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A TRIBUTE TO CORMÁC MCANALLEN

1980-2004

AODHÁN HARKIN

FOURTEEN YEARS AGO ON THE 2ND MARCH 2004, THE G.A.A. WORLD WAS ROCKED BY THE SUDDEN AND TRAGIC DEATH OF TYRONE FOOTBALLER THE LATE CORMAC MCANALLEN.

Born on 11th February 1980, the Eglish St Patrick's clubman had amassed such a huge amount of honours in his short stay on this earth, you can only wonder what more he could and would have achieved had he not been taken from us at such a young age?


It's particularly poignant that Tyrone are playing Donegal here tonight as the last ever game that Cormac played with the Red Hand's was against them at Páirc MacCumhaill Ballybofey on Sunday 22nd February 2004 when he captained the team to win their sixth Dr McKenna Cup title. Many felt that even at the young age of 24 that Cormac was the perfect leader to replace the legendary Peter Canavan as captain of the side and that he would go on to replicate Peter by climbing the steps of the Hogan Stand at Croke Park and accept a second Sam Maguire Cup for Tyrone but sadly that wasn't to be the case.

On their way to the 2004 Dr McKenna Cup final, Tyrone had defeated Derry at Omagh. Antrim at Belfast and UUJ in what was the first official Ulster fixture involving a County team played under floodlights with the game taking place at Páirc Colmcille Carrickmore. The clash against the Tír Chonaill men in the decider saw Tyrone win comfortably on a score line of 1-22 to 0-7. Joe McQuillan (Cavan) was the referee and the Tyrone side that day included the likes of Gavin Devlin who is now part of the Red Hand management team, Ryan McMenamin, Brian Dooher, Sean Cavanagh, Brian McGuigan, Enda McGinley, Conor Gormley and Philip Jordan, Donegal also had a strong side back then with Barry Monaghan as their captain, Kevin Cassidy, John Gildea, Christy Toye, Michael Hegarty, Brian Roper, Colm McFadden and Brendan Devenney were amongst their ranks.

Following the game, I can vividly recall the late Cormac raising aloft the Dr McKenna Cup under the press box in Ballybofey and thinking to myself it won't be too long before he will be lifting the Sam Maguire Cup for Tyrone as the team captain, but the man above had other plans

and ideas! The Dr McKenna Cup was the first piece of silverware that Cormac had lifted in his role as captain of the Tyrone Senior team, but he had already lifted many other titles at Minor and Under 21 levels as captain of the Red Hand's. Twenty years ago, in 1998, Cormac led Tyrone Minors to an All-Ireland title defeating Laois in the decider and followed this up in 2000 and once again in 2001 by defeating Limerick and Mayo respectively in respective Under 21 deciders. His leadership qualities were very evident from a young age and it was no surprise that he won so many honours at Schools, College, Club, County, Provincial and National levels. Many players have gone through their entire careers and not achieved even a quarter of what the legend that is Cormac McAnallen had achieved before he so suddenly departed this earth less than a month after celebrating his 24th birthday!

Later the same night after winning the Dr McKenna Cup when most players would have been out celebrating their success, I attended St Joseph's Hall in Omagh for what I believe was a Tír Eoghain Scór Sinsear semi-final and I bumped into Cormac who was there to represent his club Eglish in Tráth na gCeist (Quiz) I can remember congratulating him on captaining the team to the title earlier that day and as always, he was very modest about such preferring to concentrate on making sure that he had done his homework for the quiz questions ahead. I believe that the Eglish quiz team progressed to the final that was later held in St Patrick's Hall Strabane on 21st March but if memory serves me correct they withdrew as a mark of respect to Cormac.



Defeating Donegal in the Dr McKenna Cup final would Cormac as his grandfather Charlie O'Neill hailed from Letterbarra just a few miles brother of Charlie's, Joe won a Tyrone Senior Football Championship medal with Strabane Lámh Dhearg back in 1945. He was working in the area at that time and it was also at a time when the parishes of Strabane and Lifford were all the one known as Clonleigh and Camus right up until 1974.

