The trial rules used will be assessed in the coming weeks and months and it will be interesting to see if some of the open and high scoring football we have witnessed in recent weeks stays with us as the remainder of the season unfolds.

I would like to wish the four competing counties every success and I acknowledge the work of the coaches and backroom teams in preparing them to the standards they have

The experimental rules end this weekend, but I reiterate our commitment to ensuring that Gaelic football is the best game and spectacle it can be and I look forward to the conversation and process ahead.



A MEMORABLE OCCASION FOR ALI

There was relief in the cool Carrick-on-Shannon air. A fifth straight Allianz Football League Division 4 win had been pocketed, promotion secured so a feelgood factor swept on to the pitch.

Families and supporters gathered on the Avantcard Páirc Seán Mac Diarmada pitch to salute a significant achievement.

During the past decade Leitrim had frequently wondered about the possibility of attaining Division 3 status so to accomplish that mission with a victory over London brought plenty of pride and satisfaction.

Terry Hyland steered his native Cavan to exciting league days and on the grass Leitrim well-wishers stopped to acknowledge his work. Since being appointed in the west Hyland has repeatedly spoken about facilitating players, believing that Leitrim simply needed to believe.

The Leitrim manager always felt that Leitrim could make progress. "I did, but I feel there is a lot more potential in them," Hyland remarks.

"There is an awful lot more in that group if they are willing to open up and go for it. At the end of the day we got through a league where we won games by a point where before the performances mightn't have matched the result.

"Even against London the performance probably didn't match the result, but what that means is we have an awful lot more that we can do. Yet we are still achieving results."

Winning six matches from seven ensures Leitrim head for GAA headquarters this afternoon heartened. Acquiring good habits under Hyland's direction has assisted them, but he is adamant that it is the panel, who deserve the plaudits for earning this day out at the lones' Road venue.

"It is themselves, the group drives it,"





the league and in training sessions.

"Probably the best session we had was the Wednesday before the London game which was probably the worst game we had in the league so far, but we still got the result. That is what it is about."

That Leitrim have been able to summon positive results in difficult circumstances is precisely why Hyland is so encouraged and enthusiastic about his current project.

Initially against London in front of an expectant home crowd Leitrim were struggling to convert chances, but they kept plugging away. While Leitrim only managed 1-9 from 27 shots in that game, crucially it was still enough. A refusal to wilt has been a constant theme in 2019.

"I'm delighted for the lads, they have put in a lot of work over the last couple of months so I'm delighted they got across the line," Hyland added about earning a top-two finish.

"Let it be shaky as it was at times. The

created a lot of opportunities we didn't finish off. Nerves seem to come into it more than anything else."

Ultimately it is about improving and trying to leave Leitrim in a better place for Hyland. Already one objective has been realised, but now they enter the next stage. A Croke Park appearance against an able Derry outfit, who carry a flawless 2019 record into today's fixture, is another good test ahead of the championship.

"We have a relatively young squad," Hyland states. "A lot of young lads have come in, they have to learn from the thing as it goes on to see where they can step in to contribute and they can."

Leitrim's blend of youth and experience is dovetailing nicely. Five years ago a Connacht Minor League triumph was a positive sign for Leitrim and a degree of expectation surrounded that crop at U21 level in 2017

flecked with current senior inter-county stars prevailed following a freakish game at Tuam Stadium.

Galway led by 19 points before a gritty Leitrim rally cut the gap to four, but the maroon and white team prevailed.

Seán Andy Ó Ceallaigh, Seán Kelly, Peter Cooke, Michael Daly, Cillian McDaid, Cein D'arcy, and Antaine Ó Laoi have all featured prominently for Galway in Division 1, while Dylan McHugh and Colin Brady were part of the Corofin panel that retained the AIB AII-Ireland Club Championship on St Patrick's Day.

A promising Leitrim crop came close to taking a prized scalp, but talent was being crafted to put alongside the established figures. Emlyn Mulligan, the splendid Leitrim forward, has enjoyed some sweet moments and endured demanding defeats too.

When Leitrim survived a tricky tussle against New York in Gaelic Park last May Mulligan reckoned the team could evolve further in the league. Mulligan is well placed to assess how far Leitrim have travelled in recent months. "The draw was favourable too with the games we had at home and the games we had away," Mulligan admits.

