, and that goal was achieved – albeit by the very narrowest of margins – thanks to draws with Galway and Tyrone on their last two outings.

The latter result, in particular, shows that McGrath's men can mix it with the so-called big boys of the game, and while the Red Hands had already secured promotion to the top flight, it will have filled the Ernemen with confidence

That belief, which grew immeasurably during the march to the All-Ireland quarter-finals last term, was again in evidence in the way they swatted aside Antrim in the Preliminary Round on May 15.

A fixture that in previous years could've proved a banana skin was negotiated with the minimum of fuss as McGrath's men won 1-12 to 0-9 while easing down. The very fact they had that outing less than a month ago should mean Fermanagh run out for today's clash with an advantage in terms of match fitness.

By contrast, Donegal have not seen competitive action since their heavy defeat to Dublin in the Division One Semi Final at the start of April. The manner of that 1-20 to 0-13 defeat will not have rested easy with Tir Chonaill followers either, with some pundits suggesting it was further evidence that this team were slipping down the wrong side of the hill.

But you write any team that contains the experience and pedigree of Neil McGee, Michael Murphy, Frank McGlynn, Neil Gallagher and Colm McFadden off at your peril. Rory Gallagher and his backroom team knew going into that Dublin game that it was a full nine weeks until they would be the last team into Ulster SFC action.

Donegal weren't at their peak in terms of match readiness, but that will not be the case this afternoon, and after that lay-off their players will be itching to get going. While the defeat to Dublin left a bad taste in the mouth that will only be got rid of with a win over Fermanagh, the League



campaign was still a qualified success at least.

Not only did Donegal underline their status as one of the top teams in the country by finishing in the top four, but they also managed to blood a number of young players to boost a panel that has been around the block on more than one occasion.

It should not be forgotten that they played in an All-Ireland Final as recently as 2014, and while last season, Gallagher's first at the helm, did not go quite to plan, they still reached an Ulster Final for the fifth year on the bounce.

On the same day as they lost to Kerry in the 2014 Final, the minors also lost out to the Kingdom, and a number of players from that team were filtered into the senior set-up over the spring. Ciaran Gillespie, Eoghan Gallagher, Caolan McGonagle and Michael Gallagher all saw decent gametime during the League and there was enough to suggest they can play a role during the summer.

Add their promise to the experienced core that already exists, and it is not hard to see why Donegal still see themselves as one of the realistic contenders

for Ulster and All-Ireland glory. Of course, Fermanagh also have serious talent in their ranks, with charismatic forward Sean Quigley and Tomas Corrigan, perhaps the best scoring forward the county has produced since the current Donegal manager, capable of troubling any defence.

In addtion, captain Eoin Donnelly would find a place in most midfields in the country, and his performance in that sector will have a big bearing on his side's fortunes. That said, it is hard to get away from the fact Donegal are big favourites for a reason.

They might have a good few miles on the clock, but the likes of Murphy, Patrick McBrearty and the McHugh brothers are still young men with a number of years at the top still ahead of them and they will be keen to wrest back the Anglo-Celt Cup, having lost it to Monaghan last July.

Rory Gallagher tended to emerge on the right side of the scoreline when these sides met around the turn of the century. He should do so once more this afternoon.



Managhan's massive margin of watery was reflected in complete dominance across all legislats. Monaghan's statistics were comfortably superior to any other performance in the 2016 USFC. In contrast, Down delivered the poorest deformance so far. Monaghan were the first team to gain more than 50 possessions in a match 51, while Down struggled to less 40.

undoubtedly, possession share based largely to the kick out contest and Monaghan's ability to pressurise Down, winning 44% (16) of Down's 36 kicks and winning 84% (16) of their own 19

Managhan scored from 47% of their possessions, while Down managed to score from just 23%. Managhan returned 5.5 points per 10 possessions, an USFC mgn. while Down struggled to 2.3.

MUINEACHÁN

Monaghan will have few complaints and while it is difficult to identify areas for development ahead of their semi-final clash with today's victors they will be well aware that a sterner test awaits.

Monaghan ticked all the boxes, won the possession battle (51 v 40), controlled their kick outs (84%), challenged Down's kick outs (44%), and were extremely efficient in front of goal, scoring from 65% of shots taken, and returning 5.5 points per 10 possessions.

Monaghan won 11 Down kick outs through break ball. While Monaghan's dominance of contested kicks was obvious, it is crucial they are able to close down short kick options – something which will be more difficult against Donegal or Fermanagh. They also conceded 7 frees in the scoring zone – something other teams will punish.

AN DÚN

In the early stages of the match Down enjoyed parity with Monaghan, due to maintaining control of their own kick outs. A visible strategy shift from Monaghan after 20 minutes applied greater pressure to Down kick outs, and Down offered no obvious counter strategy.

