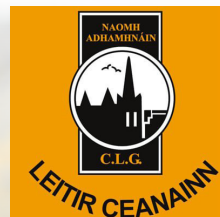

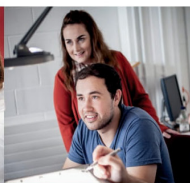
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Fáilte on Cathaoirleach

Ground Regulations

01. All persons entering this ground are admitted only subject to the following Ground Regulations and to the Rules and regulations of Cumann Luthchleas Gael. Entry to the ground shall be deemed to constitute unqualified acceptance of all these Rules and Regulations.
02. Fireworks, smoke canisters, gas- horns, bottles, glasses, cans, flags, banners, poles and other similar articles or containers, including anything which could or might be used as a weapon, are not permitted within the ground and any person in found to be in possession of such an article or container may be refused entry or ejected from the ground
03. The consumption of alcohol is not permitted within the ground and spectators are not permitted to bring alcohol into the ground.
04. The unauthorized climbing of any structure, walls or buildings in this ground strictly forbidden.
05. Unnecessary noise from the use of radio sets, gas-horns and behavior likely to cause confusion or nuisance of any kind, including foul or abusive language, is not permitted in any part of the ground.
06. Under no circumstances is it permitted to throw any object the pitch.
07. Unauthorised persons are not permitted to enter upon the field of play.
08. Any person who fails to comply with the instruction from a Garda or Steward may be ejected from the ground.
09. In general, the right of admission is reserved to the Ground Management.
10. The Ground Management reserves the right to refuse admission to or eject any person who refuses to be searched by a member of the Garda Síochana.
11. Any person who remains in or obstructs a gangway or circulation area may be ejected from the ground.
12. The Ground Management reserve the right for it's servants or agents to remove from the ground any person who does not comply with the Ground Regulations or whose presence in the ground could reasonably be construed as constituting a source of danger, nuisance or annoyance to other spectators.
13. All persons in the grounds are reminded of their obligation under Section 18(3) of the Fire Services Act 1981 to ensure that their behaviour does not present a danger from fire to anyone using the grounds.

Trophy Presentation Guidelines

Covid Guidelines advise the physical handing over of cups be avoided. Instead the winning captian trophy should lift the trophy directly rather than it being presented to him. Trophies should remain in the presentation area once the captain has completed his speech. Special attention will be paid to facilitating speeches. The sharing of microphones will be avoided; with two people speaking there will be two microphones available to avoid their sharing.

County Boards were advised to retain trophies until a later date after the presentation is completed but CLG Dhún na nGall have decided to allow the winning team to retain the Intermediate Trophies. It is expected, however, that the clubs will be sensitive to Covid guidelines in the use, and sharing, of the trophy.

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Killybegs - Winners of Greatest Ever Donegal Senior Championship in 1996

(Peter Campbell - Donegal Democrat)

The 1996 Donegal senior championship was probably the greatest ever championship in Donegal with Killybegs having to play nine games to win their fourth title of the '90s, and for most of the team, a fifth title, having won also in 1988.

The South and South-West had something of a monopoly on the senior championship in the early and mid 1990s and this was certainly borne out in 1996. Games were hotly contested with little between the powerhouses of Killybegs, Aodh Ruadh, Kilcar, Ardara and Naomh Columba, who kept battling to finals, only to invariably meet Killybegs or Aodh Ruadh.

In 1996 Killybegs, under the management of Pauric McShea, started out losing to Aodh Ruadh in Fintra but turned it around in Fr Tierney Park to take it to a third game. It ended all square in Tirconaille Park and it took extra-time in a fourth game to separate them. And just when Killybegs thought it might get easier, they needed three games to get to the semi-final as a Jonathan Boyle-inspired Ardara put up great resistance. They overcame Kilcar in the semi-final with Naomh Columba awaiting in the final.

