



'That game' when a Kevin Cassidy wonder point broke

Kildare hearts

On a warm Saturday evening in late July 2011 Donegal and Kildare met in an All Ireland Championship quarter-final in Croke Park which will live long in the memory for Donegal supporters, and will probably always haunt dyed-in-the-wool Kildare fans.

It was what many people just call the 'Kevin Cassidy game'.

Donegal, having finally made the breakthrough again in Ulster after 19 years in the wilderness, came into the quarter-final with a new hardness, a new belief, a system and a manager (Jim McGuinness) who radiated quiet confidence.

Kildare, managed by an old foe of Donegal, Kieran McGeeney, had been at this

stage before, battle-hardened too, they and McGeeney had a Mayoesque streak of bad luck running around them when it came to hard luck/nearly made it stories.

Much as they wanted to be nice to Donegal, the general consensus among the pundits was that Donegal would give it a go and ultimately lose to a big, robust, well trained/coached Kildare. There was a suspicion too in some quarters that the 'party boys' mentality hadn't entirely left Donegal, but that was wrong. It wasn't until the following September of 2012 when Michael Murphy took Sam from the hands of Liam O'Neill that the doubters finally conceded that this Donegal squad were on a mission.

Ironically, the focal point of Donegal's memorable win on July 30th 2011 in Croke Park, Gaoth Dobhair's Kevin Cassidy, would play no part in Donegal's journey to joy in 2012, dropped from the panel by manager Jim McGuinness. Looking back at Cassidy's outrageous effort to win the game in extra-time against Kildare, it never leaves you. You think of memorable scores in any sport, the most recent by Johnny Sexton against France, and at some stage Cassidy's point will come up in conversation.

The game finished, after extra-time, in a one point win for Donegal, 1-12 to 0-14.

Writing for the Sunday Independent July 31st edition, a section of Dermot Crowe's report as the game reached its climax in extra time, captures the taut excitement of a titanic struggle:

"A point from Emmet Bolton after first period scores from Ronan Sweeney, Gary White and Alan Smith gave them (Kildare) a 0-14 to 1-8 lead and with eight minutes left they looked almost home. Karl Lacey, outstanding all

"Michael Murphy provided it with two scores, one from a free, despite not starting the match due to a hamstring injury and clearly not 100 percent fit. But he came on in the first half of normal time and finished with three critical points. "With time almost up, Christy Toye kicked the equaliser, and then with one final push Kevin Cassidy claimed the headlines with a superb

Kildare didn't have time to recover and collapsed to the floor at the final whistle, distraught at the remarkable late twist."

February 11th: Dublin 0-20 Donegal 0-15



February 11th: Kildare 0-18, Tyrone 1-16



Aodh Ruadh keeps its "development" momentum

An active and energetic club in its promotion of all gaelic games activities, Aodh Ruadh CLG has also managed to maintain a high level of development activity.

Since 1980 the club has been a key sponsor of community and other employment schemes in its own local area and also for a range of community and voluntary organisations in south Donegal.

This has allowed the club, through its very active Park/Development Committee to maintain a steady stream of physical development initiatives, as well as a full coaching programme in the six primary schools in the club area.

In recent years key projects which have been successfully completed include:

- Two new sand-based playing fields at Páirc Aodh Ruaidh, across the road from here at Fr Tierney Park;
- The installation of new floodlighting
- The completion of a toilet block;
- The completion of a hurling/rebound wall.

Substantial work has already been undertaken on the development of \a running

track/fitness trail which will be 1/3 of a mile in length. It is expected that this project will be completed to a very high standard later this year.

The club is over two years into a five year programme to effectively "rebuild" the Fr Tierney Park.

In 2016 new terracing was completed on the "Hospital End" of the grounds. Over the past year new retaining walls have been built on the school side of the grounds and a new section of spectator terracing is being brought into use today for the first time. That aspect of the development will be completed later this year.

Towards the end of 2017 Aodh Ruadh was allocated substantial funding under the Sports Capital Scheme to provide a new playing surface at the Fr Tierney Park. The club is currently looking at options to provide the match funding to fully finance this project and that will determine progress with this work in 2019.

By the end of 2020 Aodh Ruadh visualises a modernised, well organised facility here which will serve the club, local community, schools and colleges and the county for the next 50 years.

It seems that to-day's game is the fifteenth League meeting of Dún na nGall and Cill Dara. Cill Dara have won eight of the previous fourteen meetings, Dún na nGall have won four, with two draws - in Ballyshannon in 1996 when Tony Boyle scored 1-5 of Dún na nGall's 1-8 and in Letterkenny in 2011, when Cill Dara scored 1-1 in the last minute.