"It was massive to get Wexford and Antrim at home, especially. We knew if we sneaked one or two wins away that we had a great chance. Thankfully it is great to be here

Football matters deeply in Leitrim with Mulligan acknowledging how relevant it is for the county to perform in the capital. "To be representing Leitrim in Croke Park is huge," Mulligan comments. "We aren't going to fill it out, but any person in Leitrim that can get an opportunity to be there will be there. I think it is going to be such a memorable occasion for us all.

"It is coming towards the end for me, I'm 31 now, I'm not getting any younger, I'm not going to get too many more opportunities so it is something I will cherish. I'm really, really looking forward to it."

DIFFERENT PATHS SAME DESTINATION

Donegal and Meath have both arrived at the same destination for today's Allianz Football League Division 2 Final in Croke Park, but it feels like both teams are at different stages of their respective journeys.

For a talented young Donegal team that underscored their potential by winning the Ulster Championship last year, a spring spent in Division 2 after last year's relegation from Division 1 was meant to be a temporary bump in the road.

And even if they clattered through a couple of unexpected pot-holes along the way, they've ended up justifying their short odds to make a swift return to the top flight which is where you sense they belong.

After 12 years of trying and failing to get out of Division 2 in the league, few would have confidently said the same of Meath at the start of this campaign.

So, their presence in today's final and the promotion that goes with it feels like a more significant corner turned in their recent history.

For many of their players it'll be the first time to play a senior game in Croke Park, and for most of them the first time they'll contest a match there with silverware on the line.

"I'd a good chat with Barry Dardis after the game (last Sunday's win over Fermanagh) and we were on the same minor team and were lucky enough to get a few games out in Croke Park," reflected Meath midfielder Shane McEntee earlier this week.

"Then he had an All-Ireland Colleges Final there with St Pat's and as young lads you think, 'This is the norm, this is all we're brought up with.'

"And then you're seven years later and for a lot of us it's our first time back there, certainly with Meath anyway.

"So that's going to be a challenge and it's

special. It's where you want to be and we'd like to think we're going to keep building and try to be here on a more regular basis and not have that big gap."

Meath as a county look like they have solid foundations on which to build now thanks to overhauled underage structures that are starting to produce a steady supply of talented footballers.

McEntee expressed his hope that if the senior county footballers can keep making short term gains then the county's renaissance as a real force in the game will be further accelerated.

Donegal's Stephen McMenamin also spoke at the same Allianz League Finals promotion event and the tone of what he had to say reflected the fact that these two teams are at different points in their journey.

Whereas McEntee expressed a desire to 'keep building', McMenamin made it clear that Donegal believe they're adding the finishing touches to their own reconstruction since the Jim McGuinness era rather than in the midst of a rebuild.

He didn't mind admitting their main aim this year is "to get to an All-Ireland Final", and made it clear he believed they could do just that.


"At the moment, yes I do," said McMenamin.

"The strength and depth we have in the team, no man's place in the team is secure.

"Compared to other years where you sort of knew the team but this year you're looking over your shoulder and nobody is safe at the minute."

The appointment of former Mayo manager Stephen Rochford as team coach this year said a lot about Donegal manager Declan Bonner's ambition for his team.

If you want to bridge the gap that Dublin



have opened up on the chasing pack then no better person to bring into the set-up than the man who has gotten closer than anyone else to knocking Jim Gavin's team from their pedestal in the last four years.

As soon as Rochford's name was brought up in conversation on Monday, McMenamin couldn't disguise his enthusiasm for the impact the Mayo-man has made since joining Bonner's management team.

"Training has been better, having him in there," said McMenamin. "His technique, his ball-skills, your kicking, your hand passing, everything has to be better with him.

"It's not good enough to just go to training, turn up. He wants you to be performing the best you can and I think he gets the best out of everyone at training.

"100% it's definitely making a difference."

Meath might still be building block by block and Donegal putting the finishing touches to their project, but don't expect the Royals to come to Croke Park today happy to be there and fulfilled by the promotion that's already in the bag.

The manner in which they were beaten by Donegal earlier in the campaign grated because it was the latest in a long line of honourable performances against top teams that fell short of the win they wanted and, arguably, deserved.

Last year's one-point All-Ireland Qualifier defeat to Tyrone is stand-out in that regard, and Meath players like McEntee know that if they're to take the next step in their development then they need to start taking a few big scalps.

"Definitely," said McEntee. "I think we are probably still getting over it (last year's defeat to Tyrone) because we still use it as a reference point that that's the level of performance we have to get to in order to be in any way competitive and we have to be better than that again if we want to win games.

