

GROUND REGULATIONS

- 01. All persons entering this ground are admitted only subject to the following Ground Regulations and to the Rules and regulations of Cumann Luthchcleas Gael. Entry to the ground shall be deemed to constitute unqualified acceptance of all these Rules and Regulations.
- 02. Fireworks, smoke canisters, gas- horns, bottles, glasses, cans, flags, banners, poles and other similar articles or containers, including anything which could or might be used as a weapon, are not permitted within the ground and any person in found to be in possession of such an article or container may be refused entry or ejected from the ground
- 03. The consumption of alcohol is not permitted within the ground and spectators are not permitted to bring alcohol into the ground.
- 04. The unauthorized climbing of any structure, walls or buildings in this ground strictly forbidden.
- 05 Unnecessary noise from the use of radio sets, gas-horns and behavior likely to cause confusion or nuisance of any kind, including foul or abusive language, is not permitted in any part of the ground.
- 06. Under no circumstances is it permitted to throw any object the pitch.

- Unauthorised persons are not permitted to enter upon the field of play.
- 08. Any person who fails to comply with the instruction from a Garda or Steward may be ejected from the ground.
- In general, the right of admission is reserved to the Ground Management.
- The Ground Management reserves the right to refuse admission to or eject any person who refuses to be searched by a member of the Garda Siochana.
- 11 Any person who remains in or obstructs a gangway or circulation area may be ejected from the ground.
- 12. The Ground Management reserve the right for it's servants or agents to remove from the ground any person who does not comply with the Ground Regulations or whose presence in the ground could reasonably be construed as constituting a source of danger, nuisance or annoyance to other spectators.
- 13. All persons in the grounds are reminded of their obligation under Section 18(3) of the Fire Services Act 1981 to ensure that their behaviour does not present a danger from fire to anyone using the grounds.

Rory reflects

DONEGAL manager Rory Gallagher admits that he still harbours regrets from last year's Ulster Final which Donegal lost to Tyrone.

Gallagher's side had the better of the first half, and looked well positioned to go on and collect the Anglo Celt Cup.

However, they were pegged back, and late scores from Sean Cavanagh, Peter Harte, and Kieran McGeary saw Tyrone get their hands on the silverware.

"Listen, every tight game you lose there are regrets, absolutely," said Gallagher.

"We as a group, over the last two years, we'd be very disappointed to have lost two Ulster finals.

"We'd be very disappointed going back to 2016, we were in a very strong position. Having not started the game that well, to go 0-7 to 0-4 up at half-time and get the first score of the second-half, we were very disappointed we didn't push on."

Both counties have changed personnel in recent times, but they have clashed frequently at underage level, and a fierce rivalry is developing.

It's often said that the teams play a similar style of football, and can cancel each other out, but Gallagher didn't agree with that assessment.

"Look, there are a lot of similar types of footballers in both sides. There is a lot of pace in both outfits. We still feel there are big differences.

"We've our own identity. We're not sure how it'll work out on the night. It could be a shoot out or it could be a drab affair. We'll have to wait and see.

"I think we've a few lighter players than them. They've that wee bit more experience too. If you look at our inside players, they'd be a good bit different than theirs. They play their sweeper from Colm Cavanagh, that would be a good bit different from the template we have."

It has been well documented that Donegal are now in transition, but the season has started brightly for Gallagher and his side.

They have five points from three games, and the young players he has blooded, have all settled in well to senior football.

"We're very pleased. We think the signs in training are very good. We see them competing.

"We see the likes of Jamie Brennan being marked by Paddy McGrath. We see Caolan Ward making Paddy McBrearty; we can see those lads competing at that level. You can see the effort and commitment that is there.

"They've adjusted to the level required for county football. Some of them have been there a while. Some aren't long in the door. That's pleasing.

"But they have to do it consistently and they've got to do it when things aren't going their way. That's the road that is in front of them."

Tyrone come to Ballybofey today as Division 1 league leaders, and they will be looking to get one over on Donegal.

The sides could meet in the Ulster Championship semi-final if they both win their respective last eight encounters, and Gallagher believes that both counties will be trying to lay down a marker.


"I think both sides will go into it like that. They'll know there could be a potential clash down the line. We played each other in the league in 2015, in 2013, we know what's ahead.

"But at the minute... people talk about holding back for championship but I can't see ourselves, Tyrone or any side we play thinking like that.

