Welcome to the 2019 Ulster Senior Football Championship and to Brewster Park today where Fermanagh and Donegal meet in the Quarter Final. Another local derby and a repeat of the 2018 Ulster Final will intrigue the supporters from both counties ahead of today's contest.

Changes are to be introduced to the Ulster Senior Football Championship format from 2020 as decided by the Ulster Competitions Control Committee recently. As the two counties which are drawn to play in the First Round in 2019, Tyrone and Derry will not feature in the First Round draw for the 2020 and 2021 Championships. Seven counties will be included in the First Round draw for the 2020 Championship and for the 2021 draw just five counties will be included in the draw for the First Round game. Tyrone and Derry would then return to the draw for 2022.

It is also a day for the stars of the future to enjoy the admiration of their parents and spectators in today's arena where the children of Cumann na mBunscoileanna will display their skills at half time. We also have an Under 20 Regional Football League game between Donegal and Tyrone to look forward to as both counties fine tune their preparations ahead of the Ulster U20 Football Championship.

In 2019, Prostate Cancer has been chosen as the charity for Ulster GAA and we look forward to supporting this very worthy cause. I acknowledge and thank all the Ulster Council and Fear Manach GAA personnel involved in hosting today's games. Everyone plays their part; supporters and stewards, medics, match officials and players, sponsors, local authorities, media, County Boards and Provincial Council.

I also wish all four teams, their County Boards and management every success in their respective outings today and the match officials whose role should never be overlooked. Finally, to you the supporters. Your support and attendance is highly valued and we hope the experience of today will encourage you to join us again at some stage over the summer before the 2019 winners of the Ulster Senior Football Championship will be confirmed.

THE IRISH NEWS

Donegal supporters can whet the appetite for today's big game by having a look at the county's stars of the future in the curtain-raiser.

They take on Tyrone in the Philly McGuinness Cup U20 Football Development League, a welcome addition to the calendar and a timely prelude to the Championship, which begins next month.

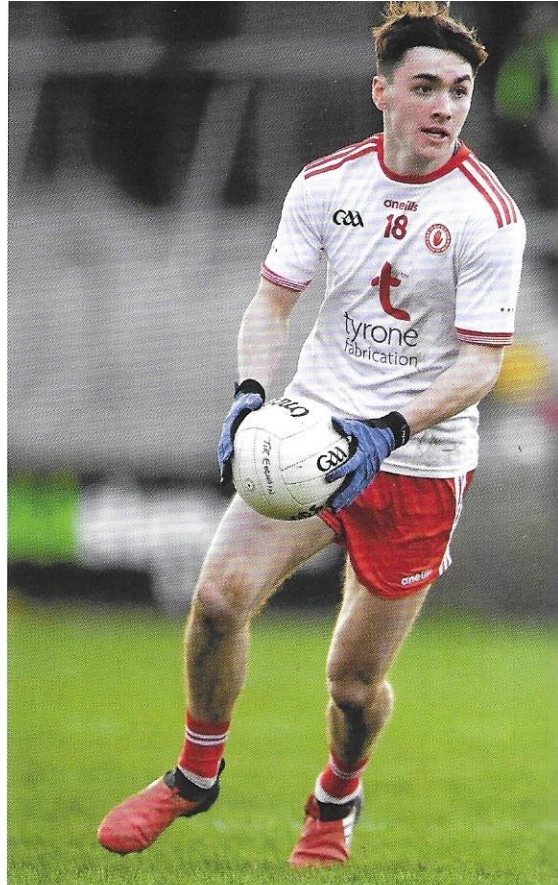
The competition, in its inaugural season, has been named by the GAA in honour of the late Philly McGuinness, a talented Mohill and Leitrim footballer who tragically died after sustaining an accidental head injury while playing for his club in 2010.

Joining Tyrone and Donegal in Group 2 are Mayo and Roscommon, while Group 1 consists of Fermanagh, Sligo, Longford and Leitrim. The section winners will meet in the final on June 15.

Donegal have already played two games, losing out to Mayo before scoring a resounding victory over Roscommon at Hyde Park, with Paddy Dolan and Mark McAteer both hitting hat-tricks in the 8-9 to 2-9 success, and the other goals coming from Colin McFadden and Shane Gillespie.

They will be looking to display that potent attacking sparkle at Brewster Park again today, and with skipper Peadar Mogan, who has been called into Declan Bonner's senior squad, keeping them on the front foot, the emerging stars of Tir Conail are ready to take the next step.

Tyrone, making their first appearance today, have been boosted by the availability of two exciting talents with senior experience, Darragh Canavan and Matthew Murnaghan. They have been released from the senior squad to devote their attentions solely to the U20s, and both will be key figures, as they were when the Red Hands won the inaugural All-Ireland

U17 Championship in 2017. Others who can make telling contributions are Conor Quinn, Cahir Goodwin and Conall Devlin.

