Great to be back in the Hyde, but collecting league points is all that matters

It may only be the second weekend of the Allianz Football Leagues, but today's match between Roscommon and Donegal has a defining look about it. While the losers will claim that there's still plenty to play for, the reality, and competitiveness, of Division One suggests that the relegation trapdoor awaits.

A week ago, Donegal managed to gain some respectability with a flurry of late scores against Kerry, only falling short by three points in the end. Had the Kingdom taken their foot off the gas in the knowledge that the game was in the bag or did Donegal belatedly discover their scoring touch?

A young Roscommon team paraded spirit and resilience against Tyrone in Omagh. Yet Mickey Harte's men never looked in danger of losing the match, despite the visitors' second-half recovery. Still, there was still plenty to admire about Roscommon taking the game to Mickey Harte's charges after the break when all looked lost at half time.

Consequently both teams have a point to prove. The aim will be to put their best foot forward and build on the positives from last week. On paper, Roscommon seemed to have gained more from their trip north but Donegal still managed 1-17 against one of the best teams in the country.

Despite Donegal being in a period of transition, they still retain a core group of experienced players that will give Roscommon plenty to think about. Roscommon don't have a player of Michael Murphy's calibre. If Paddy McBrearty has one of those days when everything he touches turns to gold, it's hard to see Rory Gallagher's men being beaten.

For one reason or another, Roscommon's experience levels have been decimated in the space of 12 months. Kevin McStay has a young team at his disposal. It's not necessarily a new team but these players will need time as they strive to reach their potential. Perhaps, it's that fearlessness of youth that makes Roscommon dangerous opposition for Donegal today. That's the carrot that the home side's support will be clinging to.

Then there's the Hyde Park factor. Roscommon finally has a home again, something Kevin McStav feels will make a huge difference to the team's preparations as the season progresses. Being back on your home pitch playing Division One football and welcoming big teams like Donegal in front of a partisan home crowd — if that doesn't inspire these Roscommon players, nothing will.

A fast pitch should suit Roscommon's style of play. They can't afford to take possession into contact because the team lacks physicality in certain areas to retain the ball. Move the ball quickly into the scoring zone where there are forwards who know a thing or two about kicking

As much as today is about Roscommon welcoming top flight league football back to the Hyde without having to worry about Mother Nature, the management and players will need to detach themselves from the giddy excitement that will engulf the stadium. Two league points are the only currency in town. The problem is that Doneaal will be singing from the same hymn sheet.

It should make for quite a spectacle.

Roscommon clinch semi-final

spot with hard fought win over Donegal



Roscommon qualified for the national league semi-finals for the third successive year with a four-point win over Donegal in ahard fought Division 1A match played in poor conditions at Hyde Park last Sunday. Roscommon did not play particularly well but the match showcased another dimension of John Tobin's maturing team. Rather than swash the buckle they refused to buckle when Donegal pilled on pressure in a tense second half. In driving rain on a heavy pitch against a physically stronger team Roscommon were resolute and defiant. One trend which has maintained was the Blue and Gold's new acquired and happy habit of getting a goal when it's needed. Stephen Lohan's freak 44th minute score didn't compare with vintage strikes in previous league games, yet his mis-hit 35 metre free which rolled through the legs of Donegal's John Gildea into the net was probably the decisive score of the game.

This was a victory for determination and graft rather than the champagne football of recent weeks, although the team produced a bout of their trade mark intelligent, direct style for 20 minutes in the first half. The conditions and an over fussy referee stymied flowing play but the match still provided entertainment, drama and the inevitable frayed nerves for an enthusiastic crowd of 8,500 fans. Referee Michael Monahan adhered to the letter of the law when he could have kept more to the spirit of the rules and taken account of the wet conditions. This was not a dirty game yet two players were sent off and seven others were booked.

Nigel Dineen was the key figure in Roscommon's win. Dineen has been on fire throughout the league and was once again a magnetic target man last Sunday. Most impressively he raised his performance level when it was clear the rest of the forward line wasn't functioning with the fluency of recent matches.

It turned out to be an especially good day for Roscommon Sponsor Sean Mulryan.




Due to a mix-up in Jerseys Donegal wore the home team's change strip which meant double exposure for Ballymore Properties on live television. One onlooker claimed it was Roscommon A v B but for the first 20 minutes the "second team" were out classed.

