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
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
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
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
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# RÉAMHFHOCAL ÓN UACHTARÁN

A warm welcome to you all for this final round of matches at the Quarter-Final group stage of the GAA Football All-Ireland Senior Championship.

As we come to the end of the second year of the initial three-year trial for this new format, we have a lot of great football to look back on.

Great players meeting in great matches and on great occasions and played at great venues.

The purpose of this new format was to create a festival of football between the top Championship contenders at the height of the summer, and in 2018 and 2019 the Championship has produced that as the battle for the Sam Maguire gets whittled away and we look forward to more of the same this weekend.

Of all the matches being played out over this hectic weekend, the meeting of Cork and Roscommon is the only tie that will not impact on the

promotion path to the semifinals as both sides are out of contention.

Cork may be destined for Allianz Division 3 come next spring, but over the course of their last three Championship outings they have done much to show how strong the pulse is in Rebel County football and to finish on a win here would give more proof of this. Finishing on a high would also be a positive end to a Roscommon season that yielded a brilliant Connacht title with wins over Galway and Mayo.

Both Dublin and Tyrone have already qualified for the All-Ireland semi-finals, but neither side will be interested in loosening their grip on a winning momentum. It's a repeat of a titanic struggle in Omagh last year and of course a repeat of the 2018 All-Ireland final pairing, while the Red Hand inflicted a rare defeat on the Dubs in the Allianz League earlier in the season.

The meeting of Mayo and Donegal in Castlebar will be an occasion to savour. Donegal were hugely impressive in their epic drawn battle with Kerry at Croke Park while Mayo, as they have so often done in recent times, successfully rallied and regrouped in their last outing against Meath and neither side will be holding back with a place in the last four on the line.

Kerry head to Navan knowing that they need to win to keep their forward momentum on track and possibly top this group. But they head north east knowing that the Royals have put down a marker this season and that their return to Division 1 in 2020 could be a sign of even bigger things to come.

Ultimately, sport comes down to finding out who is the best and the field will be thinned out dramatically this weekend.

These matches and these


occasions serve as justification of the decision – taken almost two decades ago - to embrace a new format to reinvigorate Gaelic football.

We are in the grip of a debate that has the potential, through a combination of format change and playing rule change, to again make a huge impact on the game.

The debate in itself will be positive, and if nothing else, serves to remind all of us how much we care about this great game and have strong views on how it could perhaps be even better and more competitive.

Nothing here is being rushed. Two possible format proposals have been circulated widely to provoke debate and possible rule changes have been extensively trialed with detailed analysis carried out.

What Gaelic football does not lack is its heroes. They are out there in front of us across Saturday and Sunday week after week and we



are hugely grateful of the commitment they make to our games and likewise complimentary of the clubs and volunteers and families who helped shape them. We need the dedication of referees and match officials for our games to take place and their commitment is vital.

Our partnership with SuperValu, eir and AIB is hugely valued and is a level of support that helps us grow Gaelic games activity in every county.

Finally, a special Míle Buíochas is due to the supporters and volunteers who make an enjoyment and an involvement in the GAA such a major part of their lives.

D'imir 6 cinn de na contaetha atá san iomaíocht lena chéile sa 3ú Babhta Cáilithe 2019 a chéile cheana ar an lá is mó ar fad - níl ann ach bliain ó rinne Áth Cliath agus Tír Eoghain sin (mar a tharla freisin i 1995), seacht mbliana i gcás Mhaigh Eo agus Dhún na nGall agus 49 bliain idir an Mhí agus Ciarraí a d'imir a chéile freisin i gcluichí ceannais 1939 & 1954.

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# ROCHFORD AT THE CENTRE OF CASTLEBAR DRAMA

IF Croke Park are ever short of a marketing slogan, they could do much worse than 'anything can happen in the GAA' as it rings true yet again this weekend with Stephen Rochford at the centre of attention in Castlebar today.

Rochford was clad in the green and red overseeing the fortunes of his native Mayo in Elverys MacHale Park and beyond for the past three years as he brought them within one score of an historic All-Ireland SFC success on two occasions.

Having taken up the position in controversial circumstances after a player heave led to the resignation of Noel Connelly and Pat Holmes, Rochford took the

reins for the 2016 season having led Galway club Corofin to All-Ireland success the previous year.

The Crossmolina clubman brought Mayo through the back door and within inches of ending their All-Ireland famine – stretching back to 1951 – with a drawn decider against Dublin in his first season where two own goals saw Jim Gavin's men survive by the skin of their teeth.