Any game between these north-west neighbours, at whatever level, is guaranteed to re-ignite a long-standing rivalry, and most of the opposing players involved this afternoon will be no strangers to each other.

They have crossed swords in the past as Minor footballers and at Development Squad level, and have built up a healthy respect for one another.

Donegal manager Gary McDaid and Tyrone boss Paul Devlin have been working with their squads for several months now, helping talented individuals develop as footballers and working on styles and strategies which they hope will carry them to provincial success and possibly on to All-Ireland glory.

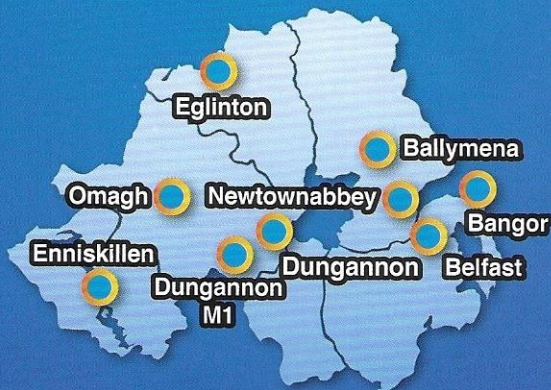

ULSTER FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP FORMAT TO CHANGE FROM 2020

Changes are to be introduced to the Ulster Senior Football Championship from 2020. The Ulster GAA Competitions Control Committee have decided that from next year teams which play in the First Round will be exempt from playing in the province's opening fixture for two years.

Ulster GAA Provincial Secretary Brian McAvoy explained the rationale for the change saying;

"In my Annual Report to the Ulster Convention in January I highlighted the fact that Ulster was the only

province that operated a 'straight' draw and that each of the other provinces had some 'conditions' attached to their Football Championship Draw. While some may validly argue that this is just the luck of the draw, the statistics paint a picture which shows that teams which contest the First Round have a very poor record when it comes to actually winning the Ulster title. On only four occasions has a team that played in the First Round gone on to win the Ulster title; Cavan in 1945, Armagh in 2005 and Donegal in 2011 and 2012."

The decision of the Ulster Competitions Control Committee meant that nine counties were included in this year's draw with Tyrone and Derry being drawn to play in the First Round. Subsequently, they will not feature in the First Round draw for the 2020 and 2021 Championships.

Seven counties will be included in the First Round draw for the 2021 Championship and from the 2022 draw onwards just five counties will be included in the draw for the First Round game.

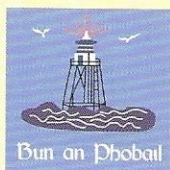

CLG BUN AN PHOBAIL

If a GAA Club is the lifeblood of a community, then for many in the Moville Parish, Brigid Harkin is the lifeblood of CLG Bun an Phobail. Brigid is the ever-present welcoming face at every match, meeting, event, and almost every training session at the club - never happier than when the club is filled with life and activity and always the first to put her hand up and put in the hard work to keep Moville GAA ticking over.

Brigid's story with Moville GAA goes right back to the Club's move to Carrick Field in 1996. Brigid suddenly found herself living next door to a GAA pitch. Encouraged by her friend, neighbour and then Club Chairperson, the much missed Joe McGeady, Brigid began to get involved with the Club, firstly as an avid supporter, and helper, at underage games as her children Geraldine, Aishling and Aidan all played underage for the Club.

Living so close, and seeing the enjoyment her children got from playing (Geraldine would go on to play for the County at both Underage and Senior grades), Brigid soon found herself volunteering to do more at the Club - firstly as an Assistant to Joe McGeady, then as Treasurer (a post she's held since 2007) and much more besides.

For two decades Brigid has performed just about every voluntary role possible within the Club - as treasurer, keyholder, registrar, kit supplier, caterer, first aider, organizer and

probably our most loyal supporter across all the age grades - turning out to support hundreds of Moville teams over the years, home and away.

It is no coincidence that the club has grown and thrived so much over those years. The kind of self-less service that Brigid has given, and the sacrifices of Terry, Geraldine, Aidan and Aishling over the years as their mammy has given so much time to others, is the bedrock of any successful club and strong community.

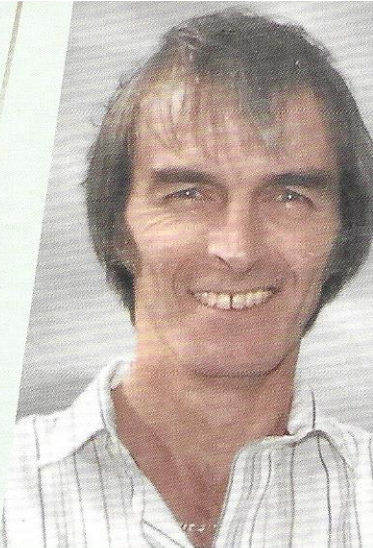
Brigid has put countless voluntary hours into CLG Bun an Phobail and been an enduring presence for at least two generations of Moville Gaels. FRANK McMANUS LISNASKEA EMMETT'S

Frank McManus of Lisnaskea Emmett's is a volunteer of the absolute highest order. From winning two Senior Football Championship medals with his beloved Lisnaskea, four All-Ireland Novelty Scor titles, being on the club committee for over 50 years, helping out with teams from Under-8 right up to Senior level, organising concerts and practically always doing linesman at every Lisnaskea game going.

