



Ulster GAA has developed a GAA FOR ALL coaching resource to support coaches, parents, teachers and volunteers. We hope to enable them to establish sessions that are inclusive, stimulating and fun for children and adults with a disability who would like to play Gaelic games. The coaching cards show various games and activities that will help the participants to improve their

Fundamentals, hurling and football skills while assisting them to play through use of modified games. It also gives guidelines and information to help establish a safe and effective environment. Ulster GAA would like to thank Disability Sport Northern Ireland for their contribution to this booklet.

ELECTRIC IRELAND ULSTER MINOR FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

EVERYONE will remember the heart-warming celebrations when the Antrim minors edged red hot favourites Donegal in their Ulster Championship quarter-final on May 21. Most neutrals, if they were honest, would admit that they want to see a repeat dose in their semifinal clash against a formidable looking Derry outfit today.

The Saffrons are gunning for their first Ulster Championship Final appearance since 2006, and you have to go all the way back to 1999 to find the last time they came out on the winner's podium. Derry haven't been so starved of trophy success at minor level, winning outright in Ulster in the first year of Damian McErlaine's tenure in 2015.

But while they are gunning for their third Ulster Final appearance on the trot, losing last year's decider to Donegal, they have a new-look side this year. Yet while only five of last year's

starters remain eligible, they are some of Derry's top performers. Oisin McWilliams was a Goliath in midfield in their opening day win over Tyrone, Conor McCluskey shackled Red Hand danger men PT Cunningham and Darragh Canavan, while their captain Padraig McGrogan is another survivor from last year. McErlain can also call upon a clean bill of health as wing-back Odhran Quinn has recovered from a broken hand.

And ominously for Antrim, they aren't shorn of options either. Lorcan McWilliams – twin brother of Oisin – Fergal Mortimer and Mark McGrogan all made positive impacts when sprung from the bench in Derry's 0-18 to 1-14 comeback win over Tyrone, overhauling a three-point deficit at half-time.

A lot of the Antrim and Derry players will be familiar with each other given the crossover at schools' level. Key Saffron players like Tiarnan McAteer and Liam Quinn, for example, helped St Mary's, Magherafelt claim their first-ever MacRory title back in March. They qualified for today's semi-final with a memorable win over Donegal. They didn't make it easy for themselves, shipping a calamitous goal in the first-half and another three-pointer in extra time, but this is an Antrim side without an inferiority complex and they eventually ran out 0-21 to 2-14 victors.

Creggan sharpshooter McAteer kicked four points from play, Ruairi Brolly (son of Joe) iced two crucial extra-time points, while Liam Quinn also starred in attack, landing three points from play and four from the dead ball.




Derry's Mark McGrogan celebrates a late score in Derry's Quarter Final victory over Tyrone.

These two sides have previous. They met in a hotly contested encounter in the Minor League which Derry edged by 0-10 to 1-6. Oakleafers chief McErlain has been at pains to point out the apparent insignificance of that clash due to the rapid development that goes hand-in-hand with minor teams.

Indeed, Derry came up short in the Minor League Final against Tyrone before exacting revenge in the Ulster Championship. The Oak Leafers showed admirable composure in reeling in the Red Hands and will be determined to string together a 60-minute performance against the Saffrons.

The last time Antrim failed to pick up a win in the Ulster Championship was in 2013. For three years on the trot they overcame Fermanagh in the provincial series, and their surprise win over Donegal is another indication of their progress at this level. However, Derry will have plenty to say about whether they make the significant breakthrough of reaching an Ulster Final – 'neutrals' be warned.

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










OVER THE PAST DECADE CHAMPIONSHIPS

The last ten years has seen all nine Ulster counties reach the last four of the Ulster Senior Football Championship. In fact, only Cavan have failed to reach a provincial senior decider in that period.

2016 was unique in that both semi finals required a replay while 2014 is the only other year that a semi final has required a second day out. Today Donegal appear in an Ulster Semi Final for the seventh consecutive year, while today's opponents Tyrone lead the way with four provincial titles in the last decade.. In an interesting twist, the 2017 line up is a repeat of the 2012 pairings.

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ULSTER SCHOOLS

COLÁISTE CHOLMCILLE, BALLYSHANNON







The Danske Bank Markey Cup Final was an all-Donegal affair this year with Coláiste Cholmcille Ballyshannon overcoming Coláiste na Carraige in a fiercely contested game. It was a fantastic victory for the south west Donegal school who made their mark on the new Ulster Schools' stage.

Winning the Markey Cup was the culmination of the hard work done in promoting Gaelic games in the school, led by Principal Jimmy Keogh, (himself a Hogan Cup winner with Ard Scoil Ris in Dublin), and all the staff in CCBS.