Ahead of their qualifier clash with Longford, Down will need to address their kick out options and execution.

Another problem facing Down is the volume of frees conceded in the scoring zone (10). Assuming a conversion rate of 60-70%, this is costing Down 6-7 points per game.


More discipline in their tackling, especially in their defensive third is crucial to limiting the attacking return of their opponents.



Championship football is a pressure cooker environment and good championship players and teams are able to function, keep their heads and keep their decision making clear, sustain their levels of energy, and deal with the pressure and mental demands that championship football places on all players.

That's how you define a good championship team and a really good championship player. Championship football is meant to be the ultimate test for players and teams. It tests them physically, technically in terms of their skills and it will test their character and this is something we've talked about a lot with this team.

When the pressure's on and there's a lot at stake, and at key moments in a game when it can be swinging one way or the other it comes down to how players react individually and how a team reacts collectively. Those are the factors that decide winners and losers and today will be no different.

I honestly think that the past six months, going from McKenna Cup football to now where we have seven games in a Division Two League and a Championship match against Antrim I'd like to think those eight games have brought about improvement, evolution, development and a situation where you can see the team going from one rung on the ladder up to the next rung.

This game against Donegal is another milestone along that road and it'll tell us a lot about where we are, but I think the team, in terms of what has happened this last six months in the League and Championship, is in a much better place than it was.



LEGEND MOLLOY GETS FREEDOM OF DONEGAL

1992 All-Ireland winning captain Anthony Molloy was finally awarded the Freedom of Donegal in Lifford last week.

The Freedom of Donegal is the highest honour that the Council can give to an individual. Anthony Molloy becomes the first ever GAA star to receive the accolade. Previous sporting stars to have also been bestowed the award include former Republic of Ireland soccer stars Packie Bonner and Shay Given.

His former Tir Chonaill boss Brian McEniff said that Molloy was a "most worthy recipient". It is 24 years now since the Bundoran man bossed Donegal to their first ever All-Ireland success.

McEniff remembers a hungry dressing room packed with characters and natural leaders. But it was Molloy who he decided would skipper them to glory.

"When I heard the news I was absolutely delighted," McEniff said. "When an honour like this comes along it's very special. Ardara is a good strong club and it was that they had such a great turnout from there.

"I remember Anthony, as a minor, playing down in the old Sandfield. Even then he had a bad knee. But he had such determination and such drive. He was a real leader. He just had those qualities you look for. He put himself on the line and he was so strong and physical".

"He wasn't dirty, he was just such a powerful man. He had some ferocious battles with the likes of (Brian) McGilligan of Derry and big Stephen King from Cavan. He was a great captain and he is a great fella. I still have a very close friendship with him."

McEniff reveals that if Molloy had taken the professional advice of his orthopedic surgeon at the time, he might well have missed out on hoisting Sam Maguire aloft on the steps of the old Hogan Stand.



McEniff explained: "Not many people know this but in 1991 the surgeon we first sent him to told him not to continue playing – to give it up. God forgive me but we sought another opinion and found a way to manage it".



From a footballing odyssey that began with an Under 14 Championship win with his club back in 1976, a fantastic career spectacularly culminated in the 'Big Guy' leading Donegal to All-Ireland glory, for the first time ever, 16 seasons later.

Molloy truly has had an outstanding career. His Roll of Honour with his county includes: one All-Ireland U21 medal (82), three Ulster SFC (83, 90, 92), one Ulster U21 SFC (82), an All Star award (92) and Donegal Player of the Year (88, 90).

He also claimed two ESB All-Ireland Championships and two New York SFC titles with Donegal New York in 1986 and 1992.

Anthony will be the seventh recipient of a badge and pin specially commissioned by the Council. The badge (and lapel pin) is reserved exclusively for those on whom the Freedom of the County is conferred.



What is the GAA Healthy Club Project (HCP)?

The Healthy Club Project is a new way of looking at health in the context of the GAA. It features a unique partnership between the GAA and the HSE. To help it achieve in its ambition to make Ireland a healthier, happier, more connected place, it is kindly supported by Irish Life through a Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) investment for three years (2015-2017).

What is the aim of the HCP?

The Healthy Club project aims to help GAA clubs explore how they support the holistic health of their members and the communities they serve. GAA clubs already contribute to the health and wellbeing of their members by providing opportunities to develop their physical, social, emotional, and psychological health.

The HCP aims to help GAA clubs identify what they are already doing well, identify areas where they can or would like to improve, and empower them to ensure that everyone who engages with their club benefits from the experience in a health-enhancing way, be they players, officers, coaches, parents, supporters, or members of their local community.

The healthy club model, which is based on best national and international practice, also aims to embed a healthy philosophy in a club while integrating health into the day-to-day club activities in a sustainable way. It also aims to place the local GAA club at the heart of the community, making it