"At the end of the day, it's not much good having moral victories and saying 'Jesus, we put in a great shift against Tyrone but we didn't win.' So, it's still referred to, similarly Donegal in the championship the year before, it was a very similar story, a one-point defeat when we felt we could have won the game.

"I think that was one of the things we said going up to Ballybofey this year, that it's not enough to get a moral victory and ultimately, that's all we got in the end."

Today's final provides the perfect opportunity for a measure of revenge and will tell us a lot about just how far down the road this Meath team is in their journey back to the big time.

EXTRA-TIME AND FINISHING GAMES ON THE DAY

Allianz League games that finish level after normal playing times will be completed as follows:

PHASE 1:

Proceed to extra-time as provided for in T.O Cuid II (two periods of ten minutes each way) PHASE 2:

If teams are still level, an additional two periods of five minutes each way will be played. PHASE 3:(PENALTY KICKS/PUCKS)

If still level, a "penalty competition" to decide the outcome:

- Penalties will be taken for goals only.
- The Referee shall choose the end at which the penalty kicks/pucks will be taken.
- Each team shall register five penalty takers, a goal keeper and a substitute goal keeper with the

- Both teams will take five penalty kicks/pucks which are taken alternately by the teams. The game is awarded to whichever team scores more of their five penalty kicks/pucks.
- If, after both teams have taken five penalty kicks/pucks and both teams have scored the same number
 of goals, the penalty competition will continue in sudden death format.



THE DAY COLM MULHOLLAND MET PACKIE McGARTY





In Derry GAA, there will only ever be one Colm Mulholland. And in Leitrim there will only ever be one Packie McGarty. And when the two great men first crossed swords on a playing field, it made for a story that is still being told 60 years later.

It was the occasion of the National League semi-final of 1959. Derry's centre half-back, Colm Mulholland, made his way across the Croke Park pitch, keenly eyeing up his opponent.

As he approached the legendary Leitrim man, Colm stretched out his hand towards the star who had once been selected to play Railway Cup at just 20 years of age.

"You are Packie McGarty," he said. "I

know you and it is an honour for me to mark you. You don't know me. My name is Colm Mulholland, and by the end of this game, you will be sorry you ever heard my name."

Colm Mulholland was a man who displayed his trademark flamboyance both on and off the field. Captain of the Lavey team that won the Derry senior championship in 1954, Mulholland pioneered a defensive clearance, which took the form of an overhead kick, when in a tight spot. "He could kick the ball as far back over his head as most men could kick it facing frontways," said one contemporary.

Captain of Derry minors in 1947, Mulholland played at midfield on the Derry Junior team that won the 1950 Ulster Championship, before being deployed in forward positions for most of his senior intercounty career until 1958. The historic year of '58, the same year that Packie McGarty was carried jubilantly from the pitch by his fellow Leitrim men following the Connacht final versus Galway.

The fact that Leitrim had lost the game makes the instinctive celebration of the county's greatest ever player all the more remarkable. It marked the end of a sequence of games that saw Leitrim lose four Connacht finals in-a-row to a wondrous Galway team.


"My medals are easy kept" shrugged the Leitrim star during an Irish Independent interview in 2015. "I'm as well known for not winning medals as winning them," he added, recalling the period. Ulster final defeats against Cavan (1955) and Tyrone (1957) saw Colm Mulholland travel on a similar road to that famous 1959 meeting between the two men.

It was the great Leitrim writer John McGahern who perhaps summed up what men like Colm Mulholland and Packie McGarty stand for when he wrote 'The local and the individual were more powerful than any Irish identity.'

How true that is. The names McGarty and Mulholland have now passed through two generations and will no doubt breach a third. "It's nice to look back but there's also a sad tinge to it, in a way," said Colm Mulholland recently, still vibrant and smiling.

"The man above is the boss," said McGarty. "We had great matches, ran Galway close. It was my ambition to win with Leitrim but I didn't achieve it. God gave me a good life and a good playing career. That's it."

Derry's Colm Mulholland. Leitrim's Packie McGarty. Two men who remind us that life is not all about the medals that you win, rather it's about the stories that you leave behind.

REGULATIONS Páirc an Chrócaigh

- All persons entering this ground are admitted only subject to the following Rules (which are designated to protect the Health and Safety of all entrants to the ground). Entry to the ground shall be deemed to constitute unqualified acceptance of all of these Rules.