After emerging from a tough all-Donegal group including St Catherine's Killybegs, Rosses Community School, Abbey Vocational and St Columba's Glenties, the Ballyshannon lads progressed to an Ulster quarter-final meeting with Rathmore Belfast. In a tight game throughout, Coláiste Cholmcille were particularly thankful to goalkeeper Sean Taylor who made a number of impressive saves to keep the Belfast men at bay. At the other end, Dean Carroll and Oisin Rooney kicked seven points between them and 1-1 from corner forward Dulan Gallagher all contributed to a 1-13 to 1-08 victory.

That brought them to a semi-final encounter with St Joseph's Donaghmore on a wet and windy afternoon in Garvaghey. A strong first half performance saw the Donegal side edge ahead 0-10 to 0-06 at the break with that trio of Carroll, Gallagher and Rooney all to the fore once again. A goal from Matthew McClay shortly after the restart gave Ballyshannon control but

this game was far from over. Donaghmore recuperated and a trio of points brought them back to within touching distance before they levelled the game when James McCann punished a defensive error. That score rocked Ballyshannon back to life and they finished the game the stronger, with Michael McKenna rounding off a 1-16 to 1-12 win.

That brought about the all-Donegal decider after neighbours Coláiste na Carraige defeated St Patrick's Keady in the other semi-final. And despite losing Matthew McClay in the third minute and then Dylan Gallagher after 18 minutes, both to black cards, Coláiste Cholmchille Ballyshannon went on to win their first Markey Cup title at Irvinestown. Gallagher's replacement Seamus Keogh, the Irish U15 soccer captain, rose to the occasion, scoring a point soon after he entered the game, carrying the ball well against the breeze during the second half and setting up both the goals in the last few minutes to kill off Carrick's challenge.



Semi Final Donegal v Tyrone

When it comes to rivalries in Ulster football, Donegal versus Tyrone might not be the hottest. Certainly, there is more feeling on the terraces when Tyrone take on Derry or Armagh, or when the Orchard county face neighbours Down. Yet, over the last few years, no simmering rivalry has been more pertinent in Ulster than that between the Red Hands and the Tir Chonaill county.

And the fact that Donegal have invariably had the upper hand in recent seasons has only made things more relevant. At the outset of this year's Ulster Senior Football Championship, common wisdom had it that only three teams could feasibly emerge with their hands on the Anglo-Celt Cup.



And the provincial race could really start to come to the boil this afternoon when two of those super-powers' clash for the sixth time in seven seasons at Championship level. The first of those clashes, in the semi-final in 2011, saw Jim McGuinness's hungry Donegal outfit unseat the reigning Ulster champions on their way to taking that mantle themselves.

That superiority over their neighbours was sustained over three close matches before Mickey Harte's men finally wrested back control, and the

provincial crown, in Clones on July 17 last term. As was the case in all of the clashes of the counties in the interim, the decider 11 months ago was as tight as a drum for the most part, yet for long periods it looked as if Rory Gallagher's Donegal would come out on top once again.

Leading by four points early in the second half and with Mattie Donnelly black-carded, heartbreak and the back door beckoned for the Red Hands, but when the chips were down their big men stepped up to the plate. They don't come much bigger or better than Sean Cavanagh, who turned in a barnstorming second half, highlighted by a massive point to draw his side level as the clock ticked towards 70 minutes.

Then another 'Mr Reliable' in Peter Harte put forward his own entry for score of the Championship before Kieran McGeary added an insurance point to end six barren years without an Ulster title. Yet the motivation that served Tyrone well last year, that sense of gaining revenge after the previous narrow defeats to Donegal, could serve today's opponents well this time round.



Galagher's panel might have changed in make-up somewhat from last season, with a number of the old guard that delivered the All-Ireland in 2012 and those four wins on the bounce over the Red Hands having hung up their intercounty boots. But enough of last year's vanquished team remain to have them really fired up for this afternoon's game, while there is no doubting the quality still at Gallagher's disposal.

en like Frank McGlynn, Neil
cGee, Paddy McGrath, Patrick
cBrearty and the peerless
Michael Murphy have been down
this road countless times before,
while Ryan and Eoin McHugh are
young men with a decent bank
of experience to call on. Donegal
can approach this game with
confidence, safe in the knowledge
they have time and again worked
out a way to get past Tyrone.
Yet, the Red Hands won't carry
any fear into Clones either.

They have an Ulster title to defend, and they are in no mood to relinquish it, having fought so hard to end the drought in 2016. Tyrone didn't have to fight too hard to get their defence off to a winning start against Derry at the end of last month, running out 11-point winners, with 11 different players getting their name on the scoresheet.