Although Adrian Sweeney gave Donegal the lead in the first minute Roscommon quickly took command. Dineen slotted over a free after nine minutes and one minute later Roscommon gained a lead they never lost. Paul Noone won a breaking ball at midfield and found John Hanly who transferred to Dineen. The Castlerea forward sent in a lob which was cleverly flicked just inside the left post to the net by Gary Cox.

That goal was the impetus for incessant Roscommon pressure. After 10 minutes Dineen thumped over a point after a move involving Francie Grehan, Martin Raftery, John Tiernan and Cox. Another slick move out of defence in the 16th minute led to Stephen Lohan setting up Seamus O Neill for a point. Lohan converted two close range frees in quick succession before the centre forward powered up field to set up a point for Cox who had enough room for Michael Schumacher and Juan Pablo Montoya to get through together.

It looked like the game would be over at half time but Donegal who were totally off the pace at that stage, got a life line in the 30th minute. Sweeney caught cleanly behind John Whyte and was tumbled by David Casey. The burly full forward hammered the resulting penalty to the net.

Cox shot wide after a deft flick from Dineen before Michael Hegarty and Dineen exchanged points. Kevin Raftery kicked over a good point for Donegal and Lohan rounded off the first half scoring two minutes into injury time with a tremendous free after O Neill had been brought down. Roscommon were full value for their 1-8 to 1-3 lead at half time. Donegal were a transformed team after the interval and reeled off four points within five minutes of the resumption from Hegarty, Sweeney and dynamic under 21 player Colm Mc Fadden who scored twice. Roscommon's earlier assurance deserted them and Lohan and Dineen both missed scoring chances. The trend looked set to continue after 44 minutes when Lohan didn't connect properly



with a 35 metre free from his hands. However the ball skidded through Gildea's legs and rolled over the line. Seconds before the goal Fergal O Donnell came on to revive a labouring midfield and the Lionheart had a major steadying influence on the team.

Donegal almost hit back within two minutes of Lohan's goal but Thompson made a super save from a point blank shot by Seamus Friel. Sweeney rattled over a point yet Donegal suffered another body blow in the 48th minute when centre back Barry Monaghan brought down Jonathan Dunning and was dismissed for a second bookable offence. Dineen converted the resulting free and Lohan increased Roscommon's lead to

five points with a good score from play after approach work by Dunning and Noone.

Yet Donegal hung on tenaciously and should have been right back in the game in the 52nd minute as Paul Mc Gonigle put Mc Fadden clear on goal only for the corner forward to blast the chance over the bar. Sub Brian McLaughlin narrowed the gap to three points one minute later and a speculative shot from Mc fadden bounced across the square with nobody able to apply the final touch.

Roscommon responded with a good free from a free by Lohan who intercepted the short kick out which followed that score and passed to O Donnell who set up Dunning for a point. Sweeney replied with two points from frees and Roscommon then had Fearghall Carroll sent off after the substitute full back was booked twice in a minute.

Noone drove a point chance wide but appropriately it was Dineen who sealed victory with a splendid left footed point after a swift move involving Denis Gavin, Grehan and Hanly. Roscommon almost rounded off a satisfactory outing with a goal when Dineen's sublime tap down set Jarlath Egan Free. Egan could have gone for goal himself but instead passed to Dunning whose shot was saved superbly by Tony Blake. Roscommon could afford late wides from Dineen and Hanly before the finish as victory and a semi-final place were in the bag.

Derek Thompson made a marvellous save and his kick outs, long and short, were better than they've been in some time. The full back line had a torrid time even though Donegal were without International rules star Brendan Devanney who was on soccer duty with Finn Harps. In Devanney's absence Adrian Sweeney reprised his performance of last year in Ballybofey and was a constant menace. The half back line was the launching pad of most of Roscommon's attacks, particularly in the first half. Martin Raftery showed an encouraging return to last year's form. Francie Grehan was the link man in numerous attacks and Paul Noone was authoritative and athletic.

After a good start midfield struggled until O Donnell came on but it is a timely reminder that Seamus O Neill and David Casey are both under 21 and the schedule of four games 15 days was bound to take a toll on them. The luckless Gildea was the dominant figure in the centre. Apart from Dineen, Gary Cox and Stephen Lohan was the most effective Roscommon forwards.

The home team got a further boost after the final whistle when it was discovered that Cork had beaten Tyrone to ensure Tobin's side had finished top of the ultra-competitive Division 1 A, which was a tremendous achievement in itself. It also means that instead of another meeting with Mayo, Roscommon will face a novel and attractive semi-final against Cavan on Sunday week.