McManus though is hugely modest in his opinion of what he does, "To be fair I don't think of what I do, I just do it and it's really what I love doing." He continued, "I suppose I have known Gaelic football all my life, from playing for Lisnaskea, to helping out teams and doing the odd concert to raise funds for the club."

McManus who is married to Elizabeth and have four children, Irene is the oldest, while after that comes three boys - Frank, Ruairi and Michael. The well known McManus is known throughout the County for his fantastic sense of humour and his go-to attitude; he is a great personality to be around and always has time for the people of Lisnaskea.

"I don't miss any Lisnaskea or Fermanagh games, I just love the buzz of match day and especially Ulster Championship. For Lisnaskea I have probably seen it all, I have seen us winning Senior Football Championship titles and played in the 1977 and 1980 teams that won the County title, while I have seen us struggle in Division 2, that's football, you always have to take the good days with the bad."

He continued, "My Grandfather, Mick, was one of the key founders of the club back in 1904, I suppose people like him deserve to be remembered and the legacy of people like that done so much for the club that they are the real heroes of the club."

Last season Frank also was part of the management team of Lisnaskea Under-14 team who narrowly lost out in the Feile na nOg Final down in Meath. He was to organise a hugely successful concert in the town that raised money for the Feile squad to get fully kitted out in training gear before the hugely successful weekend.

Success has also followed him into the Scor were he has won four all-Ireland titles at the Novelty act. "I really enjoy the Scor it's a great way of getting out and meeting people, I suppose it's a bit of craic and to be fair we have probably done very well at it."

So from doing linesman, to helping out with the underage teams, McManus was also a pretty handy footballer in his day winning the two Senior Championship medals, he stated, "Football has probably changed a bit since then, it's now much more defensive and teams are so well prepared its really mind blowing how much effort is put into backroom teams now."

Frank McManus is the kind of person you could chat to all day, chatty, friendly and a knowledge of pretty much everything, Lisnaskea Emmett's and Fermanagh are very lucky to have someone like him.