The decider was played in atrocious conditions on the last Saturday in September in MacCumhaill Park (due to the infamous All-Ireland final between Meath and Mayo replay on the following day). By that stage Killybegs and Naomh Columba were meeting for the fourth time in a final, and it was no surprise that there was just a point between them at the finish - Killybegs 1-8, Naomh Columba 1-7.

The match report in the Democrat was in no doubt that Killybegs were worthy winners, having done the spadework in the first half. Manus Boyle, not for the first time, was central to their win, hitting 0-7 in total, while also setting up the first point for Barry Cunningham and it was his 50m free that led to the Killybegs goal, Paul Callaghan fisting to the net in the 8th minute.

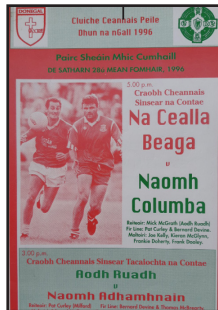
Five Manus Boyle points left Killybegs ahead by 1-6 to 0-2 at half-time. Naomh Columba, as was their way, fought back. Paddy Hegarty won a penalty for Noel to goal while a



minute earlier David Meehan had denied Eugene Doherty.

Substitute Michael Byrne cut the lead to three but Manus replied with his 6th and 7th points to lead by four with nine minutes left. Seamus Carr again cut the lead as John Cunningham was dismissed on a second booking. Naomh Columba tried to the finish with two Noel Hegarty points but again they came up short.

FOOTNOTE: The 1996 Co final programme had an interesting article on the scoring records of both teams in the 1995 and 1996 campaigns.

Manus Boyle finished with an incredible tally of 4-55 in nine championship games in 1996 - almost 7.5 points per game. He was also the leading scorer in the Donegal 1995 championship with 0-21. Pauric Gillespie was Naomh Columba's top scorer in 1996 with 2-28 but he was kept scoreless in the final."

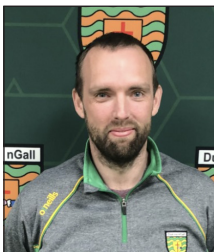

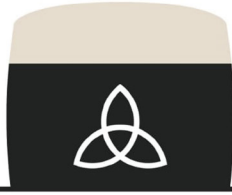

The Great John “Spud” Murphy

“Wait till I tell ya!” The great John “Spud” Murphy is in full flow in Donegal Town. Donegal Bay is as flat as a silver coin below John’s well appointed home on the Old Golf Course Road as this seanchai, storyteller and general seer talks about his great passion for all things Donegal GAA. For John has been faithfully following Donegal for 85 years since back in 1936! His home is a museum of memorabilia to the past that this very alert 90-year-old has faithfully preserved in homage to his beloved Tir Chonail. His living room is strewn with photographs and memories of times past, of sepiá tinted heroes who wore cloth caps and often cycled to play all over Donegal.

It is all here, Donegal in all its triumphs and tragedies in the home of probably the county’s greatest GAA fan. The stats don’t lie as he has been at every Donegal county final since 1940 and every All-Ireland final from 1953 to 2014. “I got into a car with Sean Slevin, Robbie McShea and Hugh Daly, who was county secretary in 1953 and the first thing Hugh did was to hand me my first ever All-Ireland ticket. “I was high up in the crow’s nest in the Cusack Stand and you were nearer Heaven than you were Croke Park.” He hasn’t missed an Ulster final since 1946 and had 62 All-Ireland’s in a row. And even though his eyesight is not quite as good as it was, John’s forensic memory, ability to simplify the complex, and dole out a telling line remain undimmed. He does not just give you the year of a particular event, but the actual date as well. Also, there is no need to ask too many questions for listening to John is like walking down a winding pleasant country road of golden memories, as he segues from one major event to another, from one major team to another and all capped with pithy observations.