Managers Message

It has been a long time coming but today, finally, the surface of Dr. Hyde Park is fit to host Division 1 football. You will recall that last year we played 22 inter-county games (4 x FBD, 8 x NFL, 6 x Championship and 4 x Challenge) and played only two of them (v Mayo NFL and v Sligo in Connacht Championship) at home in Dr. Hyde Park. In the majority of cases we had to pass up the advantage of playing our home aames here, reaching the unacceptable situation of being denied home advantage for the replay of the Connacht Final as we had to travel to Castlebar because we had no home ground. That situation was unacceptable to all involved in Roscommon GAA and thankfully, it is now resolved and behind us.

I want to sincerely thank all the clubs who generously gave us the use of their grounds for matches and training in 2016 and into 2017 - we literally changed venues every week. In particular, I want to thank St. Brigids, St. Aidans, Clann na nGael and Athleague and Roscommon Gaels for the extended use of their facilities during the spring and summer months of last season. The FBD provincial league has served us reasonably well and we enjoy playing in it. By the end of January we were in a position to select our 2017 panel of 30 players. However, I would like to make two observations about the provincial league: (1) in my opinion, Connacht GAA needs to shake up the group stages urgently as playing against the same opponents each year does not add to the league and (2) Connacht GAA needs to examine the ability of some of the college teams to play at this level.

Last Sunday we played Tyrone and playing away in Omagh against an experienced. well-conditioned and well-drilled outfit like Tyrone is always challenging. But once we came to terms with the tempo of the game I felt we gave as good as we got. However, unless we build today on the positive aspects of that 2nd half effort, the trip to Tyrone will be viewed as being of little or no benefit to the progress of this group. I am confident we will give of our very best against Donegal today.



It will take time and patience to further develop this squad but I take the responsibility of managing Roscommon senior footballers very seriously indeed. Those challenges continue to stack up - we are off to Mayo in a fortnight and face Kerry the following week at home. The players very much enjoy the pressures of playing in this division and indeed require those pressures. Not all the experiences gained will be enjoyable but we will all be the better for them after another season of life in the 'Big Boys' School'.

Sincere thanks to Roscommon GAA officers who work tirelessly on behalf of all of us. And a big thank you to our sponsors and Club Rossie for their continued support and encouragement. Thank you to each and every Roscommon supporter attending today. Know that we take great pride in this squad of young players and that we continue to encourage them to play the game in a manner that will allow you identify with them - with honesty of effort, desire, skill, absence of ego and sportsmanship.

Today is one of the good news days for the GAA in the county of Roscommon and our fervent hope is that over the next few hours our team will represent you well. And that, at the end of proceedings, we will have secured our first points of the 2017 NFL.



Tales of Western Showdowns by Darragh Kelly

There's a hackneyed old saying in sport that certain games are 'six pointers' or in the case of today's game 'four pointers'. I think I've some idea of what that means - it's the extreme swing of fortunes that's associated from the outcome of games like today's encounter

For either side to win today victory would mark an important step, only one step mind you, of preserving Division One status for next season; for the losers, a setback will result in a further loss of momentum and a strugale to remain in top flight league action for next year.

So for both teams, after respective losses last weekend, the stakes are understandably high. It has always been thus in encounters between both Donegal and Roscommon, in what has always been a keenly felt rivalry.

Donegal travel today to avenge last year's loss in Letterkenny, a performance that for quality was one of Roscommon's best last year. In a match where fortunes see-sawed, the visitors success caused the GAA world to sit up and take notice. Alas, it was a fleeting fascination as events began to conspire against the primrose and blue later in the

My first recollection of a Donegal and Roscommon rivalry was on a blustery day in Pairc Sean MacDiarmuda in Carrick-on-Shannon with the 1982 All-Ireland U-21 title at stake. It was a historic day for Donegal winning their first-ever All-Ireland crown of which footage still exists on YouTube.

That day, it would not be an exaggeration to say the whole of Donegal was present! And like Munster's famous victory over the All-Blacks in that famous rugby match in Thomond Park in 1978, I'm sure the number of Donegal people at that game has considerably swelled as the years have gone by!

For Roscommon, captained that day by Gary Wynne, that loss reflected the despair of the county's footballing fortunes after the exploits of that peerless team which captured four Connacht titles on the trot

from 1977 and who, in the words of the late Mick Dunne of RTE and the Irish Press, were 'the finest team he ever saw never to win an All-Ireland.