As a Strabane Sigersons clubman, I have great memories of Cormac attending our clubs Easter and Summer Coaching Camps, I recall him coming to the club back in 1998 with the Tom Markham Cup after Tyrone Minors won the All-Ireland Minor title and when Queen's University Belfast won the Sigerson Cup back in 2000

it was Cormac who brought the famous piece of silverware back to its spiritual hometown where Dr George Sigerson was born. Since his death the club has presented the annual Cormac McAnallen Cups to the best boy and girl at our annual Easter Camp, a tradition that hopefully will continue for many years to come.

An interesting footnote about Cormac that isn't so widely known is the fact that he won a Dublin Senior Championship title with UCD in 2002 whilst studying in the capital. He never got to win a Tyrone Senior Championship title but it must be one of the very few titles that he missed out on during his short yet rewarding career that saw him go from winning Scór na nÓg Tráth na gCeist titles with his club Eglish in 1992 through to winning Young Footballer of the Year in 2001, named as full back on the All-Star team of 2003 to

that final piece of silverware that he proudly accepted as team captain on 21st February 2004, the Dr McKenna Cup.

The name of Cormac McAnallen proudly lives on via the Cormac Trust which has done amazing work over the years since his death, there's a in his honour, the trophy that Ireland and Australia compete for in the International Test Cup and I've no doubt there are and the likes honouring and commemorating his proud memory. However, if you want suggest that you go out and purchase a copy of the book penned and published late last year by his brother Dónal titled The life, death and legacy of Cormac McAnallen".

Following these results, we wish every club in Tyrone a healthy and successful season ahead of the 2018 season as they aim for the highest standards.



In Tyrone GAA through a series of talks, events and **Red Hand View** features we've been reminding ourselves of what happened here back then so that we can understand it, respect those involved in it and learn from it.

Marching to Different Tune

THE 1912-22 DECADE SAW
MANY MAJOR SHIFTS

TYRONE UNIONIST SIDE OF
THE FENCE.

The Ulster Volunteer Force was created by Edward Carson as a cutting edge to resist Home Rule and a County Committee for Tyrone was put in place in December 1912. At a meeting in Omagh on 5 January 1913 it was decided to form the Tyrone Regiment of the 5th Ulster Volunteers and by August the County had been organised into four divisions, South, East, Mid and North with 4,762 men on board. On 1 October Edward Carson visited Killymoon Castle in Cookstown for a huge UVF review and later that month a major training camp took place at Baronscourt.

Among those at the heart of this loyalist resistance within Tyrone was Ambrose Ricardo.


Ambrose Ricardo was not a native of Tyrone. Born in 1866 at Gatcombe Park in Gloucestershire he was a great grandson of David Ricardo the famous economist and was of Sephardic Jewish ancestry (Sephardic Jews were those who coalesced in Spain/Portugal in the Middle Ages).

Ricardo had a strong British military career and went with the Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers to both South Africa and India. It was in Burma in 1893 that he married Elizabeth Alice ('Ella') Herdman of Sion Mills and that formed what became his strong Tyrone connection.

In 1904 he and Ella moved to Sion Mills, so he could take up a role as a Director of Herdman's Mills. Although he had retired from the British army he kept strong links with it and in 1914 formally rejoined at the start of World War I. By then he had become a key player in the creation of the UVF in West Tyrone, raising what would form the nucleus of the 9th Battalion of the Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers, 'The Tyrones'.

'The Tyrones' were essentially UVF men who had also moved seamlessly sideways into the regular British army and Ricardo became their first Commanding Officer, moving with them to the Western Front. He survived the War, ending up as a Brigadier-General, but its impact never left him.