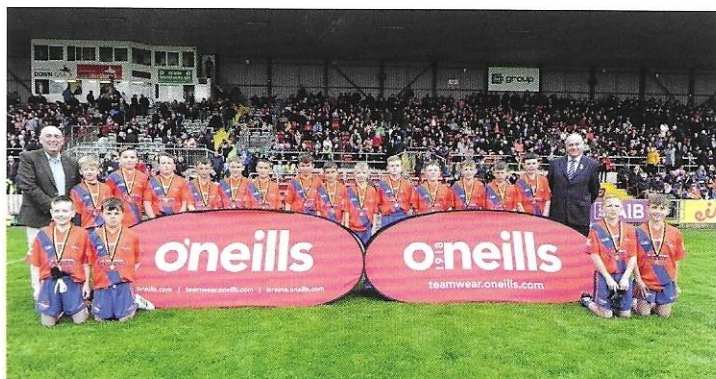

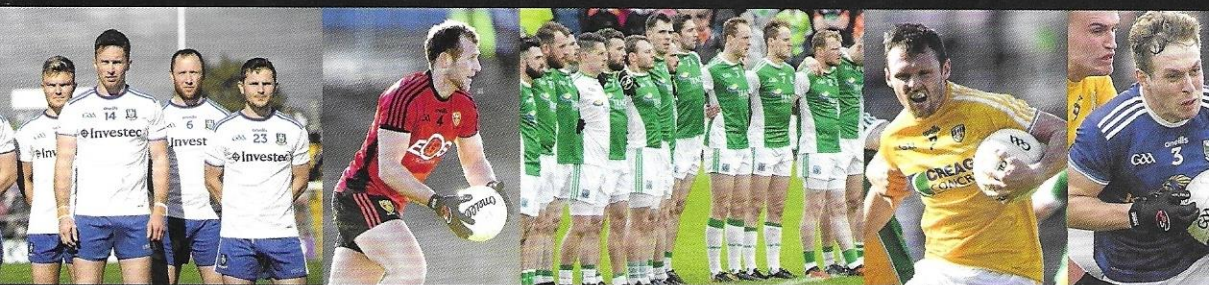

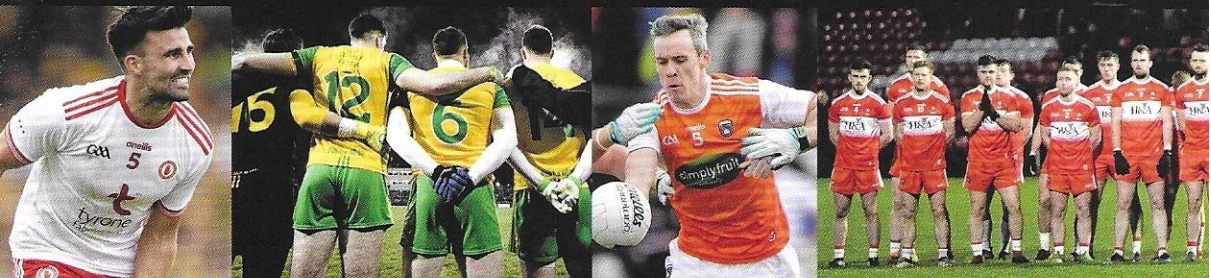

Go on, have a wild guess – when was the last time Fermanagh were beaten in Brewster Park in a league or championship match?

The answer is all the way back in April 2017 (bear with me) when they lost in the last round of league fixtures to Derry, but since then their home record has been virtually impeccable.

Last year they played four league matches at Brewster Park, winning three on the trot before managing a mere draw against Armagh. Subsequent to that, they beat the Orchard County at home in the first round of the Ulster Championship. This year they played three Division Two league matches at Brewster, winning two and drawing one, so by this one simple metric it appears unlikely that Donegal are going to have a field day on Sunday afternoon.

Another major consideration is Fermanagh's astounding defensive record. In their first three league games they limited their opponents to six, seven and six scores respectively, and they finished their Division Two campaign with the best defensive record in the country.

But, as Homer Simpson once mused, statistics can be used to prove anything, and Declan Bonner's team are still favourites to take their place in the semi-finals.

The Division Two league champions seem to sleepwalk their way through the opening rounds, but

the return of Michael Murphy coincided with an up-turn in fortunes as they finished the league with a bang, defeating Meath in the decider at Croke Park.

They have an abundance of quality players at senior county level, but they still seem to rely on their more experienced heads for leadership.

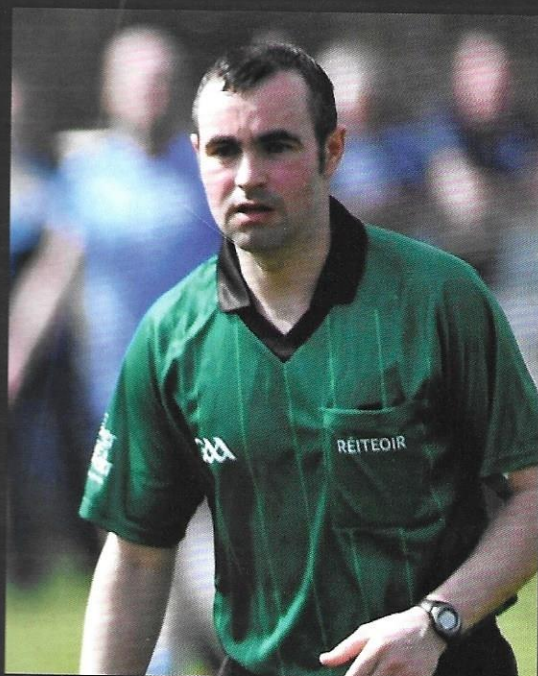
Neil McGee made a record 209th appearance when introduced as a sub in the League Final, and his mere presence seemed to have a calming effect on the rest of the Donegal defence. Joint-captain Hugh McFadden, meanwhile, looked at Michael Murphy with a sense of boyish wonder when they held aloft the Division Two title together, but one suspects they'll need a few

more alpha male figures to emerge if they're to do real damage in this year's championship.

Donegal bucked the trend in last year's championship meeting against Fermanagh when they totted up 2-18 in the Ulster final on a sweltering day at Clones. From that game, Odhran MacNiallais and Martin McElhinney are currently unavailable, but Paddy McBrearty could make his first start of the season after recovering from a cruciate knee injury.

Teenage star Oisín Gallen mightn't make it as he continues his recovery from a hamstring injury, but they should still have enough scoring power in reserve to unpick Fermanagh's defence today.

Etched himself into Fermanagh folklore by rising highest to flick a Hail Mary of a ball to the net in their famous Ulster semi-final win over Monaghan last year, much will again depend on how much influence the Coa colossus can wield on proceedings this afternoon.

Donnelly has been the heartbeat of this Fermanagh team over the last few years and his midfield partnership with Ryan Jones is probably the best chance the Ernemen have of tipping the contest against the Ulster champions in their favour.