For Donegal, their victory was the springboard to Ulster Final success the following year as Brian McEniff's side came up an agonising point short (1-12 to 1-11) in the last four against Galway on what was a sweltering day.

That semi-final in Croke Park was also the day when Eamon Coughlan triumphed in the 5,000 metres of the World Athletics championships in Helsinki and that wonderful commentary by Tony O'Donoghue as Coughlan overtook the Russian on the last bend of that final lap.

Few need reminding Donegal's U-21 success was bookended by Sam Maauire triumphs in 1992 and 2012. Three things stand out for me from that original victory of '92 - the pride of flame haired Declan Bonner after kicking what was the insurance score in the Final, Anthony Molloy, who featured on the U-21 team of 1982, lifting Sam Maguire and the pride of Donegal's 'first lady', singer Bridie Gallagher being interviewed the following morning by Gay Byrne on RTE Radio One.

On recent occasions when Donegal and Roscommon met, the odds have favoured the visitors, save for last year. Back in 2003, Roscommon in their final game, faced Donegal, already relegated, in Ballybofey. The odds favoured the visitors, but in a cruel twist of fate, Roscommon succumbed late, losing 2-10 to 1-10. To rub further salt in the wound, Roscommon joined Donegal in Division Two for the following season, despite winning three of their seven games that season.

That result, in its own small way, is proof, if anv were needed, of Donegal's pride and fortitude. Working in that region for many years, I always found Donegal people to be fiercely proud, straight talking but always fair - what you see is what you get. It's the very same with their footballers - determined. brave and resilient.

So while today's game will conjure up memories of past games, including Donegal's comfortable 3-11 to 1-9 victory in the side's first and to date, only championship meeting in Ballybofey in 2008, today is a new era, not just for both teams after disappointments of recent years, but also a new era for the newly resurfaced Dr. Hyde Park.

For me, there are many memories, of great League battles, particularly in the early 1980's with the likes of Kerry and Dublin, but the one I best recall was victory over Mayo in the semi-final of 1981 before Galway got the better of us in that year's decider, marking the effective break-up of the illustrious fourin-row team, who dramatically lost to Sligo in the championship later that year.

There are other League memories, but two, not concerning Roscommon, stand out in particular; as a young fella, watching the majestic Matt Connor in action for that great Offaly team in the Hyde in the early 1980's if ever there was an artist in Gaelic Football,

then for me, it was surely him.

My other League memory is that of a victory for Leitrim in a Division Three League playoff, against Offaly, in March 1990. Led by Cavan man P.J. Carroll, the victory marked Leitrim's breakthrough on the national stage, culminating in their unforgettable Connacht title of 1994. It's time for more memories and where better than for Roscommon and Donegal to begin today!



National Pitch Maintenance Work Group

Our Ard-Stiúrthóir Mr Paraic Duffy wrote about the need to develop a more scientific approach to pitch maintenance in his report to Congress in 2016. He noted that the growth in the number of county training centres and the increasing number of clubs that are developing additional pitches emphasised the importance of properly protecting and sustaining these important assets. Then in March, Ard Chomhairle approved the establishment of a National Pitch Maintenance Workgroup under the chairmanship of Kieran McGann (Corcaigh), and with the active support of Damian McLaverty, General Manager of the Golf Course Superintendents Association of Ireland: -



The Mark

The new 'mark' rule came into effect at all levels of Gaelic Football from January 1st this year. When a player catches the ball cleanly from a Kick-Out without it touching the ground, on or past the 45m line nearest the Kick-Out point, he shall be awarded a 'Mark' by the Referee.

The player awarded a 'Mark' shall have the options of (a) Taking a free kick or (b) Playing on immediately.

The following procedures shall apply:

(a) Free Kick

The player shall signify to the Referee if he is availing of the free kick and then take the free kick himself from the hand from the point where he was awarded the 'Mark'.

Once the player indicates he is taking the 'Mark', the Referee shall allow up to five seconds for the player to take the kick. If the player delays longer than five seconds, the Referee shall cancel the 'Mark' and throw in the ball between a player from each side.

Once the player indicates he is taking the 'Mark', the opposing players must retreat 10m to allow the player space to take the kick. If an opposing player deliberately blocks or attempts to block the kick within 10m, or if an opposing player impedes the player while he is taking the kick, the Referee shall penalise the opposing team by bringing the ball forward 13m.

If the Referee determines that the player who makes the 'Mark' has been injured in the process and is unable to take the kick, the Referee shall direct the Player's nearest team mate to take the kick but he may not score directly from the kick.