Whatever about his deep British military connections, Ambrose Ricardo was a man of varying other views and interests. In the early 1900s he had been




central to building one of Sion Mills' most prominent landmarks, the Church of the Good Shepherd and in 1922 he would help found Féis Dhoíre Cholmcílle, now probably the most vibrant of its kind anywhere.

Ricardo also became a leading figure in the Scout movement. All the while, even within Unionist politics, he was a man who firmly believed in the full, nine-County Ulster and at the critical March 1920 Ulster Unionist Council meeting that voted on partition he stood firmly for the cases of Cavan, Donegal and Monaghan.

Ambrose Ricardo drowned in a reservoir at Sion Mills, on 9 July 1923, still badly affected it is said, and even damaged, by the horrors he had witnessed on the Western Front. He is buried in front of his Church of the Good Shepherd and as many of you go home that way tonight after this game, you'll see his memorial placed there between the Church and the road you're travelling on.

As always, the story of our County moves on.


38 years - I started playing for the under 12 team in 1980.



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

FÁILTE TO THE... THE TÍR CONAILL MEN

THE GAELS OF TYRONE EXTEND A WARM AND HEARTY "CÉAD MÍLE FÁILTE" TO THE PLAYERS, OFFICIALS AND SUPPORTERS OF DONEGAL ALONG HERE TO HEALY PARK, OMAGH FOR TONIGHT'S ALLIANZ DIVISION 1 LEAGUE CLASH.

Both sides go into tonight's game fully knowing that they are in dire need of the points after what has been a tough campaign to date for each of them. The sides have played well in their opening games but didn't get the desired results making tonight's clash even more important as they battle for much needed points to stave off the threat of relegation.

Just a fortnight ago at the Athletic Grounds Armagh, the sides went head to head in the Dr McKenna Cup final with Donegal gaining the upper hand to deny Tyrone a magnificent seven in a row of titles, so they go into this clash with the bragging rights secured whilst Mickey Harte's side have something of a score to settle!

The last occasion that Donegal were the visitors to Omagh in the Allianz Division 1 League was exactly five years ago today (3rd March 2013) and they arrived here as the reigning All Ireland Champions but despite affording them a very deserving and hearty welcome Tyrone were in no mood for sentiment and edged the contest on a score line of 1-13 to 0-12. The Red

Hand's went on to reach the final that season where they narrowly lost out to Dublin in the decider whilst Donegal ended up being relegated to Division 2! However, last season in the League clash at Páirc MacCumhaill Ballybofey. Donegal won by double scores, 0-12 to 0-6 and back in 2015 during their League clash the Tir Chonaill men also saw off the challenge of Tyrone again at the Ballybofev venue with a convincing 1-13 to 0-6 victory.

The rivalry between the O'Neill's and O'Donnell's is indeed legendary with one such historical incident being the famous Battle of Knockavoe on the hillside overlooking Strabane that claimed 900 lives away back in the year of 1522. If you have read your history books, then I've no doubt that you will recall that there were many other battles between them over the years. However, all of that is now history as the present-day warriors from the O'Neill's and O'Donnell's thankfully preferring to do their battling on the playing pitches.

Several of the North Tyrone players also have strong Donegal connections with Ronan McNamee's (Aghyaran) mother hailing from Glenfin whilst Cathal McShane (Owen Roe O'Neill's) also has relatives residing in the O'Donnell County. The third member of the North Tyrone contingent on the squad Ronan McHugh (Aghyaran) was very quick to

point out to me that he was a Tyrone man through and through, however I suspect that he must have a wee drop of Donegal blood somewhere in his genes!

As someone who hails from Strabane that sits directly on the artificial border with Lifford, I know full well and have witnessed at first hand over the years the passion that my near neighbours have for the Donegal team and jersey. Put it like this, if Donegal were to win this clash tonight then I will be more than likely to travel the fourteen miles to Derry to fill my car with petrol as I'd be keen to avoid the stick and banter that would be meted out at my usual haunt of Daly's Filling Station in Lifford. Thankfully I filled up on the Friday prior to the recent Dr McKenna Cup decider so I've managed to avoid them for a bit! That sort of rivalry can be had right along the North Tyrone and East Donegal border areas in places like Urney. Castlederg and Aghyaran with their close neighbours and rivals in neighbouring parts of Castlefin, Killygordon and Ballybofev.

