


Many thanks to our county grounds for hosting these games, our facilities for players and patrons are of a high standard and I thank all stewards. field officials and event controllers.

It was a similar story for Red Hughs when they saw off Emyvale of Monaghan in the Ulster semi-final.





ULSTER INTER-FIRMS

Garvaghey played host to the Senior and Intermediate Men's competition on Saturday 3 November, with nine teams battling it out for the two titles on offer. In the end, Ardboe Coldstore claimed the Senior title with Creagh Concrete 1 emerging victorious in the Intermediate final.

Section A was a five team group which saw Ardboe Coldstore claim top spot after three wins and a draw in their four games. That draw came against Creagh Concrete 1, who lost out 1-2 to 0-3 to Kingspan in the final group game which decided second spot. The Fire & Rescue Service claimed victory over Ulster Surveyors to claim the other Intermediate place on offer.

In Section B, HTC Mechanical defeated Mallaghan in the first game, with LCC Group overcoming Creagh Concrete 2. A late goal for LCC Group in the second game saw them defeat HTC Mechanical by the minimum, and they would make it three from three and top the section after a convincing victory the final game.

In the Intermediate semi-finals, Creagh Concrete 1 overcame Creagh Concrete 2 in a keenly contested game while NIFRS put in a strong performance to push past Mallaghan. In the Final, NIFRS seemed to have done enough but a wonder point from Creagh Concrete 1 forced the game to extra time, and an early goal was enough to see Creagh emerge as winners.

The Senior semi-finals, LCC Group needed a late goal to squeeze past Kingspan while Ardboe Coldstore had too much for HTC Mechanical. An early goal in the final for Ardboe Coldstore put them in control against LCC Group and although they closed the gap, they could never get on top. Ryan Kelly captained Ardboe Coldstore to victory and full back Oisin Devlin was named Player of the Tournament.

Saturday 10 November saw two sections of the 2018 FinTrU Ulster GAA Football Inter-Firms take place, with the Ladies section in Garvaghey and a Junior Men's event in Mid Ulster Sports Arena. Unfortunately the Junior Men's section scheduled for Garvaghey was postponed because of the persistent rain on Friday evening leaving the pitches unplayable. Nevertheless, a great days football ensued with FinTrU claiming the Ladies Cup, Pramerica retaining the Ladies Shield and Harpscreen emerging victorious in MUSA.

Eight teams entered the Ladies competition, with all teams getting three games in the group stage plus at least one knockout match. In Section A, last year's winners South West College once again topped the group winning three from three. Citi finished in second place thanks to a 1-6 to 1-2 victory over Pramerica. That sent the Donegal based company and the GAA Store to the shield.

In Section B, Premier Electrics opened up with a two point victory over Randox but went on to narrowly lose the next two games. Competition sponsors FinTrU went on to win all three games and top the group and were joined in the cup by Randox who overcome Options IT to come second on score difference.

In the Shield semi-finals, Premier Electrics narrowly seen off the GAA Store thanks to two first half goals and a late penalty save from their goalkeeper.

Pramerica overcome Options IT in the other semi-final and would go on to retain their Shield title with a 1-8 to 1-2 win in the decider.

In the Cup, SWC comfortably overcome Randox in the first semi but the second game was a much closer affair before three late points saw FinTrU overcome Citi. The final promised to be a cracking game and so it turned out, with FinTrU getting goals at vital times to emerge 3-6 to 0-7 winners and see captain Stacey McCann claim the Cup.

GaelicLife MATCH PREVIEWS



IF there's one thing that makes the incoming darker nights easier to deal with then it's the thought that Christmas is just around the corner. That countdown, of course, will take on different meaning for three of the 10 teams in Ulster Club action this weekend

For the other seven it will be turkey and ham with extra stuffing and a 1000 'what ifs' swirling around the head as you help yourself to another glass of mulled wine. For the winners of the Senior, Intermediate and Junior Championships it will be reading the back of the mince pie packet to see how many calories are in it and asking Santa for a new foam roller. After all, the All-Ireland series will be on the horizon.

The Ulster GAA sorting hat will direct a few teams into the 'wintering well' category this weekend while we should have the first of our three All-Ireland hopefuls as Limavady and Red Hugh's meet in the Junior Final. The Donegal outfit will be using the revolutionary 'London bus' tactical approach for their clash with the Wolfhounds.

Before last season, no Tir Chonaill side had ever come close to winning the trophy – Urris shipping a heavy beating in the 2012 decider – but Naomh Colmcille broke the run with a fine victory over Belnaleck. Wins over Con Magee's and, more impressively, Emyvale, suggest that two in a row is a very possible achievement for the county. The Wolfhounds are keen to add to their haul of having the coolest nickname in the GAA, and they have the power and pace to cause havoc.

They defeated a Tecconaught side that had won every game in Down in 2018 and followed it up with a comeback win against Aghadrumsee. They trailed in that game for 49 minutes before Brandon O'Brien's goal swung the contest their way. Much chat has been about rising star Callum Brown who is off to the AFL. He won three clean kick-outs against Aghadrumsee, including one against the head, and will be keen to wave bye-bye to the Emerald Isle as an Ulster champion.

