THE IRISH NEWS

It is always welcoming to see the continued positive steps being taken by Ulster Ladies Gaelic and Ulster GAA in bringing the two codes together and for GAA supporters from Donegal and Tyrone to have the opportunity to watch both their ladies and mens' senior inter-county teams in action together on the one day in the same location and venue.

Maxi Curran's Donegal must defend their title, which they had held for three out of the last four years, without some key players who helped them to a first title in 2015 and again in 2017 and 2018. Yvonne Bonner, after a successful maiden season playing AFLW with Greater Western Sydney Giants, opted to stay on in Australia where she has had her contract renewed for a second season. Aoife McDonnell is also down under while 2017 All Star Ciara Hegarty, Eilish Ward and Roisin McCafferty are other noteable names missing for Donegal this year.

That said, Donegal have no shortage of talent on hand and can still call on the experience of captain Karen Guthrie, who has been in superb form throughout the league, earning her a place on the Division One Team of the Year, Katy Herron, Niamh Hegarty, 2018 All Star Treasa Doherty, Roisin Friel and one of the most dangerous forwards in the country Geraldine McLaughlin.

Curran also drafted in a number of minors at the start of the year, who have more than stepped up to the challenge with Megan Ryan, Amy Boyle Carr among those making a name for themselves as Donegal clinched a Division One semi-final spot.

Tyrone last featured in the senior championship in 2015 and incidentally their last provincial championship fixture was a semi-final meeting against today's opponents, Donegal, who inflicted a 3-19 to 1-7 defeat on the Red Hands on their way to

their first ever Ulster senior title. Tyrone's last final appearance came back in 2013 while you have to go back 10 years, to 2009 for the last time they got their hands on the O'Harte Cup.

There is no bigger challenge for last year's All-Ireland Intermediate champions, Tyrone, on their first foray back in senior football in four years and Gerry Moane's side will be determined to give a good account of themselves. This is the third meeting between the sides this decade, Tyrone won the 2011 encounter while Donegal won in 2012 and that most recent 2015 meeting.

They will look to captain Neamh Woods, who was the sole Tyrone representation on the Division Two Team of the League for continued inspiration and if there is one player who can take the game to Donegal it is the two times All Star. Tyrone will be disappointed not to have qualified for the league semi-finals despite some good performances against senior sides like Cavan, who they drew with on the opening day, Armagh and eventual Division Two champions Waterford, who they lost to by just a few points and a superb victory over Kerry.

They certainly are not that far away but need to be firing on all cylinders and they are not short of the players who can produce match winning performances in Emma Brennan, Maria Canavan and Niamh O'Neill.

Let's hope both counties' supporters have made the trip here to Kingspan Breffni early and will enjoy an afternoon of senior championship football right out of the top drawer.

ULSTER FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP FORMAT TO CHANGE FROM 2020

Changes are to be introduced to the Ulster Senior Football Championship from 2020. The Ulster GAA Competitions Control Committee have decided that from next year teams which play in the First Round will be exempt from playing in the province's opening fixture for two years.

Ulster GAA Provincial Secretary Brian McAvoy explained the rationale for the change saying;

"In my Annual Report to the Ulster Convention in January I highlighted the fact that Ulster was the only

province that operated a 'straight' draw and that each of the other provinces had some 'conditions' attached to their Football Championship Draw. While some may validly argue that this is just the luck of the draw, the statistics paint a picture which shows that teams which contest the First Round have a very poor record when it comes to actually winning the Ulster title. On only four occasions has a team that played in the First Round gone on to win the Ulster title; Cavan in 1945, Armagh in 2005 and Donegal in 2011 and 2012."

The decision of the Ulster
Competitions Control Committee
meant that nine counties were
included in this year's draw
with Tyrone and Derry being
drawn to play in the First Round.
Subsequently, they will not feature
in the First Round draw for the 2020
and 2021 Championships.

Seven counties will be included in the First Round draw for the 2021 Championship and from the 2022 draw onwards just five counties will be included in the draw for the First Round game.













JOHN BLANEYGAEIL FHÁNADA

The club invested in a mower to suit their needs. Newly retired from his job John, once again, stepped up and offered to be the person who would cut the grass and look after the mower. The offer was accepted by the club in the knowledge John would look after the pitch as if it were his own.

John quietly goes about his work, never looking to be singled out, but his contribution to this small club in northwest Donegal is immense. Not alone does John take pride in his work, but in every single boy and girl who dons the blue and white of Gaeil Fhánada.