Many families in these areas are married through each other and many supporters are working, socialising, and attending schools and the like in each other's County so the tension and the passion is very strong indeed. A Tyrone win here tonight will mean that it will be very quiet on the various border crossing



points on the way home for the Donegal supporters, but a Red Hand defeat will mean that even the statues known as the "Tinnie's" sited on the Strabane/Lifford crossing point will be seriously aroused by the sound of car horns as was the case just recently!

The Urney St Columba's club in Tyrone is unique in that they belong to the parish of Doneyloop situated in Donegal which also takes in Donegal club side Castlefin Robert Emmett's catchment area. Down through the years there have been many players that have represented both clubs and indeed there have been players like the late Seamus "Congo" O'Kane who has played for both Tyrone and Donegal.

When Donegal won the Dr McKenna Cup back in 2010, Urney club player Fergal McNulty was a member of the winning squad. Similarly, former Strabane Shamrock's club hurler Gerard Gilmore who won several titles with the Red Hand's including a Nicky Rackard All-Star Award now hurls with Donegal side Setanta and was a member of the winning Donegal team that defeated his native Tyrone in the 2017 Allianz Division 3A League decider played at Celtic Park Derry so there are plenty of strong links amongst the counties.

The first ever clash of Tyrone and Donegal in the Ulster Championship occurred some ninety-nine years ago on Sunday 25th May 1919 in Strabane when the Tír Chonaill men had a 4-3 to 2-0 win over the Red Hand's. I believe the game was played at the Bog Road in Strabane with the Ulster Herald newspaper back then reporting that 1,200 spectators had been in attendance.

The Tyrone side consisted of players from just a handful of clubs with Augher, Fintona and Trillick to the fore and one Strabane player named Charlie Smith who was originally from Cavan and working in the town at that time. Tyrone appeared to be in great difficulty around that period with the newspapers reporting that many teams

were not fielding owing to the growth of soccer even in the stronghold areas of East Tyrone!

Much has changed over the years since that first ever meeting but the rivalry is still intense.

A safe journey home is extended to all the travelling supporters and just in case Donegal do happen to gain another win here tonight then a word of caution to them, please be respectful when passing through Strabane, Clady, Castlederg, Aghyaran or any other residential areas of Tyrone later tonight!





But Tyrone got off the mark in round three at St Conleth's Park in Newbridge. Lee Brennan, who on his first start had nailed six points against the Dubs, struck the all-important goal that sparked a revival after Kildare had got off to a strong start. And a late wonder point from skipper Mattie Donnelly gave the visitors a dramatic 1-16 to 0-18 result.


But there was a third defeat when the Red Hands visited neighbours Monaghan last weekend and lost by 0-15 to 0-14.

And Donegal finally got off the mark last weekend when they




defeated Kildare by 1-15 to 3-7 at Ballyshannon.

For now though, the league is the priority. As it stands now in



Loughmacrory reached the All Ireland 60x30 Club Senior Championship final of 1980 with the team of Hugh Duff, John Curran, John McCullagh and Packie Coyle. In 2007 the club claimed the club and county's first Ulster Mens Open Senior Club 40x20 Championship and the team of Chris Curran, Ciaran Curran, Ciaran Meenagh and Stephen Conway lost to Ballaghadereen by 93-86 in the All-Ireland Senior Club final.

In August 2014 the Club launched the inaugural Lough IWall Showdown when 252 players competed and over 1,000 spectators packed in to watch Puerto Rico's Wally Amaro and Catriona Casey win the first titles. The prestigious 5th event takes place from 29th June to 1st July 2018.