(b) Play on immediately (i) In this circumstance the player may not be challenged for the ball until he carries the ball up to a maximum of four consecutive steps or holds the ball for no longer than the time needed to take four steps and/or makes one act of kicking, handpassing, bouncing or toetapping the ball.

(ii) If the Player is illegally challenged, a free kick shall be awarded to his team from the point at which the challenge is made, and this free kick may be taken by any player on his team.

Central Council have interpreted the rule to

1. The referee shall award "the mark" by blowing the whistle.

2. "On or past the 45m line" shall mean that both feet of the catcher are on or past the 45m line when he catches the ball or on landing.

3. In order to signify that he wishes to take a free-kick, the player who catches the ball and has been awarded a "mark" by the referee should stop playing. If he does not obviously stop then it should be taken that he is "playing 4. "Challenged" as mentioned in the rule is taken as "tackle" as defined; once the player plays on he may be tackled after four steps or once he plays the ball in any way.


5. All players must be at least 13 metres from

where "the mark" is awarded.

6. When a player who is awarded a "mark" is injured, any team mate may take the free kick, which must be taken from the hands. The player in question may not score directly from the kick. (Current rule states that only the "nearest team mate" may take the free kick).


7. In order to be awarded a "Mark", the ball must not have been touched in flight by another

player.

A Roscommon Volunteer

Volunteers are the life and soul of every GAA Club. The GAA is unrivalled in terms of the number of volunteers that provide endless hours of service to the Association's many GAA Clubs.

Throughout the world, GAA volunteers undertake the administration of clubs, coaching of teams, washing of jerseys, the lining of playing pitches, the transportation of players to and from games, the organisation of fundraising initiatives in addition to performing a host of other specialised tasks. Without volunteers, clubs and the GAA cannot function.

In recognition of this Roscommon GAA will introduce through our match programmes some of the many wonderful volunteers who work so hard to ensure that the association and our activities are carried out effectively. Today we meet up with Hyde

Park Announcer Gerry Kehoe.

How long are you involved in the GAA? I'm involved all my life really. As a player since I was 9 or 10. I played the whole way through under 12, 14, 16 minor a bit of junior. Then I got involved in the administration end of the club. I was PRO for many years I was club secretary for 3 years. I was asked to join the Hyde Park Committee as a young 20 year old around 1984 by the late Dr Keenan who was chairman of the Hyde committee at the time. He wanted young blood so he inveigled us to join. All young enthusiastic fellas. So we did. It didn't entail a lot just preparing the place for big matches, giving a dia out.

So, Gerry when did you start as the Stadium Announcer in Hyde Park? Approximately 1995 I think I started.

And what do you do? Well basically do the public address in Hyde Park for National League and club games. I don't do it for the championship games because Connacht Council have their own person for those games.

And how did you end up doing it? was asked. The previous individual was unable to turn up one particular day for a



National League match and I was asked to do it. I said I would of course I was a bit nervous at the time. I sort of knew what the job entailed as I'd be up there at the time anyway in the Press box, helping out there. My biggest fear at the time was to make sure the unit stayed on and did not die half way through.

Has it ever died on you? It has, a couple of times. It was an old system we had I used to have it at home in my own house, you'd unscrew it, this was in the old stand before the new stand was built. You'd bring it up the steps at the side of the stand and set it up screw it to the wall and use it. Then a wire might come loose. Indeed it happened a couple of times but we managed to get it sorted.

Did you get any training to be a match announcer? No not really well I did about two years ago but I had been doing it for 20 years before that. It was on a Saturday and it was for Stadium Announcers and there were Stadium Announcers from all over the country there from all the provincial grounds. There were various speakers at it including the man in charge

of entertainment in Croke Park and also Eileen Dunne the Newsreader and daughter of the late Mick Dunne. She gave us tips on how to prepare yourself when speaking into a microphone or when speaking to a large volume of people. One tip she gave us was that she'd advise people never to eat chocolate before they start speaking. It makes your mouth dry up.

Any funny thing happen to you?

There did once when the National Anthem broke down on me. The CD started to skip and I had to improvise. So, I started singing it. Now having said that I ran behind the wall so nobody would see me as I sang the Anthem. I just acted on instinct and sang it

You've been involved in The Hyde for 33 years what's the biggest change

vou've seen?