- 6.2 Any unauthorised contact with the boundary wall surrounding the pitch or incursion on to the pitch. Any such unauthorised contact or incursion constitutes a trespass to property.
- The climbing of floodlights or other pylons, stands or other buildings. Such behavior constitutes a trespass to property.
- 6.4 Throwing of objects onto the pitch.
- Remaining or loitering in any gangway or aisle.
- 6.6 Behaving in an offensive or indecent manner.
- 6.7 Bringing of alcohol into the ground.
 6.8 Bringing into the ground of fireworks, smoke canisters, bottles, glasses, cans, flags, banners, poles, distress signals, laser pointers and similar articles or containers, including anything which could or might be used as a weapon.
- 6.9 Excessive noise such as that from the use of radio sets or other appliances and behaviour likely to cause confusion or nuisance of any kind including foul or abusive language.
- If a person commits a trespass, reasonable force may be used to prevent, restrain or terminate any trespass.
- Where a person is in breach of any of these rules, or where the management believes that a person constitutes a source of danger to others, or to the ground, such person may be refused entry or ejected from the ground, and reasonable force may be used for that purpose.





LEITRIM came, saw, but failed to conquer favourites Derry in an entertaining Division 4 final at Croke Park on Saturday.

In only their fifth appearance at Croke Park, Leitrim ended the contest camped in the Derry half, but a ruinous streak of profligacy - which saw them kick nine first-half wides when aided by the breeze - ended their chance of winning a first ever game at headquarters.

"I do think the wides ultimately killed us," acknowledged Leitrim boss Terry Hyland, "We have statisticians and statistics, but the biggest statistic is the scoreboard and if you don't keep that right you can forget about the rest of them."

After a pedestrian start which saw them twice fall three points behind. Derry had Leitrim's number by halftime after holding them scoreless for 15 minutes, during which they scored six points to lead 0-10 to 0-7 at the break.

Punishina

Man of the Match Shane McGuigan - who was the game's top scorer with a 0-6 tally - revealed that Derry had targeted turnovers as a means of punishing Leitrim, who committed a lot of defenders to their attack once they had possession.

"We knew if we could get them turned we would make hay, because there was a lot of space in the forward line and that worked well for boys like me," said McGuigan.

Two of Derry's second quarter points came directly from turnovers achieved deep inside their own half. This strategy, allied to exerting more pressure on Cathal McCrann's previously pinpoint accurate kickouts, vielded a rich dividend.

"We lost four or five of our kickouts just before half-time which handed them possession. We

probably got a bit, shall we say, lazy on the field. We didn't make the runs to create the openings. Cathal (McCrann) can only hit something that's moving and we stopped moving," said Hyland.

"Those things happen in games and that probably came down to a lack of experience and we corrected it in the second-half."

Derry boss Damian McErlean suggested this spell before half-time was when the game was decided.

"I suppose the most pleasing aspect of the performance was the fact that we settled our heads, started to control the game and hit seven points in a row to go in three points up," he said.

"That was the key part of the game for us. The clean sheet was huge, as well as scoring 20 points."

Seven different Derry players hit 16 points from play between them; while Leitrim had 10 different scorers, only Ryan O'Rourke and Evan Sweeney managed to score more than once.

A brilliant save from Cathal McCrann denied Emmet Bradley a Derry goal early in the second-half, but their ability to judge the breeze

and fire over long-range points stretched the Leitrim defence. By the 50th minute they were six points in front and cruising,

Leitrim hung in and had one goal chance which Derry full-back Brendan Rogers dealt with, but the fighting qualities they exhibited pleased Terry Hyland.

"It showed the character of the lads to keep at it. Previously they may not have done that, but this group have been pushing right to the end.

"We have turned over games at the end before. We had a couple of half-chances and might have got a goal which could have swung it back in our favour and we have to credit them for that."

Regardless of the result, the two teams had already achieved their spring target of securing promotion. However, with provincial championship games coming up against Tyrone and Roscommon respectively, there may not be too many more highlights in 2019.

"If we give ball away like that against Tyrone they will just score at the other end. We have loads to take out of the game, but we are by no means the finished article. Facing

Tyrone will absolutely sharpen the focus," suggested McErlean.

For Hyland the challenge of taking on a so-called weaker county was one he could not pass up.

"I once asked the question: What is anybody doing to help the so-called weaker counties?' So when someone asked me to help then I would be the coward had I backed down.

"Facing Roscommon doesn't intimidate us to be honest. We have to prepare properly and go out with the right frame of mind. So it doesn't matter who the opposition are. They are only wearing jerseys the same as everybody else," he declared.