- Dún na nGall and Cill Dara have met twice in the National Football League semi-final. In 1991 Cill Dara won but lost to Baile Átha Cliath in the final 1-9/0-10. In 2007 Dún na nGall won and beat Maigh Eo 0-13/0-10 in the final. Frank McGlynn came on as a substitute for Neil McGee during the 2007 semi-final.
- Cill Dara were Dún na nGall's first competitive opponents after the winning of Sam in 1992. Declan Bonner scored a point that day. Declan also scored a point in the first Dún na nGall v Cill Dara League match in 1986 when he lined out at midfield alongside Barry Cunningham.
- Dún na nGall and Cill Dara have met twice in the Senior Football Championship. Cill Dara beat Dún na nGall 1-17/1-16 in An Droichead Nua on June 30, 2001.
- Dún na nGall beat Cill Dara 1-12/0-14 in the 2011 quarter-final i bPáirc an Chrócaigh. Cassidy!

1966

The first competitive Dún na nGall – Cill Dara match was in 1966. The 'Gaelic Weekly Cup' for beaten provincia finalists seemed to have had official recognition that year. Cill Dara had lost to An Mhí 1-9/1-8 in the Leinster final Dún na nGall lost to An Dún 1-7/0-8 in the Ulster final.

Dún na nGall were unhappy that the match was moved from Béal Átha Seanaidh to An Droichead Nua where it was played on October 23, 1966.

This star-studded Dún na nGall team of 1966 should have been the first Dún na nGall team to bring the Anglo-Celt Cup to the County. They won the Dr. Lagan Cup in 1965, 1966, 1967. They won the Dr. McKenna Cup 1963, 1965, 1967. P.J. Flood, Seán Ferriter and Frankie McFeely were on Ulster's Railway Cup-winning team of 1963: Séamus Hoare, Bernard Brady and Seán Ferriter on the winning Ulster team of 1964: Hoare, Brady Ferriter and Paul Kelly on the 1965 winning team; Hoare, Kelly and Flood on the victorious 1966 team; Hoare, Brady, Neilly Gallagher and Declan O'Carroll (on as sub) on the Ulster team that won in 1968. And six of the Dúr na nGall men played on the losing Ulster team in the 1967 final – Hoare, Brady, Flood, Micky McLoone, Micky Griffin and Ferriter (on as sub). Seán O'Donnell and Brian McEniff played for Ulster too (did John Hannigan?). A teamful of Railway Cup men when it was a most serious competition!!

Anyway, Dún na nGall were short six of their Ulster final team (Fionn Gallagher, Paul Kelly, P.J. Flood, Michael McLoone, Des Houlihan and Pauric McShea) when they travelled to An Droichead Nua and played well but lost 3-7/0-12.

Cill Dara's first and only League game in Béal Átha Seanaidh was played on 25 February 1996. Glen Ryan was centre half-back on the Cill Dara team, managed by Dermot Earley. PJ. McGowan was the Dún na nGall manager. Dún na nGall had plenty of possession in the first half but only led by 1-2/0-4 at half-time. Cill Dara were on top for the next 20 minutes and went 0-11/1-4 ahead. But Dún na nGall, led by home ground boys Murray and Roper along with McGowan and Tony Boyle, fought back and equalized with a Tony Boyle free deep into injury time to qualify for the quarter-finals of the League.


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"The Park"- Our Very Own Field of Dreams

All we ever called it was "The Park" and it was our very own special field of dreams, growing up in the 1960s.

It was the first place I saw my childhood hero Mickey McLoone, the Bobby Charlton of Ballyshannon and Donegal, in the white of St Joseph's running through defences like a rattlesnake at a tablecloth.

Of course he also did it in the green and gold of Donegal and my dad was friendly with his dad Phil in the ESB that made the connection even better.

I was first brought to the "Park" on the back of a Honda 50 to see Donegal crucify Fermanagh "who could not kick snow off a rope" according to my father.

And I remember playing my first match for Rockfield NS against one of the many Brothers teams in 1966 and captaining the most illegal ever Rockfield NS team to a south Donegal primary schools title four years later.

In those years the late great Terry McDermott was the guvnor with cap and stick as accessories and smart assed kids engaged him in verbal volleyball at their peril.

In 1972 our cup overflowed when my big brother Liam and I were on the Aodh Ruadh U14 team that beat Four Masters by a point in a south Donegal final.

The great "Red Jack" Gallagher, Jim "Natch" Gallagher and Sean Slevin were advising us at half times and we felt like kings.