The aim of the Ulster GAA Disability Inclusion Programme is to work in partnership with other agencies and organisations to enhance the physical health and wellbeing of people with a disability, whilst simultaneously promoting social inclusion through participation.

In the North of Ireland, 21% of people have a disability or long term condition which limits their day-today activities. However, only 15% of people with a disability take the recommended level of exercise compared to 38% of people who have no disability. (NI Census 2011) Ulster GAA has developed a GAA FOR ALL coaching

Will today's game be as good at it looks on paper? It certainly seems that way. The 2018 Ulster champions, Donegal, take on the 2016 and 2017 champions, Tyrone, in a game that most have predicted will deliver the ultimate winners of this year's Ulster Championship.

These are two teams who met in last year's All-Ireland quarter-final knockout stages, the Super 8's for those of us who like catchier titles.

And perhaps most exciting of all, it is a game that pits two teams which possess some of the very best players in the game.

Any time you get a chance to watch Michael Murphy play on the big stage is a treat, and his double act with Paddy McBrearty, who looks

in fine form after recovering from injury, is up there with the greatest GAA partnerships of all time, Tohill and McGilligan, Mugsy and Canavan, Brolly and Spillane.


Yet they aren't the only reason to admire Donegal. Jamie Brennan kicked some delicious scores against Fermanagh, Jason McGee looks like a maestro at midfield and let's not forget about the Rolls Royce that is Ryan McHugh.

Against Fermanagh in the last round, Donegal proved that they can ably deal with a well organised defensive structure. But the challenge changes today. Pit these men against the Red Hand stars and it is fair to expect a stunning encounter.

So far in the championship, Tyrone have pitched up against the division four fodder that is Derry and Antrim, and we've seen just how ruthless they can be. The Oak Leafers were more of a test for Tyrone, and even managed to get their noses in front at one stage. But they were swiftly rebuked, with a scintillating move forward saw Darren McCurry put Tyrone back in front.

The same happened against Antrim when, in the second half, the Saffrons dared to get closer than ten points, and Tyrone went route one, found Conor McAlliskey who thrashed the ball to the net. It was as much a reminder to Mickey Harte as it was to Antrim. Tyrone have a wealth of talent, all of whom want a starting jersey, but who will spring from the bench and put on a show for their manager.

It is for that reason, that depth of talent, that Tyrone should be considered favourites, and they should earn victory today, their fourth in a row against Donegal.



2018 All-Ireland Ouarter Final Phase 3

Donegal 1-13 Tyrone 2-17 at Ballybofey

This result was famous as it was Tyrone's first championship win in Ballybofey since 1973. Donegal also had been unbeaten at Páirc MacCumhaill for 21 games since 2010, until this result.

Despite having opted to play with the wind in the first half, the Red Hands were trailing by 1-6 to 0-6 after Michael Murphy roofed the ball to the net from a Ryan McHugh pass. Michael McKernan's black card in the first half had unsettled Tyrone, but the move of putting Mattie Donnelly on Ryan McHugh was a good one, and they put Donegal under increasing pressure. And they kept the pressure on, and the goal from Harry Loughran gave them the lead, and more points from Brennan and Ronan McNamee delivered victory.

Tyrone went into this game as odds on favourites, however there were some pundits who fancied that Donegal could turn Tyrone over. The doubts about Tyrone came from the low scoring returns from their forward line.

But the Red Hands cut loose in this game at Clones. At half time they led by 0-12 to 0-5. In the opening stages, the game was back and forth, with Paddy McBrearty and Michael Murphy exchanging points with David Mulgrew and Mattie Donnelly. Both teams had goal chances, Mark Anthony McGinley saved Sean Cavanagh's effort while Eoin McHugh pulled his effort wide. Both teams were playing the counter attack to full effect but Tyrone did better at the turn over and that earned them a big lead.

In the first half it was the defenders like Padraig Hampsey and Peter Harte who gave them the lead. In the second half Tyrone stayed in front. Micheal Carroll got a goal back for Donegal but Tyrone hit back with scores from Ronan O'Neill, Niall Morgan and Declan McClure.


Tyrone 0-13 Donegal 0-11

Heading into this final, Tyrone pointed to their sorry record against Donegal as reason to be concerned. They had lost to Donegal in 2011, 2012, 2013 and 2015. 2007 was the last time that Tyrone had defeated Donegal in the Ulster Championship when goals from Colm McCullagh and Raymond Mulgrew delivered semi-final victory.