The senior and intermediate grades are a step behind but when all is said and done we should know the respective finalists by Sunday evening. Ulster GAA's decision to stage both senior games in Omagh means that Healy Park is set for a huge crowd, and the majority will be there to watch the mouth-watering clash of Crossmaglen and Gaoth Dobhair.

The Rangers are back in the provincial tournament for the first time in three years, a drought that made the Ottaman Wars feel like a daytrip. Yes they may not be as dominant in Armagh anymore, but when the pressure was cranked up in the Orchard county they delivered with some scintillating performances against Armagh Harps, a hotly-tipped Cullyhanna (not by me, your honour) and Ballymacnab.

They then came through a 30-man Royal Rumble against Coalisland, a game 'good aul JR' would have been proud to call, with more cards on display than a Moonpig factory. Gaoth Dobhair, of course, come from possibly the nicest part of country, a place where you'd expect

to see Gerard Butler walking around practicing an awful Irish accent. The Gaeltacht men may have talk our native tongue in a beautiful lilt but does anyone know the Irish for 'cute hoor'? Kevin Cassidy has been using his Gaelic Life column to big up every opponent, deeming them the favourites. They could have been playing a bunch of English tourists after a session at Teach Mhici and Kevin still would have been talking up their ability to take scores under pressure.

In this case though his fears may be realised. Cross have enough experience to fill the Clanrye and should be okay for a spot in the final—where they never lose. That was true a few years ago when they defeated Scotstown at the Athletic Grounds and the Monaghan men could make their return to the decider against Coleraine.

Kieran Donnelly's side nearly threw it away against Burren having given the umpire a pair of dead arms in the first half as he had to signal wide time and time again. They got there though but their shooting will have to be better against the McGoldri....Coleraine. Much has been made about Cross's emergence in the face of defiance – look up Eoghan Rua's story and you'll see another example of a club that overcome the odds.

The intermediate grade is always one of Ulster's prizes and we have another two great semi-finals to look forward to. Banagher just happened to add Enda Muldoon to their management team and all of a sudden they are in the Ulster Final? It was a sad day



when 'The Big Easy' languidly hung up the boots, lobbing them into the backcorner of the garage one last time with unerring accuracy, but it seems that his sparkle has extended to the sideline alongside Declan Mullan.

They face a real challenge against Mullahoran who bring pedigree to the game, mainly at senior level. This is new territory for the Dreadnoughts but rather than take the hump about playing below a level they're used too, they have knuckled down and secured a return to top-flight football in Cavan. That's how you do it boys and girls.


The other semi-final brings together St Enda's and Tattyreagh. St Enda's nearly made a mess of the Antrim Final but played some wonderful stuff against a hugely-experienced Doohamlet outfit in the Ulster quarter-final. Saffron sides sometimes struggle to keep good underage sides together, but St Enda's are bucking the trend.

And how could you not finish on Tattyreagh? The Tatts, remember them at the start of 2017? Wee fish with not one adult championship to their name in 99 years of football. By God, those centenary celebrations must have been good because they followed up last year's Tyrone Junior title with the Intermediate equivalent this season.

A lesson on the possibility of swift progress when everyone is willing to give everything to the cause.

There have been many great club

stories in the GAA in recent years. That belongs right up there. Here's to





FINISHING GAMES ON THE DAY

EXTRA TIME

Ard Chomhairle instructed at their meeting on February 23rd 2018, that relevant games that finish level after normal playing times should be completed as follows:

Phase 1:

Proceed to Extra time as provided for in T.O Cuid II (two periods of ten minutes each way)

Phase 2:

If teams are still level, an additional two periods of five minutes each way will be played.

there shall be a maximum time space of five minutes between the end of the first phase of Extra Time and the beginning of the second phase.

The Half Time interval in the second phase of Extra time should not exceed five minutes.

Phase 3:

If still level, a "Free taking competition" to decide the outcome:

- Each team will nominate 5 free takers for the competition and indicate to the referee in which order (1 to 5) the free takers will take the frees
- The 5 players above must be chosen from players who have participated in the game, either in normal time or in Extra Time.
- Players who receive a red card in Hurling or Football, and players who receive a black card in Football, in normal time or Extra Time are not permitted to participate in the free-taking competition.
- The Referee will decide which end the free taking competition should be played into.
- He will toss a coin in the presence of the two captains to see which team will have the option of going 1st.
- The Referee will ensure two goal umpires are in place at the end in which the competition is being played into.

- Frees will be taken by each of the five players from a position of their choosing on the 65m line (Hurling) or from approximately the centre of the line marking the semi-circle (33m) in Football. Frees in football may be taken from the hands or off the ground.
- In Hurling, frees shall be taken in accordance with the provisions of T.O 2017 Cuid II – Rules of Set Play Riail 2.5 (a) and (b) and Rules of Foul Play 4.24, 4.25 and 4.27. Breaches of these provisions will render frees null and void and they cannot be retaken.
- In football, frees shall be taken in accordance with the provisions of T.O 2017 Cuid II Rules of Set Play Rule 2.5 and Rules of Foul Play 4.23, 4.24 and 4.26. Breaches of these provisions will render frees null and void and they cannot be retaken
- Frees will be taken for points only, with no goalkeeper / defenders facing the free-takers.
- The game is awarded to whichever team scores more of their 5 frees.