His great memory stretches back to his early childhood days where he was born in Ballyhaunis in County Mayo in August 1931 and seeing the first ever Mayo team coming home with the Sam Maguire in 1936. “I was only five, but when I saw so many grown men crying in delight, I was a GAA man.” Thereafter his life is a tale of two south Donegal towns. John and his family came to live in Chapel Street in Ballyshannon in October 1936, and he later moved to Donegal Town to live in and around 1960 where he rose to the rank of Post Master. “I have never left this county since, except to go on holidays”.

In between, he was a dedicated and hardy corner back for his truly beloved Aodh Ruadh, served as secretary in the 1950s, and was also a county board delegate in the 1940s and 1950s. When he moved to Donegal Town to live in 1959, after coming to work there in 1950, he was a very active treasurer, county board delegate and once went for the post of county treasurer in 1966. John also ran a very successful bingo and was heavily involved until 1973. But his early youth in the 1940s was filled with Aodh Ruadh giants like John “Dodger” McDermott Mick Melly, Bob Gallagher, Red Jack Gallagher, Mick Slevin, P J Goan, Jim “The Natch” and Dan “Gulliver” Doherty, to name but a few.

“In every decade Ballyshannon had at least one footballer that played Railway Cup football going back to the 1920s” he said. They also took county titles as regularly as tea and John has kindly given the “Post” a lend of a photograph of the 1945 team that won the Democrat Cup. Ten years later John was a very proud member of another Aodh Ruadh team that won a Democrat Cup in 1955. He played until 1960 when he moved to Donegal Town. In a parallel but very important universe John followed the great Donegal teams of

those cloth-capped years. Apart from his Aodh Ruadh heroes he saw the legendary Hiudai Beag Gallagher, Peadar McGeehin, Cookie Boyle, the O’Donnell’s from Dungloe, and Big Frank O’Donnell, the ex principal of Rockfield NS who used to play with Aodh Ruadh in the winter time and then head back down to Towney to play with his native Kilcar in summer.



John has been there on all the big occasions, at the NFL semi-final in 1952 when Donegal made their first ever appearance in Croke Park against a star-studded Cork team that included three Kerry men, who went on to play for their own county the following year and win an All-Ireland title. He was there in 1954 when Kerry beat Donegal in the All-Ireland Junior final and his neighbours Jackie McDermott played a blinder for Donegal when he was moved to midfield from goals for the second half. John saw the first ever Donegal team to reach an Ulster Final in 1963 when they were demolished by Down before a huge crowd in Breffni Park. Three years later he saw Aodh Ruadh’s Mickey McLoone captain a much better Donegal team to another Ulster final against Down. Donegal could have won this one and to say that John was not happy with the way Joe Lennon marked Mickey McLoone that day is putting it very mildly.

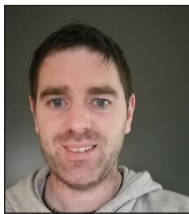
For John, Frankie McFeely from Ballybofey is a true Donegal great and certainly the county and country’s greatest ever midfielder and it was a very emotional day for John when the elegant McFeely collected the county’s first ever Anglo Celt trophy. John was there in 1974 when Pauric McShea was captain, in 1983 with Mickey Lafferty and in 1990 when Anthony Molloy raised the Anglo Celt high. And the decision to play Manus Boyle at left corner forward was key to the county winning its first ever All-Ireland title in 1992, is John’s firm belief. That was a great team as was a different type of team that took the title under Jim McGuinness in 2012. Paths to the Final

The draw for the Senior Championship placed three of the four favourites - Gaoth Dobhair, St Eunans and Naomh Conaill - in the same pot but the Cathedral men's happiness was tempered when they were drawn for their first game at home to Kilcar. Leading well at half-time they succumbed to a second half comeback from Towney men to go down 1-10 to 1-12. Nor were they convincing against Termon or Realt na Mara, who are now contesting the Relegation final, only pulling away against both late in the game. A very convincing win against an up-and-coming Aodh Ruadh, however, in Round 4 gave a better indication of where they were heading in the competition.