For periods during the 2016 championship, it appeared that Donegal were going to serve up a similar fate for their neighbours. At half time Tyrone were behind by 0-7 to 0-4 and Mattie Donnelly and Cathal McShane had been black carded. In the second half, Tyrone improved and got the game level, but Odhran MacNiallais got Donegal back in front.

Sean Cavanagh equalised then Michael Murphy put Donegal ahead. Back came Tyrone, as Darren McCurrry hit the equaliser with minutes to go. Christy Toye made it 0-11 to 0-10. With six minutes of injury time gone, Donegal fans were desperate for the final whistle. Step forward Sean Cavanagh who hit an inspired point. Michael Murphy had a chance to put Donegal ahead but he missed a long range free. And that miss was punished as Peter Harte and Kieran McGeary earned Tyrone's first Ulster title since 2010.

The 'Code' is a policy document developed and agreed by the Gaelic Athletic Association, the Camogie Association, the Ladies Gaelic Football Association, GAA Handball Ireland and the Rounders Council of Ireland to assist all units of the Associations to create and maintain an enjoyable and the safest possible environment in which our Children and Young people can participate in Gaelic Games and Activities.

In following and implementing the guidelines in the Code, we strive to achieve the highest possible standards in our work with children and young people and to ensure compliance with both legal and best practice requirements placed on us.

Within the Code is a booklet titled 'Maintaining Appropriate Levels of Behaviour in our Work with Children and Young People' which addresses the minimum levels of behaviour, practice and conduct required from our Young Players, Coaches, Supporters, Parents/Guardians, Referees and Clubs and from those who work with them on our behalf.

This Code applies to all young players under 18 years of age, and those who assist them in the preparation and playing of our games, regardless of competition or age groups. Clubs and County Boards who are responsible for organising our games at local level are obliged to implement the Code of Behaviour in the preparation of their teams and players for all competitions and at all levels including Club blitzes, inter Club games, County development squads and inter County games.

Should a breach of the Code be alleged, or when people may refuse to adhere to the contents of the Code, certain actions may be deemed necessary and appropriate so as to protect the integrity of our work with children and young people and also to ensure that they receive the best possible care, attention and protection while participating in our Games.

The Children's Officer shall have a central role to play in promoting and implementing the Code at Club and County level and if called upon to assist in processing breaches of the Code as appropriate.

The Code is available from the Safeguarding section of Ulster GAA Website http://ulster.gaa.ie/safeguarding/resources. It is recommended that there is a 'sign up' procedure, whereby Young Players, Coaches, Supporters, Parents/Guardians, Referees and Clubs agree to abide by the Code on an annual basis and a copy of the signed document should be retained by the Club Children's Officer.

The Ulster champions' uptick in form during the National League coincided exactly with Murphy's return to the side. After losing against Tipperary and Fermanagh, Murphy made his first appearance of the spring against Armagh and scored a goal in the win. Subsequent victories against Cork and Kildare saw them into a final against Meath in which Murphy starred.

Against Fermanagh in the Ulster Championship opener he was more often than not tasked with a 'quarterback' role, scanning the massed Erne defence looking to pick a way through. He did that as the fulcrum of Donegal's attack and, when he was able to get himself into a little. space, he punished with points. Murphy can hurt you whatever way he plays - and Tyrone won't need telling.

Let's hope you haven't arrived at this page in the programme looking for anything approaching originality. But Donnelly, like Murphy, is an obvious selection because of how obvious his impact on his side is game after game.

The Tyrone captain was substituted just seven minutes into the second half of their quarter-final win over Antrim - but it wasn't because he was playing badly. The Trillick man was taken off along with Peter Harte and Cathal McShane – who could equally be feature men here - because the game was in the bag and Mickey Harte didn't need to take any chances with three of his key performers.

Donnelly roamed the Athletic Grounds pitch, making scores and registering three himself. In a tighter first round win over Derry he didn't get on the scoreboard was still an influential creator, especially in the first half. Like Murphy, Donnelly can be a multi-dimensional match-winner. Just to state the obvious.





The Ulster GAA Championship is an exciting time of year both for players and their supporters. We know roads will be busy with supporters travelling to and from matches.

As Tyrone and Donegal prepare to contest today's semi-finals, Ulster GAA are promoting their "Live to Play" initiative, asking GAA supporters to ensure they stay safe on the roads.