With the LCDA leading a redevelopment of the Centre in 2018 the future looks bright as Loughmacrory GAA Handball Club develop the sport into the future. Check out all the plans, events and stories at www.loughmacrory.com.



Donegal face a real battle to stay up in Division 1 after they lost to fellow strugglers Tyrone in Healy Park on Saturday night.

It was billed as a crucial four-pointer, and Declan Bonner's team started well and established a 0-6 to 0-3 lead after 19 minutes

However, Tyrone raised their game in the second quarter, and Donegal struggled to stop their sweeping team

Peter Harte missed a penalty in the 32nd minute, but Niall Sludden did score a goal to leave the Red Hands one up at the break.

Tyrone started the second half brilliantly, scoring 1-3 without reply, with Mark Bradley getting the goal.

Donegal didn't cave, and an Odhran MacNiallais goal brought them back into contention, but Tyrone never looked like losing the game.

Bonner's team will now have to win their two remaining games against Monaghan and Mayo to be in with a chance of remaining in the top flight,

Donegal got the better of Tyrone in the McKenna Cup Final three weeks previously, but it was two very different

teams that took to the field in Omagh. Bonner was dealt a blow in the leadup to the game as Patrick McBrearty wasn't fit to play.

Despite the loss of their top scorer, Donegal started well and Odhran Mac-Niallais opened the scoring after three

Mark Bradley quickly cancelled that out, but Mark McHugh nudged the visitors ahead again with a fine curling ef-

MacNiallais and Niall Sludden traded points, before Donegal started to get on top, and Michael Murphy converted a free, while Eoghan 'Ban' Gallagher was on target from distance.

Lee Brennan replied with a good score for the Red Hands, but Murphy nailed a free for Bonner's side in the

19th minute after Brennan was fouled. Donegal were defending well, but as the half progressed Tyrone started to get more joy, and Lee Brennan and Conor McAliskey helped themselves to

Murphy saw a shot blocked down and Tyrone raced forward with the Donegal rearguard caught too far up

Conor Meyler played the ball forward to Sludden, who was unceremoniously brought down by Donegal netminder Shaun Patton, although the St Eunan's man somehow escaped a black card. Peter Harte stepped up for Ty-

All of a sudden, Donegal seemed devoid of confidence and even simple hand-passes became challenging.

Donegal had gone 17 second half minutes without a score, but they gave themselves a lifeline when they scored a super goal.

They worked the ball down the field from a short kick-out with Eoghan 'Ban' Gallagher, Jamie Brennan, and Martin McElhinney all involved, before MacNiallais palmed the ball to the net.

That lifted Bonner's side and they reduced their deficit to three points when Stephen McBrearty pointed.

MAN OF THE MATCH

THE WHISTLER

Donegal gave away ten scoreable frees, but they couldn't really have any great complaints about them as their tackling was poor. However, they may have felt that they could have had another few at the other end of the pitch. The main focus of David Coldrick's performance was on his decision to not give Shaun Patton a black card for pulling down Niall Sludden in the first half. It was a terrible call by the referee.

TURNING POINT

Niall Sludden's goal in the 35th minute was a huge blow to Donegal. They were under pressure at that stage, and had just been given a let-off with the penalty miss. If they could have got through to half-time, the management team might have been able to settle their charges. However, Tyrone broke through for a goal, and once they hit the front, they never looked like relinquishing their advantage.

TALKING POINT

After Saturday's defeat, it's going to take a huge effort for Donegal to avoid relegation, and it's difficult to envisage them doing so. They are too open at the back. and are lacking organisation in defence. That situation should improve when Mark Anthony McGinley, Neil McGee, and Paddy McGrath return to the team, but there is still a lot of work to be done before the championship. Donegal were also without Patrick McBrearty and he was a huge loss, while with the exception of Tiernan McCann, Tyrone were pretty much at full tilt. The Red Hands are still the team to beat in Ulster, and Donegal are going to struggle against their counter-attacking style, if they continue with their more expansive brand of football.