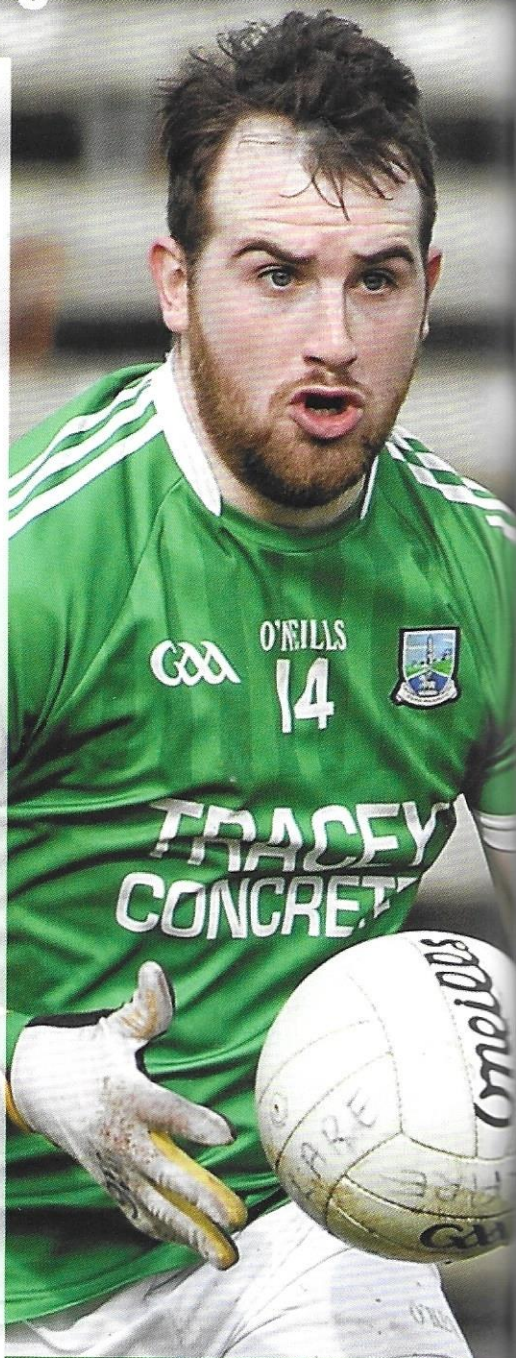

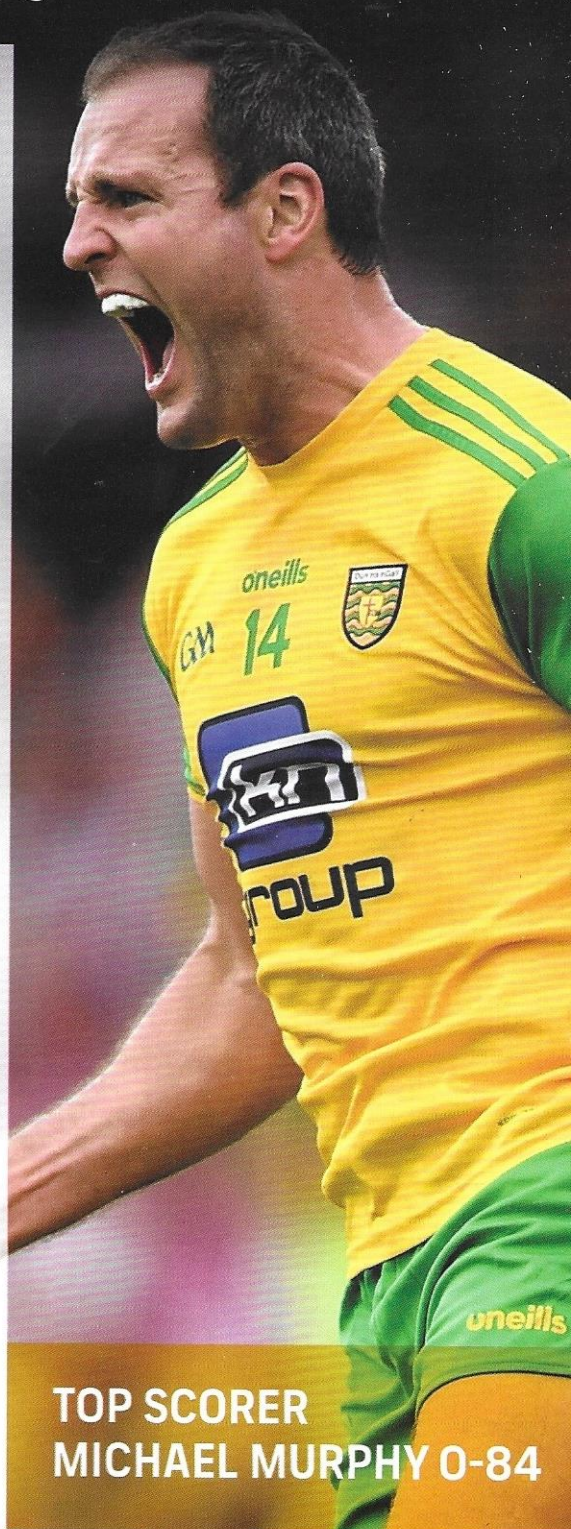

Now in its 16th year, the Academy has in the past been targeted on players in their last year at U-16 level but with the minor grade now at U-17 level, the camp is now focused on players at U-15 level.