Tiredness not only negatively affects players' performance, but it can also seriously impact motorists' ability to perform behind the wheel. Driver fatigue is estimated to contribute to 1 in 5 deaths in Ireland. If you do become tired while driving follow these three steps: STOP, SIP and SLEEP stop your car in a safe place, sip a caffeine drink, and sleep for 15-20 minutes. This should enable you to continue driving for another hour or so but remember the only way to fight fatigue is a good night's sleep. Where possible, take turns carpooling driving to and from games which will help share the burden. As a driver you have a responsibility to be disciplined. Say no if asked to give a lift home to another supporter if the car is already full. You should only have as many people in your car as you have seatbelts. Everyone should wear a seatbelt as it significantly increases your chance of survival if involved, in a collision.

We know that alcohol and other drugs negatively impact sports performance and we also know that they can have devastating effects on our roads. Never drive under the influence of drink or other drugs, and never get into a car with a driver who you suspect has been drinking or has taken drugs.

Road Safety Officer with Donegal County Council, Brian O'Donnell welcomes the promotion of road safety today; "Too many lives are being lost on our roads. All too often, relatives and friends are having to come to terms with the dreadful loss of life of loved ones which will change their lives

forever. Road safety is everyone's responsibility and ultimately it is up to all road users to be aware of the dangers, and to treat the roads with the respect they deserve. Too often motorists take a risk and make the wrong decision. Is that risk worth a life?"





ULSTER GAA "SUPPORTING PROSTATE CANCER RESEARCH"

Over 4500 men in Ireland are diagnosed with prostate cancer annually. Recently in the UK prostate cancer deaths have exceeded breast cancer deaths with over 11,000 men per year dying of aggressive forms of prostate cancer. At present 1 in 8 men will develop a clinically significant prostate cancer in their lifetime with those aged 50 or more (the majority of cases are diagnosed in men aged 65 or older) or with a family history of prostate cancer at increased risk.

Signs & Symptoms

Prostate cancer is often diagnosed when men present to their GP with urinary symptoms including getting up more frequently at might, inability to empty the bladder completely, or going to the toilet more frequently. It is important to note that whilst these symptoms can prompt investigations, more often than not, the symptoms are not a result of the cancer but that of a benignly enlarged prostate. Many men are diagnosed with prostate cancer following routine checks in the absence of symptoms; following a

routine blood test called Prostate Specific Antigen (PSA).

Treatment

Patients with localised disease within the prostate have a number of curative options available to them including surgery, radiotherapy, brachytherapy (seed radiation) and in some instances active surveillance whereby the cancer is low risk but monitored closely for change. For some men, however, prostate cancer can spread to the bones and other parts of the body, leaving the disease incurable. Even with advanced incurable disease newer treatments enable men to live with the disease for many years beyond diagnosis. If you have concerns about yourself or a family member consult with vour GP.

Prostate Research at Queen's University Belfast

The Prostate Clinical Research Team in QUB comprises a team of Clinical Research and NHS Consultant Oncologists led by Professor Joe O'Sullivan, Dr. Suneil Jain, Dr. Aidan Cole and Dr.Darren Mitchell coupled

with expert scientific research from the Centre for Cancer Research and Cell Biology (CCRCB). The aim is to improve patient care by leading world-class clinical research. The Prostate Clinical Research Team is internationally renowned, leading the way in innovative trials, shaping the treatment of prostate cancer, increasing survival and reducing side effects from treatment. As well as improving education for patients and healthcare workers the team supervise research from medical students, scientists, physicists and clinical doctors. The team are dedicated to ensuring that our patients and their families have the best treatments at the correct time and that the continued improvements in overall survival continue for men diagnosed with prostate cancer.





ulster GAA is inviting all GAA clubs in the Province to register online for its Club Maith accreditation scheme.

Club Maith is a development gurney, not an end result. It helps clubs 'get themselves in order' through benchmarking against best practice. In doing so it encourages them to aim for excellence in the core areas of GAA club activity, namely: Governance; Community Engagement; Coaching & Games; A Safe Environment and Safeguarding Members. Club Maith is not a destination but an approach to club development that is relevant to, and can be adopted by, all.

Ulster GAA in association with Klubfunder have now launched a new online portal aimed at streamlining the process and improving the experience for clubs seeking to attain Club Maith Accreditation.

To obtain accreditation, clubs are asked to provide evidence that they meet a series of criteria. This is done by uploading evidence onto the newly created online portal and by demonstrating good practice at a club visit conducted by an allocated Club Maith Facilitator.

There are four levels of award, Bronze, Silver, Gold and Platinum and a pathway has been introduced in which clubs are required to be accredited at each stage before progressing.

Accreditation lasts for 3 years at which point the club will complete a re-accreditation exercise.



While Donegal were convincing winners, they will have to be even more clinical on Ulster final day, given that Cavan amassed 23 points in their replay win over Armagh on Sunday.