The development of the Hyde. In the original Hyde we had these grass banks. I can remember raking the grass off the banks along with a load more volunteers. Getting ready for Connacht Finals getting the grass cut and raked. Now since the Hyde is developed all those jobs are gone. There's not much voluntary Meithal type work that needs to be done. There's lots of voluntary work needed but it's different. We'd be a fortnight getting ready for a Connacht Final or any Championship game.

What's the biggest crowd you saw in the Hyde?

The biggest crowd had to be in 2001 the

Connacht Final. Is that because everyone tells you they were there, like the GPO in Easter

week?

No I was there myself, the capacity was actually reduced because the current stand was not even in use. The PA was in the score board that particular year and all the media were in a trailer at the side of the stand. There were big crowds, Back in the day in the 90's there might be 24,000 with the grass banks but now with the Eastern Terrace sur the capacity is way more. The capacity was up to 32,000 there was certainly that there that year. And it was a lovely day too, that helped.

Who was the best player you saw in the Hvde?

I'm fortunate enough to have seen the areat team of the 70's the best player I ever saw was Harry Keegan, he was a terrific tenacious corner back he had the physique of a strong individual. I know the forwards get all the glory because of the scores they get but I thought Harry Keegan was tremendous and I suppose the best non-Roscommon player l'ever saw playing in the Hyde would have been Jack O Shea of Kerry. He would have played in the under 21 final against us in 1978 he really came to prominence when he was with the Kerry Senior Team. He was the best player I've

Finally, as we finish up is there any funny story you have from the Hyde. You told us about the Anthem but is there anything else you could tell us?

remember we were playing Dublin in the National League I think it was around 99 or 2000. Nigel Dineen would have been playing we'd have had a good team, Frankie Dolan, Mike Ryan that team that won in 2001. I remember at half time there was a gathering of Dubs behind the town goal. These two came onto the field at half time to have a penalty shootout They were dressed in Viking hats, things were quiet, Roscommon were a point or two up at half time. I can remember poor old Frank Dennehy RIP trying to sprint from the player's gate down at the hospital end to march these fellas off the field. I decided to do a running commentary. Frank just put his hands up in the air and decided to walk away sort of saying ara what harm are they doing. One guy scored a penalty and I said that guy should get a jersey for the second half with the Dublin seniors. Seamus Duke told me that it appeared in the Evening Herald on the Monday where they said the best Dublin performance was at half time and the two boys taking the penalties. We won that game by I think 4 or 5 points.

When you hear "there will be at least two minutes' additional time at the end of this half" you'll know it's a volunteer like Gerry Kehoe who's making the announcement. Thank you, Gerry, for keeping us informed.

Dr Hyde Park the story

Even though much work remains to be done in the stadium in general, we are entering a new era for the famous Roscommon town venue this afternoon. For 45 years Dr Hyde Park ground has seen so much drama and excitement, heartbreak and joy, winners and losers, great games and not so great games, but lifelong memories, and it has given much pleasure to the hundreds of thousands of people who have attended the games and played there since it opened its gates in 1971. The old pitch had come to the end of its natural life and what we see today heralds a new dawn for Roscommon GAA.

For many decades Roscommon's main GAA pitch was St Coman's Park in Roscommon town. All the major GAA games like Connacht finals and big championship and league games were played at St Coman's Park. But before every big game the locals had to borrow 1500 wooden railway sleepers from CIE to accommodate patrons who wanted to sit on 'the sideline' and in the stand. These huge sleepers had to be unloaded and put in place before the games, and taken away again afterwards. That backbreaking work, plus the fact that St Coman's Park was liable to flooding during the winter, meant that it was time to look around for an alternative venue in Roscommon Town.

"Raftery's Field" (where we are today) on the Athlone Road was an obvious choice. It was always associated with the GAA. Although it was not an official GAA pitch, a number of club games were played there over the years. Then in 1962 the GAA purchased the 14 acre field and the contract was signed by the late Dr Donal



Keenan (former GAA President) and Barry Molloy. The purchase price was 3,000 pounds. The late Paddy Walsh and the late John Joe Fahey were both also instrumental in the purchase of the field at the time and were involved in the negotiations. A local committee which also included my late father, set about preparing the grounds for use as the headquarters of Roscommon

It took a number of years before work on the field started as the legal end of the purchase took a while to be resolved, but local GAA people worked hard to get the pitch in place and it opened on the 20th June 1971. The main game of the day was the Connacht SFC game between Roscommon and Sligo, but the honour of the first game ever to be played in Dr Hyde Park fell to Michael Glavey's and Roscommon Gaels who met in the U-14 final, which was the curtain raiser. In fact the first player ever to score in an official game at Dr Hyde Park was Greg McCrann of Roscommon Gaels (who went on to play minor and U-21 for Roscommon) in that U-14 decider!