ULSTER GAA SUBWAY PLAYER ACADEMY

100 of the most promising football and hurling players from each of the 9 counties in Ulster will be selected to attend.

Throughout the duration of the Academy, the players will benefit from the knowledge and expertise of the Ulster GAA Coaching Development team as well as staff from SINI. They will also gain access to all the top-class facilities within the UU Sports complex.

The players will be afforded the opportunity to improve their own knowledge in different areas which will ultimately enable them to improve their own game, such as:

- Functional Movement Analysis
- Nutrition/Hydration

- Athlete Mental Health
- Activate Warm-Ups
- Player Lifestyle
- Recovery Sessions

In addition, the players are introduced to GPS Analysis where players are monitored on distances they travel as well as speed and areas of the field they cover, while playing small and full sided games.

Additionally, there will be Skill Development field sessions which focus on kicking for possession/scores, tackling/blocking, ball retention/support play, game sense, long striking/striking on the run, high catching and gaining possession.

A leading figure within the world of Gaelic games will give a guest talk to the players on what it takes to get to the top. In the past these have included the likes of Kieran McGeeney, Terence Mc Naughton, Sean Cavanagh, Peter Canavan and Chrissy McKaigue.

Evidence of the impact that the Academy camps have on our young Gaels is provided by the number of past players that have gone on to represent their county from minor up to senior level.

Players such as Michael Murphy, Neill McManus, Paddy McBreen, Tomas Corrigan, Ryan McHugh, Paddy O'Neill and Simon McCrory are graduates of the Academy.

ULSTER GAA "SUPPORTING PROSTATE CANCER RESEARCH"

Over 4500 men in Ireland are diagnosed with prostate cancer annually. Recently in the UK prostate cancer deaths have exceeded breast cancer deaths with over 11,000 men per year dying of aggressive forms of prostate cancer. At present 1 in 8 men will develop a clinically significant prostate cancer in their lifetime with those aged 50 or more (the majority of cases are diagnosed in men aged 65 or older) or with a family history of prostate cancer at increased risk.

Signs & Symptoms

Prostate cancer is often diagnosed when men present to their GP with urinary symptoms including getting up more frequently at night, inability to empty the bladder completely, or going to the toilet more frequently. It is important to note that whilst these symptoms can prompt investigations, more often than not, the symptoms are not a result of the cancer but that of a benignly enlarged prostate. Many men are diagnosed with prostate cancer following routine checks in the absence of symptoms; following a

routine blood test called Prostate Specific Antigen (PSA).

Treatment

Patients with localised disease within the prostate have a number of curative options available to them including surgery, radiotherapy, brachytherapy (seed radiation) and in some instances active surveillance whereby the cancer is low risk but monitored closely for change. For some men, however, prostate cancer can spread to the bones and other parts of the body, leaving the disease incurable. Even with advanced incurable disease newer treatments enable men to live with the disease for many years beyond diagnosis. If you have concerns about yourself or a family member consult with your GP.

Prostate Research at Queen's University Belfast

The Prostate Clinical Research Team in QUB comprises a team of Clinical Research and NHS Consultant Oncologists led by Professor Joe O'Sullivan, Dr. Suneil Jain, Dr. Aidan Cole and Dr. Darren Mitchell coupled

with expert scientific research from the Centre for Cancer Research and Cell Biology (CCRCB). The aim is to improve patient care by leading world-class clinical research. The Prostate Clinical Research Team is internationally renowned, leading the way in innovative trials, shaping the treatment of prostate cancer, increasing survival and reducing side effects from treatment. As well as improving education for patients and healthcare workers the team supervise research from medical students, scientists, physicists and clinical doctors. The team are dedicated to ensuring that our patients and their families have the best treatments at the correct time and that the continued improvements in overall survival continue for men diagnosed with prostate cancer.