A contentious decision for the replay when dropping subsequent All-Star goalkeeper David Clarke and parachuting Rob Hennelly into the nets backfired as the Dubs would complete backto-back title victories.

There was more heartbreak the following year at the end of ten games – two of which were replays with another two Qualifier games going to extra-time – as Dublin overhauled them in the

"Accordingly, I see no value in meeting with the officers of the board and I am resigning my position as Mayo manager. I thank all those who supported me during the past three years, two of which saw Mayo come so close to winning the All-Ireland title.

"I wish all who will wear the Mayo jersey in 2019 and beyond every success and I look forward to supporting the footballing fortunes of the county."

Little did he know at the time of writing last August that he would have a direct effect on how Mayo fared in this year's championship with today's Quarter-Final Phase 3 clash against Donegal seeing him in the opposition camp.

With Karl Lacey stepping away from his role as Donegal coach – before making a subsequent u-turn – Declan Bonner was on the hunt for a top-class coach and Rochford quickly sprang to mind given his intention to stay active despite leaving Mayo.

Coaching is Rochford's passion and returning as a number two with Donegal allowed him to do what he does best without every added duty that comes with being an inter-county manager.

Rochford explained the

surprise move earlier this year. "When a team with the quality and potential that Donegal have and bring, that makes that decision a lot clearer. Then it was just looking at the logistic elements, were they feasible?" he said.

"Plus, the position as a coach, it doesn't have the intensity of what the ask as a manager would have. When you're dealing with media, the county board, medical teams and players. It's very distinct.

"You know very much what the expectations of your role is as the coach. In that, I was very happy to make that decision. Declan presented a very attractive picture and the vision for his team and the potential that he'd seen close-up.

"So, bringing all those bits together, probably over a three-week period, a bit of talking and sensing around the opportunity that was there, things came together and the rest is history."

Rochford's coaching influence has helped land Allianz
League Division 2 success as well as retaining Ulster and it has been achieved playing a more expansive style than Donegal would have been renowned for in recent years.


Their epic draw against Kerry two weeks ago highlighted everything which makes them a genuine threat to Dublin's 'drive for five' but in order to get that opportunity, they will have to come out alive tonight.

There was always a chance this might happen but Rochford has braced himself and won't be losing any sleep over it.

"I suppose that's something that you won't know until it happens. I wouldn't like it to be in the back door because I wouldn't like to be there in the first place," Rochford said in March.

"If it's in the Super 8s or a more advanced position, so be it, it means both teams are positioning themselves well. If that materialises, I won't have a particular problem with it and certainly would look to embrace the opportunity or challenge that it would present."

No one knows this Mayo squad better than Rochford but while some say he can't lose, can he really win?

# HOME INFLUENCE AMONG FOOTBALL MANAGERS MORE EVIDENT IN 2019

ALL eight competing counties in the All-Ireland quarter-final series have a common denominator - they are all managed by a native or at least someone who has made that county their home.

Given the participants, that's not unusual but it's the first time that all eight managers involved in All-Ireland quarter-finals have fitted that criteria.

Traditionally, Dublin, Kerry,
Tyrone and Cork have always
drawn from within so the
origin of Jim Gavin, Peter
Keane, Mickey Harte and
Ronan McCarthy was always
going to follow these lines.

Mayo, Donegal and Meath have almost always appointed home-grown or home-based managers too with the odd exceptions in each case; Jack O'Shea spent two years with Mayo (1993–94), while Mickey Moran (2001–02) and Seamus McEnaney (2011–12) spent similar periods of time with Donegal and Meath respectively.

But those deviations didn't

last long, hence James Horan, Declan Bonner and Andy McEntee, all past players, manning their county's sidelines this weekend.

Roscommon's propensity for reaching outside for managerial solutions has been more common with John Tobin, Tommy Carr, John Maughan and John Evans all occupying the role at some stage this century.



Like his predecessor
Kevin McStay, the current
incumbent Anthony
Cunningham is not from
Roscommon but now lives
there and had already
managed St Brigid's to a
Connacht club football title.
The merits of seeking a
guiding hand from outside
the county has long been a
source of debate.

On one hand, such a candidate provides a 'clean slate' to players, and can largely make assessments free from local or past influences and experiences. Less populated counties are more likely to take this route, given the smaller pool of resources, and consequently candidates, that they have at their disposal.