The Hyde Park Committee ran the affairs of the county grounds for many years after that. It was made up of local GAA people who looked after the maintenance and funding of the grounds. In 1992 funding was

secured to develop the terracing on three sides of the ground and that was opened in 1993, and at that stage the capacity was over 32,000. Further developments were carried out with the provision of dressing rooms at the cemetery end of the grounds. Then in 2000 it was agreed to build a new spectator stand which holds 3,750 people and that was opened in 2003.

A dispute about the ownership of the grounds between Roscommon County board and the local club Roscommon Gaels, which has been well documented elsewhere, was settled in 2010 and in 2013 the county board officially took over the ownership of the grounds. New Health and Safety regulations saw the grounds' capacity reduced to 18,500 but following remedial work over the past number of years, that was raised again to 25,000 and that's where it stands today.

With the increased rainfall that we have seen during our winters in recent years, it was becoming more and more obvious that a major job needed to be done on the playing pitch at Dr Hyde Park before anything else was done. More and more yames were being called off due to flooding

and unsuitable around conditions. Thankfully the lunding was secured (in the ragion of 700,000 Euro) by the county board to provide a new playing pitch, and the GAA President Aoghain O Fearrail turned the sod last July. A vote of congratulations to the contractor and everyone else involved for getting the project to where it is today is well deserved.

Hyde Park's caretaker Peter Murray will now oversee the maintenance of this superb new Prunty pitch and if there are as many

thrills and spills in the next 45 years as we have seen in the last 45 then we will all be happy. As I said above, much more work needs to be done with the facilities at the stadium itself, but the most important thing is being looked after first (the pitch), and I am certain that the other work needed will be done in the years to come as money becomes available.

Of course in any major ground it is the players, the matches and the memories that matter most. The last 45 years have seen much drama, heartbreak, tears, joy and exhilaration in all grades be it club, county, colleges levels, ladies and men's football and hurling. Everyone who has played or indeed attended Dr Hyde Park over the years will have their own special memories. There are too many to mention but the 2001 Connacht final, the 1980, 1990 finals, and the 1991 replay stand out in terms of the Roscommon senior team. The 1978 All Ireland U-21 win against Kerry was also a day that many of us will never forget. But there have been so many memorable days for clubs, colleges, and underage teams too. Indeed our Donegal visitors today will fondly remember that

they beat Kerry in the All Ireland U-21 final here at Dr Hyde Park in a replay in 1987 with Manus Boyle scoring an incredible 1-7 that day.

This new pitch will mean that countless more memories will be created in Dr Hyde Park, and the fact that it is a state of the art facility means it will attract many neutral games as well as those involving Roscommon. The commitment of the GAA to this refurbishment project is very welcome indeed and we thank them publicly today. Those of us who have been associated with Dr Hyde Park since

the very start are really looking forward to the opening of this new pitch today and a positive new era for Roscommon GAA. Many great people who contributed to the purchase and development of Dr Hyde Park since it opened have gone to their eternal reward and most of them are laid to rest just beyond the wall at the Cemetery end of the ground. I think they would all be very happy that we have come to this day and are smiling down on us. Let's hope for a great game today and maybe even a Roscommon win to get that new era underway!!



The Roscommon **Donegal Links**

I am sure it is possible to forge a link between any two counties in the country, tenuous though some of them may be. However, there is nothing tenuous about the links between Roscommon and Donegal. It goes back to the 1950's when Paddy English, regarded by many as one of Roscommon's greatest ever Iull backs, lined out for Donegal and Ulster after he took up his duty as a garda in that county. Paddy, a Knockcroghery native, was full back on the Roscommon team that won the Connacht championship in 1952 and '53. He was right full back on the Connacht leam that played Leinster in the Railway Cup semi-final in 1953. Seán Purcell was Iull back and Mayo's Seán Flanagan was loll full back on that team. He was full back on the Connacht team that beat Munster in the semi-final in Tralee in 1954. The late Aidan Brady was the goalkeeper and Mayo's Willie Casey, who died recently, was right full back with Seán Flanagan in the left corner. Lainster beat Connacht by 1-7 to 1-5 in the linul on St. Patrick's Day. Paddy English was at right full back and Paddy Prenderaast was full back. That was his last appearance on a Connacht team before moving to Donegal as a young garda. He wasn't long in Donegal when his talents were noticed and he was a regular on Donegal teams for a number of