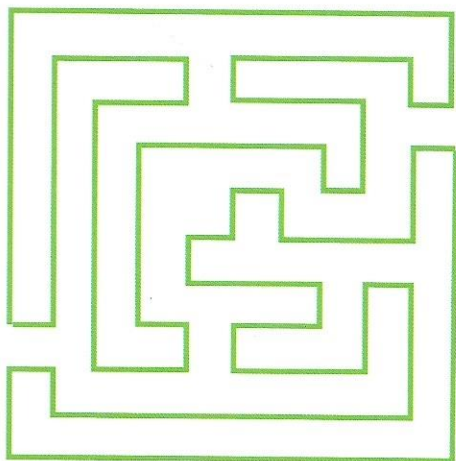

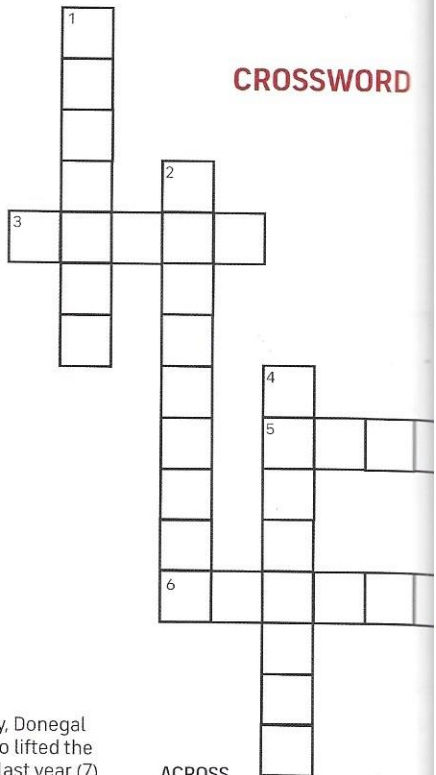

Sadly this year has again seen GAA communities affected by drowning. Whether at home or abroad, we continue to suffer the loss of loved ones.



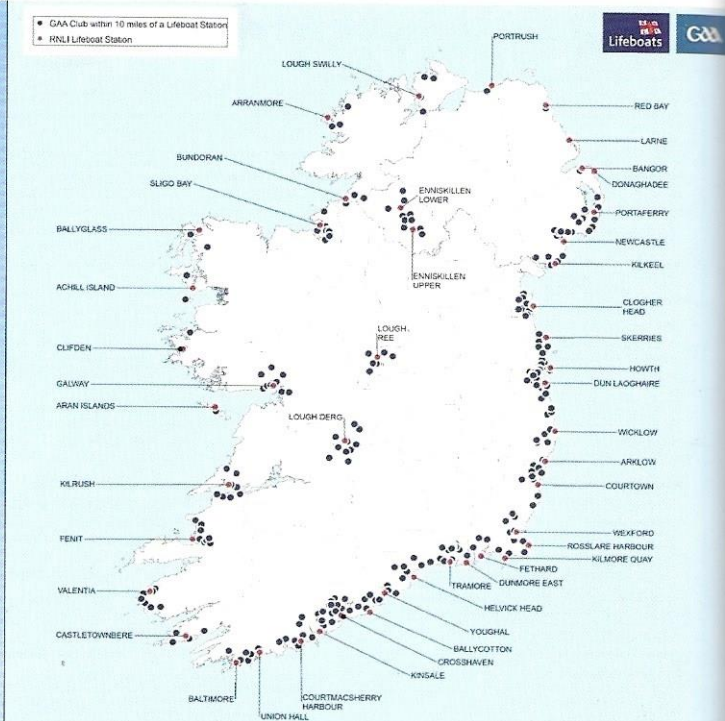
Lifeboats

The Royal National Lifeboat Institution (RNLI) the charity that saves lives at sea and the GAA are working together through the 'Respect the Water' campaign to share life-saving advice, at local and national level, to clubs and supporters throughout the country.

Nowhere in Ireland is far from the water. The RNLI and the GAA share the same core values of community activity and volunteerism. Many clubs are based in coastal communities, with 333 of them in a 10km radius of the 46 RNLI lifeboat stations on the island of Ireland, as shown in the map. Their location makes them ideal for raising awareness of the causes of drowning and how to prevent it.

The RNLI has been active in visiting clubs and meeting with the volunteers, sharing the messages of the campaign and demonstrating how to stay safe in the water. We've also been honoured to have some incredible GAA players as our Ambassadors, who have shared personal stories and given their time and passion to the campaign.

Today is a public show of this partnership on the GAA's biggest stage and an incredible opportunity to raise awareness. With Fermanagh and Donegal both very much water-based counties today is a perfect opportunity to promote the "Respect the Water" message. Research would also indicate that drownings increase in the summer



months and with alcohol and other drugs involved. On this, a May bank holiday weekend, it is very important to heed water safety messages. Keep an eye out for the 'Float' message. Fight your instinct, not the water. Everyone who falls unexpectedly into cold water wants to swim hard and fight the cold. If you find yourself unexpectedly in the water, float until the cold water shock passes before then calling for help or swimming for safety.



GROUND REGULATIONS

- 
1. All persons entering this ground are admitted only subject to the following Ground Regulations and to the Rules and Regulations of the Gaelic Athletic Association. Entry to the ground shall be deemed to constitute unqualified acceptance of all these Rules and Regulations.
 2. Fireworks, smoke canister, bottles, glasses, cans, flagpoles, banners, air horns and other similar articles or containers, including anything which could or might be used as a weapon, are not permitted within the ground, and any person in possession of such an article or container may be refused entry. Should any flag cause an obstruction or present a risk to health & safety, due to the size or type of flagpole used, the GAA reserves the right to have that flagpole removed from the grounds. Flags other than the national flag, Association flag and the flags of competing teams should not be flown from flagpoles at our games.
 3. The consumption of intoxicating liquor is permitted only in authorised places and spectators are not permitted to bring alcohol into the ground.
 4. Smoking is permitted only in designated areas.
 5. The authorised climbing of stands, seats or other buildings in the ground is forbidden.
 6. Unnecessary noise such as that from the use of radio sets, air horns and behaviour likely to cause confusion or nuisance of any kind, including foul or abusive language, is not permitted in any part of the ground.
 7. Under no circumstances is it permitted to throw any object onto the pitch.
 8. Unauthorised persons are not permitted to enter upon the field of play.
 9. Any person who fails to comply with the instructions from a steward may be ejected from the ground.
 10. In general, the right of admission is reserved to the Ground Management.
 11. Any person who remains in a gangway may be ejected from the ground.
 12. The Ground Management reserve the right for its servants or agents to remove from the ground/arena any person who does not comply with the Ground Regulations or whose presence in the ground could reasonably be construed as constituting a source of danger, nuisance or annoyance to other spectators.
 13. Patrons are not permitted to enter the field of play before, during, or after the game.