Naomh Conaill also failed to light up the headlines during their Championship league campaign. In their opening game they had just three points to spare 0-11 to 0-8 against Glenfin. In Round 2 a whirlwind opening against Aodh Ruadh put them in command but the Ballyshannon side hauled themselves back and were deemed unlucky to have only shared the points, scoring 1-10 to Naomh Conaill's 2-7. It seemed the jolt the reigning champions needed when they ran 1-20 past Termon, who managed six points, in Round 3 but seem to falter again in Glenswilly a goal being the difference between the sides.

In contrast to Naomh Conaill and St Eunans, the other perceived giants of Donegal championship football, Kilcar and Gaoth Dobhair, strolled through the league stages. Thus, the quarter-final draw looked daunting for Naomh Conaill when they drew Gaoth Dobhair in the quarterfinal and the winners of Kilcar and Sean MacCumhail in the semi-final, if they made it that far. Gaoth Dobhair never really got out of the blocks as Naomh Conaill conjured a commanding performance very much at odds with their earlier form. In the semi-final they showed this was no flash in the pan. Only three points separated them from Kilcar and the side in blue and gold had a late goal dis-allowed but few would dispute that Naomh Conaill were very much on top at crucial junctures in the game and particularly during the second half.

St Eunans were generally seen as having the easier side of the draw. Naomh Naille were reduced to 14 men very early in their quarterfinal and Eunans left it late to power to an expected victory. A Naul's goal levelled matters - 1-3 to 0-6 - coming up to the second half water-break but the Cathedral town team took command to run out 2-12 to 2-5 winners. In the semi-final, their opponents St Michaels hopes of an upset faded when a key defender saw red early in the second quarter. Eunans only had five points to spare at the end but never looked in bother in a game played in atrocious conditions.

And so to the final. St Eunans have failed to hit top gear against 14-man opposition while having impressed mightily in the difficult side of the knock-out stages Naomh Conaill are many people's favourite to win three in a row in their historic centenary year. The story of the championship so far though is not to read too much into recent results. Both sides played what was in front of them and both efficiently strode to victory. It's all set for an intriguing final.

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OFFICIAL GAA PLAYING RULES CHANGES 2021

DENYING A GOAL SCORING OPPORTUNITY: HURLING

(Senior Inter-County only)

If any of the following infractions are committed, on an attacking player with a goal-scoring opportunity, either inside the 20-metre line or the semi-circular arc.

- (a) To pull down an opponent or
- (b) To trip an opponent with hands, arm, leg, foot, or hurley or
- (c) To use the hurley in a careless manner

the following penalties shall apply -

- (i) A penalty puck shall be awarded to the team affected.
- (ii) Additional to being issued a caution (yellow card), the offender shall be sent to the sin bin for 10 minutes.

Exception: If the infraction is a second cautionable infraction, the offender shall be ordered off for the remainder of the game, including extra-time when played.



TEMPORARY SUBSTITUTION:

A player who sustains a suspected head injury, if instructed by the referee, shall temporarily leave the field of play for further assessment before the player's fitness to return is determined.



ADVANTAGE RULE FOOTBALL & HURLING

When an aggressive foul is committed, the referee may allow the play to continue if he considers that this presents the potential of a goal-scoring opportunity or another advantage to the team offended by creating or capitalising on time and space.

He shall signal that advantage by raising an arm upright and shall allow the advantage to run by maintaining his arm in the upright position for up to five seconds after the foul or for less time if it becomes clear that no advantage has accrued.

If he deems no advantage to have accrued, he may subsequently award a free for the foul from where it occurred, except as provided under exceptions (v) and (vi) of Rule 2.2.

He shall apply any relevant disciplinary action.



INTERFERING WITH A KICK/PUCK OUT

It's now a foul to interfere with a goalkeeper by jumping up and down, waving hands or hurley, or any other physical or verbal interference considered by the referee to be aimed at distracting the player taking the kick/puck out.