On the other hand, appointing within provides instant local knowledge and identity which can, arguably, provide greater motivational points. Deeper knowledge of players' pathways and personalities can also be helpful.

The trend of appointing 'outside' managers has been downward through the decade, with counties now more likely to draw coaching influence from afar instead. In the 2019 championship season, for instance, there were just six managers who fell into the 'outside' category - Terry Hyland (Leitrim), John Evans (Wicklow), Liam Kearns (Tipperary), Paddy Tally (Down), Malachy O'Rourke (Monaghan) and John Maughan (Offaly), the lowest

for many years. Kearns, Evans and O'Rourke have since stepped down.

Rory Gallagher (Fermanagh) and Cian O'Neill (Kildare) are both based outside their native counties but have still managed them in the last two years.

That's quite a drop from 16 at the beginning of the decade and 17 from 31 counties (London and New York excluded) in 2011 when it was at its peak.

On average the number of outside inter-county football managers in this decade has been between 11 and 12. This season Westmeath appointed a native, Jack Cooney, for the first time since 1992 though

Luke Dempsey's roots in Mullingar have been put down for long enough to consider his 2001-2003 reign a 'home' one while Sligo opted for Paul Taylor, their first 'home' appointment since 2007.

'Outside' managers have enjoyed much provincial success but only two, the late Eugene McGee with Offaly in 1982 and John O'Mahony with Galway in 1998 and 2001, have been All-Ireland champions.

Mick O'Dwyer has been one of the more successful imports, guiding Kildare to a first Leinster title in 42 years in 1998 before quickly following up with a second two years later. They haven't won one since. When he was done with Kildare in 2002 he moved down the road to Laois where, within a year, they were Leinster champions for the first time since 1946. In relative terms guiding Wicklow to qualifier wins on successive Saturdays in Aughrim over three Ulster opponents, Fermanagh, Cavan and Down in 2009, not using a substitute once, must rank highly too.

O'Dwyer managed a fourth county away from his native Kerry, Clare for a year, and that has since been matched by Maughan who has been to Clare, Fermanagh, Roscommon and now Offaly, the only manager to contest all four provincial championships.

Paidí Ó Sé managing

Monaghan are other notable
'outside' manager milestones.


Cunningham's Connacht success with Roscommon in June created a further milestone, making him the first manager to complete a provincial hurling-football managerial double, having guided Galway to the Leinster hurling title in 2012.


He's not the first to manage a county's hurling and football teams.

In the past 'Babs' Keating (Tipperary), Liam Griffin and Tony Dempsey (Wexford), Seán Boylan (Meath), Nickey Brennan (Kilkenny) and more recently Pat Gilroy (Dublin) have all done it. Like Cunningham, Denis Walsh (Waterford football, Cork hurling) and Frank Dawson (Antrim football, Down hurling) have managed different counties.

The trend of hiring outside managers in football may be heading in one direction but the crossing of codes, as Cunningham has done, has seen a small spike with former Kerry footballer Kieran Donaghy and Dublin's Dessie Farrell occupying performance coaching roles with the Galway and Dublin hurlers respectively this summer.

Of course, the presence of former Laois footballer and manager Mick





# NEW FORMAT TAKES FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIPS INTO A NEW WORLD

WHEN none of the four provincial champions reached the All-Ireland semi-finals in 2010, there were serious concerns that their status was in such serious decline as to raise doubts about the value of winning them.

ING COME THROUGH THE QUALIFIERS

Roscommon, Kerry, Meath and Tyrone had all arrived in the quarter-finals full of confidence after provincial successes, only to lose to Cork, Down, Kildare and Dublin respectively. What's more, the provincial winners were beaten by a combined total of 28 points, ranging from Dublin's five-point win over Tyrone to Cork's nine-point success over Roscommon.

The qualifiers had struck again, this time more forcefully than ever before as it was the only time that all four provincial winners lost in the quarter-finals. It hasn't happened since either.

Cork emerged as the eventual All-Ireland winners in 2010, joining Galway (2001), Tyrone (2005 and 2008) and Kerry (2006 and 2009) as champions who came through the 'backdoor' to win the title.


That's where it stopped. No qualifier team has won the All-Ireland title since then, with Tyrone (last year) and Mayo (2016 and 2017) the latest to come up short in the final.