"The Park" has always been special to those of from in and around the oldest town in the world.

In 1975 we were part of a Pottery team that beat the gardai in a great Nine-A-Side final on a magical evening.



So it is a place that I always associate with triumphs and I can't remember too many bad days with Fermanagh hurlers there either as we usually got the better of Donegal in the early to mid 1980s.

At a much higher level, I remember a very young Martin Carney, who was like Jesus Christ Superstar and a smiling young cherub called Martin McHugh, with fire in his

heart, ice in his blood and magic in his boots.

This field of dreams is full of other great Donegal heroes like Brian McEniff, PJ Flood, Sean Ferriter, John Hannigan, Sean O'Donnell, Martin Griffin, Anthony Molloy, Seamie Granaghan, Alan Kane etc who seemed like giants when were young. It was also the pitch where De La Salle played some epic colleges matches and you had great view of "The Park" from the old third year and first year classrooms in that great old Gaelic alma mater on the Rock.

And Donegal teams love playing here also and haven't been beaten here since 2009 when Dublin got a bit cheeky.

And we all know the goals at the Rock Home end were and are still the scoring goals.

When you were taking a shot at the Belleek end of the ground, you had to hit a football or strike a sliothar with a bit more force as the ball seemed to dip at the last minute.

Today, Kildare come to the famous "Park" on the edge of the western world and it's a very democratic park, as clay from Bundoran was brought to help in its construction in the early 1950s.

And the ghosts of all those Gaelic greats from in and around the "Town" will be nodding quietly at the Bridgend in memory of some great green and golden moments in "The Park", our greatest field of dreams!

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
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

'Fortress Fr Tierney' - an unhappy hunting ground for NFL raiders

This is Donegal's 24th league game in Ballyshannon's Fr Tierney Park since the turn of the century.

They have won 14, lost seven and drawn 2. Dublin 3 wins, Kerry 2, Galway and Offaly are the only teams to get the better of Donegal here since 2000.

It's ten years, 2009, since Donegal lost here and on that day they really should have had at least taken a league point from a spirited display against a Pat Gilroy managed Dublin side. Played on a wicked day on March 8th, 2009, Dublin won by two points, 0-13 to 1-8. Gilroy had to throw in all his big guns by the finish, among them Jason Sherlock, Bryan Cullen and Alan Brogan, to ensure victory - Dublin's first in the league after defeats by Galway and Tyrone.

Donegal, well out of it by half-time, were inspired by second half sub and local Aodh Ruadh clubman Brian Roper and their goal came from one of the many forgotten men of that time, Conal Dunne.

Donegal boss John Joe Doherty, without key men Neil Gallagher and Barry Monaghan, was disappointed, wishing his side had shown a little more composure in the final minutes when they drew level. Fast forward to 2018 and that reaction has a familiar ring to it, Donegal desperately unlucky not to get a win in Kerry, less unlucky perhaps in losing to a good Galway team in Letterkenny and one wouldn't know how to read the most recent defeat to Dublin, a game where Dublin were tested, but responded well to the test.

So, arriving here today to a ground he knows so well, Declan Bonner finds himself and his team with lots of admirers, but no points. Ironically enough, a year ago a young Donegal side who were expected to lose games, were winning them and maybe gave a false sense of their actual progression - something the ultimately disappointing subsequent 2017 championship run underlined.

A stone's throw from the Rock Hospital, the birthplace of internationally acclaimed rocker Rory Gallagher, many good teams came here full of hope only to find Donegal at their best in this iconic old ground. In the past some Donegal county managers, in need of a win, were known to express a preference for having this venue pencilled in for 'must win' games.

So, with their back against the wall, and hopefully a nearby Atlantic breeze at their back at the right time, maybe today's venue could well be the perfect setting for the first and very badly needed league points of 2018.

"I want a squad of thirty plus players and every one of those players fighting to be in the first 15, or 21, or matchday squad.

"You can see these boys coming back now, and it's going to get very competitive."

Like Donegal, the Lillywhites failed to pick up any points from the opening three rounds of the league.

However, Bonner was still impressed by Cian O'Neill's outfit in their games against Monaghan and Tyrone, and he is anticipating a tough battle.

"We know exactly the challenge they are going to bring. They are a very strong, psychical side and they have some brilliant footballers. We will need to be at our very best to win that game.

"But it's a challenge we're looking forward to. I said at the start of the campaign that it wouldn't be the be-all and end-all if we did go down but now that we're here, and with the football we are playing, we want to get results and points in the league, and we do want to remain in Division I."