MISCONDUCT AT GAMES BY TEAM OFFICIALS

(Inter-County only)

The following changes were made to the rules around misconduct at games by team officials and the introduction of the issuing of yellow & red cards and match suspensions in place of term suspensions for several infractions.

Yellow cards can now be issued to team officials for the following infractions.

- To make an unauthorised incursion onto the field of play.
- To challenge the authority of a referee, umpire, linesman or sideline official.
- To threaten or to use abusive or provocative language or gestures to an opposing player or team official.
- To threaten or to use abusive or provocative language or gestures to a player of own team.

Red cards can now be issued to team officials for the following infractions.

- To use abusive language to a referee, umpire, linesman or sideline official.
- To engage in disruptive conduct.
- Any type of physical interference with an opposing player or team official.
- To interfere with the playing of the game.
- Minor physical interference with (e.g. laying a hand on, pushing, pulling or jostling), threatening or abusive conduct towards, or threatening language to, a referee, umpire, linesman or sideline official.
- Any type of assault on a referee, umpire, linesman or sideline official.

The Boys are Back in Town

Winning championship titles has always been second nature to the St Eunans club over the past two decades, however having not appeared in a county final since 2015, and with a team reliant on youth and vigour, the class of 2021 are ready to write a new chapter in their clubs' extraordinary history.

For so long, St Eunans had been the undisputed kingpins of Donegal football, having appeared in twelve county finals in fifteen seasons between 1999 and 2015. However, for the past six years, the Cathedral men had to settle for being the ones looking on from the bleachers, as untold success and purposeful strides have been made elsewhere throughout the county, with Naomh Conaill, who aim to capture their third county title in-a-row, in what would be a fitting tribute in their club's 100th year.

Meanwhile, the Letterkenny men having been working swiftly in the background on recapturing their glory days that was spurred on by a golden generation of players, and in doing so ushered in one of their finest ever players in Rory Kavanagh to guide what is now a new St Eunans' team to the most sought-after prize in Donegal football.

"It's about giving new blood the chance to experience the big day. I have had good experience of it as a player, having played in eleven county finals, so I built a fairly good base there and now it's about sharing that with the players, by encouraging them and making them aware that there is still unfinished business to do," said the St Eunans boss.

Kavanagh made no bold promises when taking over the managerial role from Richard Thornton earlier this year. In wondering where the time has gone, Kavanagh has admitted that it has been a strange but exciting transition from player to gaffer. "There's a mixture of emotions. For me it's a new experience as a manager. It's exciting. I'm going from just worrying about myself, to worrying about thirty other lads. But for the minute we're happy where we're at. We have young players and they're hungry, and for me that's key, so it's not surprising the position that we're in. I got a sense last season that the desire was there to go a couple of steps further and be successful like we have been at underage, so hopefully we can produce it on Sunday."

Kavanagh's side were wounded early at the hands of Kilcar in the opening round, with the Towney men coming from five points down



at half-time to defeat Eunans by two points, while also keeping the Letterkenny men scoreless for twenty-two minutes in the second half.

However, St Eunans quickly recovered from this minor setback to produce comfortable victories over, Termon, Aodh Ruadh, Realt na Mara, a fourteen-man St Nauls team in the quarter-final, and a fourteen-man St Michaels in the semi-final, reaching their 28th ever county final in doing so. However, a huge bulk of the talk surrounding Eunans has been on their naivety and inability to play for a full sixty-minute match, which Kavanagh disagrees with. "I wouldn't agree fully with what's been said about us. Yes, we have sometimes been inconsistent in matches, but we had to absorb some injuries along the way as well. There's a number of factors we look at when accessing performances. Against St Michaels in the semi-final, the conditions were dreadful, and we were playing against a strong wind, and even in that we were still level at half-time. So, you have to look at that side too."