"Two points are the most important thing along with getting the momentum that comes with another win."

"Home"

WHEN JIM MCGUINNESS took over as the Donegal manager, he set about addressing the county's home form as one of his first priorities.

Derry, Antrim and Down had left Ballybofey with Championship victories in the previous three years and Sean MacCumhaill's old magic had waned.

That 1-15 to 2-10 loss against Down, after extra time, in May 2010, was Donegal's last defeat in Ballybofey in either League or Championship football.

Since Down left Sean MacCumhaill Park that evening, seven years ago now, Donegal have gone unbeaten in 16 League and Championship matches at the venue.

A 2013 Dr McKenna Cup defeat to Monaghan did blot the copybook, but the personnel included on that afternoon – with Donegal fielding an under-21 team – mean it can be scratched from the record.

McGuinness's stated preference was for Donegal to play in Ballybofey as much as they could and Rory Gallagher recently outlined similar views.

"We very much enjoy the connection with the supporters and the way they get behind you in Ballybofey," Gallagher said. "It's a big help to us. That might be a small thing, but to the players who love playing football and love playing for Donegal, getting to Ballybofey is something special.

"There is no point hiding the fact that myself and the players prefer playing games in Ballybofey.

"We are one of the very few counties who play home games at three different venues, but we do prefer Ballybofey. It's the pitch, the surroundings, everything really – and it's where the big Championship games are played.

"A great starting point for any team is home form. You always get a bigger crowd following you for home games so it's nice to keep up the bargain at our end by producing something they can be proud of."

Donegal have developed Ballybofey into something of a fortress and with Tyrone in town tonight, protecting that unbeaten record was important for Donegal when they drew here with Dublin a couple of weeks ago.

"We enjoy playing in MacCumhaill Park – it's our number one pitch," Frank McGlynn noted.

"When you come here, it has a different feeling about it. Players looking forward to playing here and we're proud of the record we have in Ballybofey."

Given that his men are preparing for a home game, against Antrim, this summer in the Ulster Championship, Gallagher would like to maximise their use of the Ballybofey venue.

However, the Donegal manager ackowledges the practice of O'Donnell Park and Fr Tierney Park, which will welcome Monaghan next week, being allowed to stage games.

In the first League game in the McGuinness era, a late Neil McGee goal secured a draw against Sligo that appeared unlikely for long periods. Just where that narrative would've gone otherwise is anyone's guess, but it certainly was an important moment in the tale.

There were others, too, like the win over Armagh in 2012 that was a winner-takes-all relegation battle and, of course, the Championship wins over Antrim, Derry and Tyrone twice have added muscle to Ballybofey's biceps.

Gallagher has good memories of Ballybofey from his own playing days. It was here where he lobbed Tony Blake in June 2000 as Fermanagh scored a 1-12 to 0-13 win that was their first Championship win over Donegal since 1936.

In those days, teams feared coming to Ballybofey and the growing record suggests that those days are here again.

It is unlikely to happen, but there is an argument to be made, surely, for all of Donegal's senior games to be played in Ballybofey.

After all, it is the 'home' of Donegal GAA.



The great recent Donegal-Tyrone rivalry

The great recent rivalry between Donegal and Tyrone has seen Donegal in the ascendancy until last year's Ulster Championship final when Sean Cavanagh and Peter Harte struck late to deny Donegal a fourth Ulster title in six years.

Donegal were on a great run against the Red Hands and were appearing in a record sixth Ulster final in-a-row. It just seemed that the counties were doomed to meet nearly every year.

2017 is no different. They have already met in the Dr. McKenna Cup, albeit Donegal were fielding their U-21 side (and a weakened U-21 team at that) when going down heavily to Tyrone in Healy Park, Omagh in January.

Tonight's meeting may not be the last time they will cross swords this year. They are on course to meet again in the Ulster Championship at the semi-final stage, although you won't get either side talking about that game until they get the quarter-final obstacles out of the way first. Donegal are at home to Antrim in that first encounter while Tyrone travel to Celtic Park to take on Derry.

If Donegal and Tyrone are successful in their opening games, then Clones on Sunday, 18th June at 2 p.m. will be another date with destiny.

The rivalry will continue!

But for those Donegal and Tyrone supporters of a certain age, thoughts will go back to the early 1970s when the rivalry was just as sharp (and bitter). Donegal defeated Tyrone in the Ulster final of 1972 on a dank day in Clones to get their hands on the Anglo Celt Cup for the very first time.