Another Roscommon footballer who wore the Donegal jersey was the St. Michael's Lubman Ray Sheerin. Ray was a substitute of the Roscommon team that won the All-Ireland U-21 title in 1966. He went to live III Donegal at the end of the 1960's and joined the St. Joseph's Club, a combination of Ballyshannon and Bundoran. He won senior championship medals with the club in 1970, '73, 74,'75 and '76. The club won the Ulster club championship in 1975 but lost the All-Ireland semi-final to Roscommon Gaels, 1-7 to 0-3. Ray played at full back for the club and at left corner back was Liam McDaid from Bundoran. Liam later became Fr. Liam McDaid and was appointed Bishop of Clogher in July 2010 but had to retire at the end of last year on the grounds of ill health. Ray played full back for Donegal for

a number of years in the 1970's. He now lives in Tullaghan, Co. Leitrim, which is just across the county boundary from Bundoran. Des Newton is another Roscommon player who wore the green and gold jersey of Donegal. Des won an All-Ireland Ú-21 medal with Roscommon in 1978. He was a member of the Donegal team that won the 1983 Ulster title. He transferred back to Roscommon in time to win Connacht senior championship medals with his native county in 1990 and '91. He has the distinction of winning All-Ireland medals 24 years apart. He was player manager of the Donegal team that won the Masters (over 40's) All-Ireland in 2002.

A team mate of Des Newton's on that Donegal team in 2002 was John 'Jigger' O'Connor who now lives in Buncrana, Co. Donegal. In the final the Strokestown man scored an outrageous point that reminded G.A.A. followers of his hey day when he thrilled G.A.A. followers with his exquisite skills. John's son, Darrach, is a member of the Donegal panel for today's game. He came on as a substitute against Kerry last Sunday and scored two points from play. The apple doesn't fall far from the tree as the saying goes.

Another Donegal link with Roscommon is Anthony Thompson who was left half back on the Donegal team that won the All-Ireland title in 2012. Anthony's brother Ciarán is on the Donegal team today. Their father Anthony is a native of Tulsk. Anthony senior was an accomplished footballer with Tulsk Lord Edward's before moving to live in Doneaal.

The Donegal team doctor Dr. Kevin Moran is a native of Four Roads. His brother P.J. designed the stand in Hyde Park. P.J. is well known in G.A.A. circles in Roscommon and he was an outstanding hurler and handballer. So Roscommon has probably more links with Donegal than with any other county in the country. As we welcome the Donegal team, supporters and management to Hyde Park today we know that it will be a case of some of them returning to their roots.

Ground Regulations

All persons entering Pairc Naomh Bhrid are admitted only subject to the following Rules (which are designated to protect the health and safety of all entrants to the ground). Entry to the ground shall be deemed to constitute unqualified acceptance of all of these Rules.

The management reserves the right of admission.

The instructions of the stewards must be obeyed at all times.

All persons entering the ground agree to be searched by a member of the Garda Siochána.

Every person (including infants) entering the ground must have a ticket.

The following are not permitted:

Entry upon the pitch or engaging in conduct that causes or is likely to cause injury or harm to, or otherwise interferes with, disrupts, hinders or distracts a person playing in, refereeing or otherwise having a role in a match at this ground.

Any unauthorised contact with the boundary wall surrounding the pitch or incursion on to the pitch. Any such unauthorised contact or incursion constitutes a trespass to property.

The climbing of pylons, stands or other buildings. Such behaviour constitutes a trespass to

6.4 Throwing any object onto the pitch.

Remaining or loitering in any gangway or aisle.

Behaving in an offensive or indecent manner.

Bringing of alcohol into the ground.

6.8 Bringing into the ground of fireworks, smoke canisters, bottles, glasses, cans, flags, banners, poles, distress signals, laser pointers and other similar articles or containers, including anything which could or might be used as a weapon.

Excessive noise such as that from the use of radio sets or other appliances and behaviour likely

to cause confusion or nuisance of any kind including foul or abusive language.

Smoking unless in designated areas.

If a person commits a trespass, reasonable force may be used to prevent, restrain or terminate any

Where a person is in breach of any of these rules, or where the management believes that a person constitutes a source of danger to others, or to the ground, such person may be refused entry to or ejected from the ground, and reasonable force may be used for that purpose.