And with a perceived weakness in terms of the lack of a reliable scoring forward, the Red Hand following will have been heartened to see so many men raising white flags, while the brill ant Championship debut turned in by Conall McCann in midfield gave more cause for optimism.

That said, nobody did more on the scoring front than Sean Cavanagh, who split the posts seven times, and his enduring class and fitness is imperative if his county are to prevail today and make their presence felt as



the provincial tussles give way to battle on the national stage.

Not that either side will have to run up a huge score to progress to the final, back at St Tiernach's Park on July 16 against either Down or Monaghan. Battles between these two familiar foes tend not to be high-scoring, but rather turn into tactical, technical affairs. For all the excitement of the closing stages last year, it can't be forgotten that the game was far from a classic, although the deep-lying defences employed by both teams meant that the standard of the scores themselves was very high, with a number of long-distance efforts from both sides finding the target.

Which brings us to Michael
Murphy, who will relish the
opportunity to shoot for goal
from out the field. The Tir Chonaill
skipper, like Cavanagh, remains his
county's talisman, the go-to player
when things get tight.
They didn't ever get particularly
tight in Donegal's Ulster opener
against Antrim, with the home side

winning 3-19 to 1-9 in Ballybofey, but Murphy was still the guiding light from his station around midfield.

His class is undimmed and will prove crucial given the smattering of youth being given its head by Gallagher this season. Those young guns showed no fear in the National League, a campaign that included a 0-12 to 0-6 victory over the Red Hands, and it could be that an injection of new blood is exactly what was required after the disappointing end to the 2016 campaign.







Become Super #SportsParents!

It is widely acknowledged that Parents play a pivotal role in encouraging and supporting their child's participation, success and fun when playing sport. To raise awareness of the important role parents play in our clubs, Ulster GAA are encouraging all our constituent units to join us in supporting Parents in Sport, through our Save our Smiles Campaign which focuses on the positive role that parents play in helping young people reach their full potential.

Children and young people take greater enjoyment from participating in sports if their parents are positively involved. They are also more likely to continue playing the sport for longer and have more opportunities to reach their sporting potential. However, certain types of involvement and behaviours from parents and carers can be challenging, and take away from a child's experience and enjoyment.

Some parents commit a lot of time, money and emotional support to their children's participation in sport, sometimes in an emotionally charged environment they may get carried away, for example on the sidelines of a game. This can lead to parents displaying intimidating, aggressive, threatening or abusive behaviour towards their own or other children, coaches, officials or other parents or spectators. These behaviours can have a negative impact on their children, their teammates and opponents, other parents, coaches, and officials. It can lead to children and young people experiencing higher levels of pre-competitive anxiety and lowered self-esteem and confidence.

GAA Parents are key stakeholders in all Clubs, the contribution they can make to our games and activities is invaluable, particularly at underage level and in the day to day running of the club from washing team kits through to transporting players, assisting with teams, fundraising and beyond. Therefore it is vital that all of our clubs embrace parental involvement in the club in a positive way and that channels of communication between the club, its volunteers and Parents are working as effectively as possible from the very start. Through offering support to parents to encourage that they engage with their child's GAA activities in a positive way and letting them know that as a club, you are responsive and open to their ideas, you can help to ensure that everyone involved has an enjoyable experience.

Parent in Sport Week takes place on 2nd-8th October 2017 and there are a number of ways in which your club can participate and build on what was a very successful campaign last year.

- Display promotional posters of the Save our Smiles Campaign in key locations throughout clubrooms, and online through your social media channels.
- Value parents contribution to your club, encouraging their participation in various appropriate roles within the club.
- Ensure all parents and carers sign up to your code of behaviour and that all policies and procedures are clearly communicated at the beginning of each year.
- Designated Spectators areas located away from the field of play are an effective way to discourage unacceptable behaviour.

HELPING CLUBS MAITH REACH THEIR POTENTIAL

Club Maith has proven to be an effective way in which clubs have improved themselves. Whether a club is starting from a strong or weak position; clubs who have embraced Club Maith are reaping the rewards of their efforts. When asked what the greatest challenges facing clubs were; clubs replied that management; coaching and games; fixtures; and facilities were the top five issues facing our clubs. These issues, among others, will be addressed the new Ulster Strategy, but the good news is that by engaging in Club Maith clubs can help to alleviate some of the burden.

lake volunteer recruitment as an example; every club could do with more hands-on-deck. In this regard Club Maith requires clubs to appoint a Volunteer Recruitment Officer – an additional role I hear you say! However, when utilised correctly with an appropriate Policy, this role will transform how the club recruit, use, retain, reward and support volunteers in their role. Feedback from clubs who have gone through Club Maith have found it easier to recruit people into positions; volunteer-roles are clearly defined making the club more efficient; roles become more rewarding; and volunteers have more free-time for themselves.