But it is the clash between the sides in the first round the following year in MacCumhaill Park, Ballybofey, that was much talked about. Football was tough back then and sometimes brutal. Gaoth Dobhair's Neilly Gallagher was the victim of an off-the-ball attack which left him in Letterkenny hospital and Tyrone dethroned the Ulster champions and went on take home the Anglo Celt.

A year later they were drawn against each other again in the first round and

such was the bitterness between the sides that Donegal togged out in Ballybofey, took the bus to Omagh, defeated Tyrone and got on the bus back to Ballybofey again. Donegal would go on to take their second Ulster title in three years.

After that three year battle, Donegal and Tyrone didn't have too many meetings in the championship, which was probably a good thing. There was a meeting in 1980 when Tyrone proved too strong in Irvinestown and in 1989 when Stephen Conway rescued a draw in the Ulster final and the Red Hands went on to win the replay.

The Peter Canavan powered Tyrone were also too good in an Ulster semi-final in 1994 as the post-All-Ireland winning Donegal side were coming to the end of their reign. Tyrone's star began to rise in the new millennium and they finally got their hands on Sam Maguire, but Donegal were not really in the picture.

The clashes were intermittent. Until the recent past when Jim McGuinness took over the reins in 2010. It then seemed that Donegal and Tyrone (McGuinness and Harte) were on the same pathway.

Tonight Donegal have a new-look team who will be getting their first big test against the Red Hands. It seems they have become the benchmark for each other.




Donegal Team 1972



Martin maintains the long line of MacCumhaills men to play for the county

When it comes to local knowledge, none of the 30-plus players who will see action in tonight's clash will know MacCumhaill Park better than Donegal's Martin O'Reilly.

Martin grew up kicking a ball around the hallowed sod of Donegal's number one ground from as soon as he could put one foot In front of the other.

Only last Sunday, he kicked six points here a fairly regular occurrence - for MacCumhaills in a club league game against Termon. The only MacCumhaills man in the current Donegal squad, he continues a long line of players from the club that have worn the green and gold with distinction over the last five decades.

In the 1960's, a golden era for MacCumhaills, the McFeely brothers, Brondan and Frankie, were first choice. Brondan played in defence and mostly manned the left corner of the last line. although he was equally at home at left halfback. Frankie, the younger of the two, played all of his football in the middle of the field and was recognised in the era of the great Mick O'Connell, one of the best midfielders in the game at the time.

The Laverty brothers, Harry and Bernard, also played championship football in the green and gold in the 1960s too. Bernard played at half-back and Harry in the half and the full-forward line. John Dan McMenamin and Tommy McMenamin were other MacCumhaills men who wore the Donegal shirt in the '60s.

Andy Curran, from Castlefinn, whose Donegal career straddled the '60s and the '70s, was a MacCumhaills player all through his Donegal playing days.

Michael Lafferty, Martin Griffin and Brendan Dunleavy, all MacCumhaills players, straddled the '70s and the '80s. Lafferty played at

midfield and centre half back and was captain of the 1983 Donegal Ulster Championship winning team. Griffin, who also featured at midfield but was better known as a soaring full-back, and Dunleavy, a half-back, were also on that '83 Ulster winning team. Michael Lafferty is also an Ulster Championship winner from '74.

Former county chairman PJ McGowan, also a MacCumhaills club member, is an Ulster medal winner from '74. He saw action in the Ulster Final when introduced from the bench. Frankie McFeely and Andy Curran were members of the 1972 Donegal winning Ulster Championship team - the county's first.

Along with Martin O'Reilly, they are members of MacCumhaills' exclusive club of Ulster Championship medal winners. Martin won his Celtic Cross in 2014.Tom Prendergast, a double All-Ireland winner with Kerry, also wore the white and green of MacCumhaills and also played one championship season with Donegal - 1964.

Prendergast, also a four time Munster Championship winner with the Kingdom, won one of his three National League medals with Cork. The much travelled Prendergast also played with Wicklow.

But in the second quarter Donegal took charge. Ryan McHugh was almost in for goal, but had to settle for a point before Michael Murphy converted a 46m free.

Even corner-back Paddy McGrath got in on the scoring, getting his second ever point for Donegal. Hugh McFadden also hit a long range effort before Ciaran Thompson brought the curtain down on the first half scoring with a magnificent effort with the outside of his left.