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
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Donegal PRO Ed Byrne and the Kildare link



Host club Aodh Ruadh have some 'net gains' with county keepers

Ballyshannon has a proud history of producing 'county' players, and occasionally the locals like to joke that a large number of the 1992 panel that won the county's first All Ireland were in fact born in Ballyshannon.

The fact that the Rock Hospital, which is just across the road from today's venue, was one of the maternity hospitals for south Donegal in the 1960's and players from other clubs in the south of the county were born there, has been known to get lost in the telling of that claim...

However, what cannot be disputed is the Aodh Ruadh club's contribution to county and province and where the Erneside club has a real claim to fame is in terms of goalkeepers.

Today, subject to selection or injury, another Aodh Ruadh goalkeeper, Peter Boyle, will be in goals for Donegal. Boyle was thrown in at the deep end shortly into the Donegal v Kerry game when Mark Anthony McGinley picked up an injury after 17 minutes.

Hardly a veteran, he's no novice either. He was first drafted into the senior squad in 2016 by then manager, Rory Gallagher, and he was in goals when Donegal won the Uluter under-21 championship under Jim McGuinness.

A recognised shot stopper, Boyle has tremendous length to his kickout. Having played against Kerry, he retained his place against Galway and Dublin.

He comes from a club who have a knack for producing good goalkeepers.

In 1972 and 1992 when the county won a first Ulster title and a first All Ireland championship title respectively, the men in nets were from Ballyshannon.

Alan Kane was the man in nets for Donegal in the early 70s; he made his championship debut in 1970, against Antrim, and played 8 championship games for Donegal. He was goalkeeper in the breakthrough final in 1972 when the county won its first ever Ulster Senior Football Championship title, defeating Tyrone 2-13 to 1-11.

He continued in goals for 1973 and played in the drawn Ulater final against Down in 1974, the sides finishing I-14

went on to make 17 championship appearances over the next ter years, his final game in the 1984 championship against Armagh.

McCole had taken over in 1974 from a Ballyshannon man, and served with distinction for ten years, but his place in the number I jersey was taken by another Ballyshannon man, Gary Walsh, who would play for the county for the next eleven years, his debut in 1985 against Down and his final game, also against the Mourne men in 1995. Gary, known by one and all as 'Big George', with 30 championship appearances, is second only to Paul Durcan, who, like Walsh, enjoyed eleven years in goals for the county.

With the change in the championship structure, Paul had an impressive 52 appearances when he finished playing to further his career in the Middle East. Walsh and Durcan of course, achieved the ultimate, All Ireland medal winners in 1992 and 2012.

There are at other levels, from minor to junior, several other Aodh Ruadh men who have served Donegal as goalkeepers. Sean McHugh like Kane and Walsh, has a hand in history, as he was Donegal's goalkeeper when the county won their first Ulster Minor Championship final in 1956, defeating Armagh by 2-5 to 0-06. In three championship games McHugh conceded only one goal.

Whatever the future holds for Peter Boyle, what is certain, he's not short of tradition and that winning habit in key games, thanks to his home club, Aodh Ruadh.

Ground Regulations for Fr Tierney Park, Ballyshannon

All persons entering Fr Tierney Park, Ballyshannon are admitted only subject to the following ground regulations and to the rules and regulations of the Gaelic Athletic Association. Entry to the ground shall be deemed to constitute unqualified acceptance of all these rules and regulations. Any person who fails to comply with these ground regulations may be refused entry, or removed from the ground.

Safety: The unauthorised climbing of any structure, walls or buildings in the ground is strictly forbidden. Under no circumstances is it permitted to throw any object onto the pitch.

Access: A person may not obstruct a gangway, stairwell or circulation area at any time.

Field of Play: Unathorised persons are not permitted to enter upon the field of play at any time, before, during or after the games.

Ground Control: The Ground Management reserve the right for its servants or agents to remove from the ground any person who does not comply with the ground regulations or whose presence in the ground could reasonably be construed as constituting a source of danger; nuisance or annoyance to other spectators.

Smoking: Permitted only in designated areas of Ground - Signposted in each of the 4 corners of grounds. Please respect this policy.

Stewards: All spectators are asked to co-operate with Stewards at all times.

Defibrillator: Located & signposted at changing rooms.

Exits: New exit to main road at stand side of grounds; Exit behind "old" scoreboard will bring you in direction of town centre & Belleek road & N15/by-pass.

Hugh McFadden slotted over from distance, before Donegal scored a goal of their own, although there was more than a hint of fortune with it.






Daniel Flynn and Kevin Feely did kick late scores, but Donegal held on to get a crucial victory, which gives them a fighting chance of staying up in Divi-