Take club finances; Club Maith will not guarantee a monetary windfall for clubs; but it will require clubs to structure their financial procedures in such a way that ensures costs are well-managed; and clubs have a clear plan for raising funds. Some clubs may be able to avail of grants as a result of being Club Maith accredited. Club Maith can bein in

many ways - unfortunately it will not sort-out issues with fixtures!

There is a huge amount of support for clubs through online resources and templates found on the dedicated Club Maith website. Ulster GAA staff are onhand to offer any support needed; while a positive development is the greater input of County Officers in a club's application. County Development Officers are tasked with promoting Club Maith in their counties, and clubs are required to have engaged with their County Development Officer in order to make an application.

Although Club Maith will prove a valuable assurance-mark when applying for funding; the real value of Club Maith for your Club is the journey which it takes your Club on. This is something accredited clubs can testify to; with improvements being seen in many aspects of club life. Increasingly we are seeing those clubs which have been on the Club Maith journey realising their


potential both on and off the field. Once accredited, the award lasts for 3 years, after which time the club are required to re-apply. Feedback from clubs who have been re-accredited say the process is much easier the second-time round, as much of the groundwork has already been undertaken.

60 clubs in total have completed the process and currently there are 29 clubs that remain accredited across Ulster. It is hoped more clubs will get across the line in the coming months with a further 100+ clubs registered with Ulster GAA and are currently going through the process.

It is appreciated that the process can take up to a year to complete, and clubs are encouraged to begin the process by logging onto the Club Maith website http://ulster.gaa.ie/clubmaith/ or email Fionntan.odowd.ulster@gaa.ie for more information.






For many of these young people the strangers they meet for the first time will become lifetime friends.



Patsy Connolly (Aghyaran)

Patsy Connolly, a stand alone genuine Aghyaran Gael and a die hard Tyrone supporter.
One of Aghyaran's finest sons, the legendary Patsy Connolly, is the Tyrone Fan under the spotlight this week.

They say every club has one. The Committee member, the grass cutter, the ticket seller, the manager, the pitch liner, the general go to person and in Patsy Connolly you have a man that fills all these roles. Patsy is normally the first person you see once you arrive at Michael Dolan Park in Aghyaran with a warm welcome and heartu smile.

The quiet gentle giant from North Tyrone has been involved with the St Davog's from almost day one. When the Club was formed in 1956 Patsy's mother Eileen Connolly donated a field to the club so they could train and play matches. For the first year of the club, Connolly's Field was the centre of GAA activity in the Aghyaran area.

Patsy, the eldest of 3 children was only just past 3 years old when his father Paddy Connolly sadly passed away and from day one the GAA always played such a vital role in the Connolly household.

He made his debut for Aghyaran in the 1963/64 season as a young 17 year old lining out at corner forward. Patsy soon made his mark and went on to line out at centre field alongside his great friend Brendan Dolan (RIP) for the next 20 years. He went on to win two West Tyrone League titles in 1965 and 1969 and was a sub on the 1981 Intermediate side who clinched the Championship title beating Coalisland in the Final.

After his playing days ended Patsy was still a pivotal figure in the Aghyaran club holding down the role of Club Treasurer for 15 years as well as Social Club Centre Secretaru.

Working alongside his lifelong friends Michael McSorley (Mickey) and Michael Dolan, who the Pitch and Grounds are named after, they spearheaded the fundraising for a much needed Community Centre and Social Club.

A bachelor and pioneer all his life, Patsy likes nothing more than to watch his beloved Tyrone and when near neighbour Willie John Dolan was the Tyrone Team sponsor Patsy was so proud to wear the Tyrone Jersey. He liked nothing more than to have the banter with his Donegal neighbours especially when Tyrone won the three "Sam Maguire" titles.

Two weeks before the 2005 All-Ireland Final Patsy fell and broke his ankle and he sadly wasn't able to make it to the game but it wasn't for the want of trying. The locals also refer to Patsy as the 'Ticket Seller Sat Nav' because any club or good cause organisation who arrive in Aghyaran to sell tickets, Patsy is only too willing to show them where to go and point out the best ticket selling houses.







The school are celebrating their 50th anniversary this year after first opening their doors in 1967 and to top things off, both boys and girls senior football sides in the school brought home their respective Ulster titles back in March.

It was the performance of the winning side that really caught the eye though. 



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