Kavanagh is fully aware that his side, are huge underdogs coming up against a gallant and experienced Naomh Conaill team in their fifth final in succession, who also had to do battle with both Gaoth Dobhair and Kilcar in the knockout stages. "A final's a final, it doesn't bother us. At the end of the day, it's fifteen on fifteen. You always got a real sense of purpose from Naomh Conaill, especially now more than ever. That's why they're there. They have a serious cohesion and understanding of each other's role. They're so impressive to look at, so we know we'll have to be at our very best to beat them."

Both St Eunans and Naomh Conaill are very alike in the way they've come here, with many doubting both teams' earlier performances in the championship, on top of a serious transition in both teams from the players of yesteryear to youth, and finally alongside the stewardship of two young managers in Kavanagh and Martin Regan, each of whom know all too well what it's like to lift the Dr Maguire Cup. Regardless of championship format debates, Covid-19, or official club objections, some things never change, as once more 30 men from St Eunans, and Naomh Conaill will march behind the band on county final day for the fifth time in history, and there is no doubt in anyone's mind that it is going to be a ferocious spectacle.

Fo-cumainn Naomh Conaill-A Brief History

Founded in 1921 the club has served the Glenties, Fintown and Edeninfagh areas very well since then. The club caters for underage from nursery right up to U-18, U21 and seniors. There is also a very active Ladies branch covering underage and adult teams.

In the early days it was the senior players who were mostly catered for. While teams did contest County Finals in the 1920's, 1930's and 1940's no trophies were ever won. It would be 1965 that we saw another team reach a senior final again only to lose out in a replay to a very good St Joseph's (Bundoran/Ballyshannon) team. Indeed, having won the Junior Championship the previous year hopes were high in this senior final, but it was not to be. In the following years there was some success at the under-age and Intermediate levels, but it would be forty years before we reached another senior final. In 2005 a very young side reached the final against St Eunan's and after a replay the Dr Maguire Cup came to the Parish for the first time. At this time a string of U21 teams came to the fore, playing in 8 consecutive finals between 2006 and 2013 winning five in all.

We reached a senior final in 2009 but lost out to St Eunan's. In 2010 we regained the Dr Maguire Cup at the expense of Na Cella Beaga and went to the final of the Ulster Club Championship only to go down to a powerful Crossmaglen team. We lost out in the 2012 final to St Eunan's but when we renewed acquaintance in the 2015 final the Boys in Blue came out on top. That year too we won the Comortas Peile na Gaeltachta Naisiunta for the first time when it was played in Ardara and we retained the title in 2016 when the final was played in Co. Corcaigh.

We were back in the Senior Championship final again in 2017 with St Eunan's. This time out they revenged for the 2015 defeat. We qualified for the final once again in 2018 with Gaoth Dobhair as opposition. The last time these sides met at this stage of the competition was in 1941 when the Maghergallan men were victorious. That trend was to be continued and Gaoth Dobhair went on to win Ulster and then advanced to the final of the All-Ireland Club Championship only to be beaten by Corofin.

With Gaoth Dobhair as the defending Donegal and Ulster champions, we were to lock horns with them again in the 2019 Co Final. After an exciting trilogy of games, it took the 2nd replay

to separate the sides and on a memorable Wednesday night 30th October we emerged as Co-Champions. In the Ulster club Championship, we beat Castlerahan (Cavan) in the quarter final and Clontibret (Monaghan) in the semi. However, a slick Kilcoo outfit defeated us in the final in Omagh and the Seamus Mc Ferran Cup went east to the Mourne County.

Onwards to 2020 and we were back in the senior county final by virtue of a one-point victory over St Eunans in the semi-final on 13th Sept 2020!

Due to the Covid-19 pandemic, the 2020 final v Kilcar was not played until 14th August 2021. The game ended all square after extra time and was decided on penalties where we emerged victorious, thus securing back-to-back county titles (2019 & 2020).

2021 is of course the centenary year of our club, on 29th August 1921, men of vision formed our great club at the inaugural meeting in the Market Hall, Glenties and it was fitting that 100 years later, 29th August 2021, the chairman of CLG Dhun na nGall, Mick McGrath was present in our home pitch, Davy Brennan Memorial Park to present us with the 2021 Division 1 and Division 1B (Reserve) League Cups.