Bag Policy:

No large bags or backpacks will be permitted in stadia. Smaller bags will be permitted but may be subject to searches and patrons are urged not to bring bags at all, where possible.

Ambulance:

Ambulance cover is provided here today at the rear of the Main Stand.

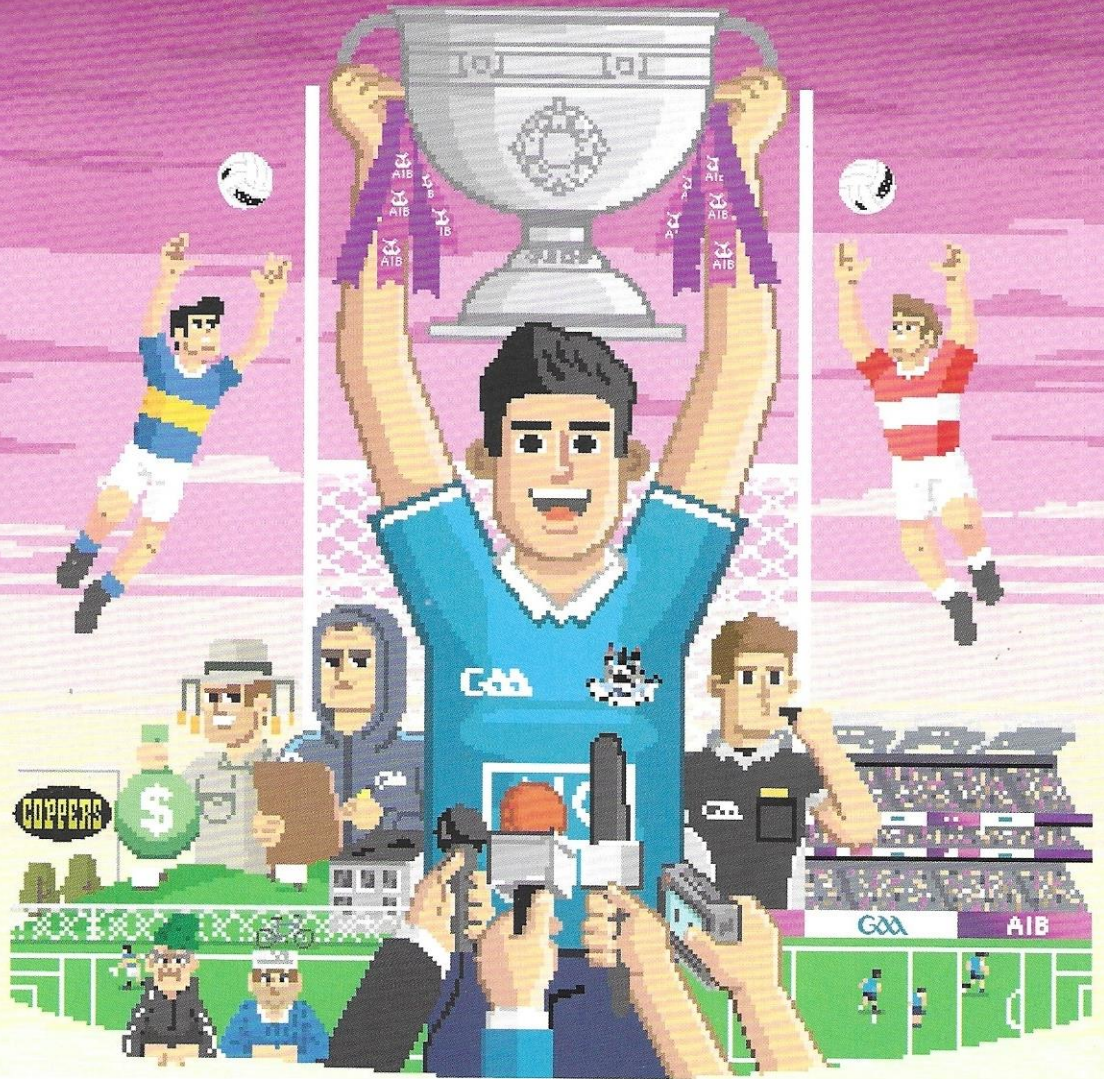