At the start of this weekend, Tyrone had already qualified for the semi-finals, via the qualifiers, while Mayo were still in with a chance. Having lost their first two group games, Meath, Cork and Roscommon were out of contention, while the provincial title flags were being flown by Dublin, Kerry and Donegal.

Tyrone have the best record of any county in the qualifiers, not just in terms of All-Ireland titles, but also in actual games won.

They have won 31, lost four and drawn one of 36 qualifiers, a remarkable record by any standards. Their only defeats were against Sligo (2001), Laois (2006), Kerry (2012) and Armagh (2014).

Technically, Kerry, who have never lost a qualifier and Dublin, who lost just one (Armagh 2003) have better records than Tyrone, but they have played only



21 games between them, thanks to their dominance in Munster and Leinster respectively.

It leaves Kerry with a 100 per cent record, Dublin on 90 per cent, followed by Tyrone on 88 per cent off a much busier programme. It's a massive tribute to Mickey Harte that he has been able to reset various squads so consistently after Ulster championship setbacks.


He did it again this year after an usually flat performance against Donegal in the Ulster semi-final, with wins over Longford, Kildare and Cavan. They weren't fully tested in any of the three games, while looking extremely assured and confident in everything they did en route to the quarter-finals.

Two impressive performances against Roscommon and Cork in the group guaranteed them a place in the semifinals ahead of this weekend's clash with Dublin, which, like last year, is in Healy Park.

As Ulster winners, Donegal didn't have to avail of the

qualifier outlet this year, but it has served them pretty well over the years. Indeed, they are in fourth place on the percentage table on 74, having won 20 of their 27 games.

Mayo come next on 73 per cent, followed by Kildare on 70. Interestingly, the Lilywhites have played more qualifier games - 42 - than any other county.

The introduction of the qualifiers brought about the most fundamental change in championship history and there was more to come, with the addition of the roundrobin experiment in the All-Ireland quarter-finals for three years.

Opinion is still varied within the GAA over whether the new concept has a viable future, but then that was always going to be the case. A clearer picture will emerge when the threeyear experiment is over next summer.

One obvious benefit is the spread of games to various venues around the country. Castlebar, Omagh, Navan and Cork host games this weekend which would never have been the case under the old system. And while it's unfortunate that Cork and Roscommon were out of contention after two rounds, the opposite applies in

Castlebar for Mayo v Donegal where both put themselves in line for a semi-final place over the first two rounds.

The excitement generated last year in Newbridge,
Clones, Killarney, Galway,
Roscommon, Omagh and
Ballybofey provided the
championship with a real
boost as they involved some
novel pairings. That they were
played in provincial venues,
rather than Croke Park, added
to the intrigue.

The same applies this year as already experienced before this weekend in Fitzgerald Stadium for Kerry v Mayo, Dr. Hyde Park for Roscommon v Tyrone and Ballybofey for Donegal v Meath. Kerry v Mayo attracted a crowd of 31,312, with many travelling from Mayo to enjoy a weekend in Killarney.

It's a different world to pre-2001 when there were no second chances and no 'round robin' quarter-finals. Back then, it took 31 games - excluding draws - to complete the straight knock-out football championship. This year - barring any further draws - it will have featured 70 games.

Changed times indeed as the great summer carnival heads on its exciting way towards the big climax in Croke Park on All-Ireland final day (September 1.)




# **DID YOU KNOW?**

Donegal team manager Declan Bonner was part of one of the most famous All-Ireland winning full-forward lines in football history, known as "The Killer B's". Bonner lined out alongside Tony Boyle and Manus Boyle in the historic final of 1992 when Donegal won the title for the first time. The Irish Press reported that Bonner has "the game of his life".

Given the regularity of their appearances in Croke Park these days it is perhaps surprising that Donegal did not win their first Ulster senior football title until as late as 1972. Less surprising is that Brian McEniff was a central figure in that surprise win, although the man of the match against Tyrone in the Ulster final was midfielder Seamus Bonner.


Galway, defeated by Roscommon in the Connacht semi-final, re-emerged as All-Ireland contenders in 2001 by defeating Wicklow, Armagh and Cork in the Qualifiers to reach the quarter-final. Pádraic Joyce was the championship's top scorer with the impressive total of 3-45 and went on to be named as Footballer of the Year.

to have contested the quarter-final stages of the championship every year since the new system was introduced. Dublin failed to make the quarter-finals in 2003, with Tyrone and Mayo next on the honours list with 15 and 13 appearances respectively.


Dublin goalkeeper Stephen Cluxton was first introduced to championship football as understudy to David Byrne in 2001 but established himself as first choice for the 2002 campaign. Two of the quarter-finals that year, Dublin versus Donegal and Armagh versus Sligo, were drawn. Dublin and Armagh won the replays and Armagh had a point to spare over Dublin in the semi-final.

Dublin and Tyrone, who have built up one of the great rivalries of the modern game, met for the first time in a quarter-final in 2005. In front of just less than 79,000 spectators they played out a 1-14 each draw before Stephen O'Neill, later to be crowned Player of the Year, inspired Tyrone to victory in the replay.

When Dublin and Kerry met in a stand-alone fixture on the Bank Holiday Monday of August 2009 a grand total of 81,890 paying patrons packed into Croke Park. And they waited just 40 seconds for Colm "Gooch" Cooper to score an early goal. "We were like startled earwigs for the first 15 minutes," said Dublin manager Pat Gilroy as Kerry won by 1-24 to 1-7.




When four Ulster sides qualified for the quarter-finals of the 2003 All-Ireland championship there was a live possibility that there would be an all-Ulster final for the very first time. And so it transpired as Tyrone and Armagh created history and Peter Canavan led his county to the promised land.



Mayo's Lee Keegan has a happy knack of converting important scores in big matches throughout his career but his 1-2 from the wing against Donegal in the 2015 quarter-final in Croke Park earned him the man-of-the-match award ahead of another goalscorer that day, Aidan O'Shea who lined out at full forward.

There is something quite rare and somewhat quaint in the Mayo teamsheet for the All-Ireland final of 1951, their second of two in-a-row. The left-half back is named in all accounts as P.Quinlan and history now shows such a man did not exist. The player was in fact Father Peter Quinn who, as a cleric, was not supposed to play.

The introduction of the Qualifier system to the championship has opened up new opportunities for counties that have not traditionally featured in the latter stages of the All-Ireland series. Fermanagh reached the quarter-finals in 2003 and again in 2004, when they qualified for the semi-final for the first time in their history and only lost after a replay to Mayo.



Prior to the introduction of the round robin groups in 2018, quarter-finals were regularly decided after replays. As early as 2002 two of the quarter-finals were drawn.
Dublin were eventually convincing winners over Donegal, but Armagh just squeezed past Sligo before going on to claim their first and only All-Ireland crown.

Mayo marksman Cillian O'Connor may still be chasing an elusive Celtic Cross but he can look back on a truly astonishing career in championship football. He was top scorer in three consecutive championships in 2013 (which included 3-4 in the quarter-final victory over Donegal), 2014 and 2015 and topped the list again in 2017.

Andy Moran may well be in the twilight of his career but at least it will eventually end with one national title to his name. After appearing in ten finals (seven championship, including a replay and three league) the popular Ballaghaderreen man, who made his intercounty debut in 2003, picked up a major honour in this year's Allianz League.

As part of a major structural revamp quarter-finals were introduced to the All-Ireland senior football championship for the first time in 2001. The provincial champions Kerry, Meath, Tyrone and Roscommon automatically qualified and were joined in the last eight by Dublin, Westmeath, Derry and Galway who came through the new qualifying process.

Since the quarter-finals were introduced only nine eligible teams have failed to make the latter stages of the championship — Waterford, Leitrim, Antrim, Louth, Carlow, Wicklow, Offaly, Longford and London, Clare and Tipperary joined the illustrious line-up for the one and only time in 2016

- Spectators are not permitted to bring alcohol into the ground/area.
- The climbing of walls, stands or other buildings in the ground is forbidden.
- Excessive noise such as that from the use of radio sets and behaviour likely to cause confusion or nuisance of any kind including foul or abusive language is not permitted in any part of the ground.
- Under no circumstances is it permitted to throw any object onto the pitch.
- Unauthorised persons are not permitted to enter onto the field of play and may be ejected from the ground.
- In general, The Ground Management reserves the right of admission.
- The Ground Management reserves the right to refuse admission or to eject any person who refuses to be searched by a member of An Garda Siochána.
- Any person who remains in a gangway may be ejected.
- The GAA event promoters reserves the right for its servants or agents to remove from the ground
  any person who does not comply with the ground regulations or whose presence on the ground could
  reasonably be construed as constituting a source of danger, nuisance or annoyance to other spectators.
- · Smoking is forbidden in enclosed areas of stadium.
- Security Cameras are in operation throughout the stadium.