During our centenary year we also won the Senior 'C' Championship for the first time in the club's history.

In the group stages of the '21 senior championship we had victories over Glenfin, Termon and Glenswilly and drew with Aodh Ruadh, Ballyshannon. We defeated Gaoth Dobhair and Kilcar in the quarter and semi finals respectively and so we find ourselves in the co final again against old adversaries, St Eunans!

It would indeed be a fitting end to a successful centenary year if we could win three in a row county senior titles!

The fact that we are here again today competing for the premier GAA trophy in the county is testimony to the hard work and commitment of those who have been involved at both adult and underage level in the club. Indeed, the club has competed in and enjoyed numerous successes at all underage competitions down through the decades and we owe a great deal to those who look after and coach our underage teams to such a high standard.

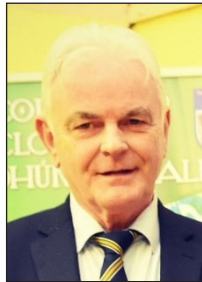

Naomh Conaill focused ahead of Eunans' Test

THERE are few teams in the entire country who know county final day quite like this Naomh Conaill side. If you include the trilogy of deciders against Gaoth Dobhair in 2019, this is their eighth final in six years.

There may be a few nerves, but the players will have a well-established routine at this stage and nothing will disrupt their plans too much today. It says a huge amount about Martin Regan's team and the coaching they have received that they are able to come back year after year and reach the big stage.

There have been some disappointing days but in recent years, time after time, they have found a way to come out on top when it really matters. That being said, there were some whispers that perhaps their powers were on the wane as they stuttered past Glenfin in their championship opener and then drew with Aodh Ruadh.

They backed that up with wins over Termon and Glenswilly, but their championship really came alive in the quarter-final with Gaoth Dobhair. Regan's men showed their intent with a terrific 1-10 to 0-8 victory. Naomh Conaill backed that up the following week by beating Kilcar by three points in the semi-final. They have already taken out two of the big-hitters in the competition and will now be eyeing up St Eunan's to complete the hat-trick.

It has been well documented that Naomh Conaill have a strong panel but they have needed it this year. Eoghan McGettigan did his cruciate during the summer and the county panellist is a huge loss.

They have had three months to get their heads around his absence, but Ciaran Brennan and Kieran Gallagher have picked up injuries during this championship, while AJ Gallagher only returned for the semi-final with Kilcar. Gallagher has been Naomh Conaill's regular full-back but Jason



Campbell has deputised superbly in his absence. Ultan Doherty and Kevin McGettigan are tight-marking defenders, while veteran Anthony Thompson still brings huge know-how and craft to the backline. 'Transition players' were all the rage as Tyrone won the All-Ireland earlier this year, and Naomh Conaill have plenty of players who fit into that category.

The likes of Eunan and Odhran Doherty, Jeaic Mac Ceallbhuí and Ethan O'Donnell are just as comfortable in defence as in attack and they can be devastating on the counter attack. Ciaran Thompson is undoubtedly their star man and he regularly produces the goods when his side needs him. Leo McLoone is battling as hard as ever and he won't shy away from winning the dirty ball, while at full-forward, Charlie McGuinness is leading the line superbly. McGuinness brings huge workrate, but crucially he also knows where the posts are, while there are plenty of options off the bench if need be.

Naomh Conaill won't lack for motivation when the ball is thrown in today. They are going for three successive titles, while a win would also open the door back into Ulster where they might have a point to prove after losing the provincial decider in 2019. However, Naomh Conaill haven't enjoyed the success they have had by getting side-tracked at the crucial moment.

They appreciate that a big challenge awaits from St Eunan's, and that they will have to deliver a top class display to win. Regan said: "It's a county final. I don't think either ourselves or Eunan's will be thinking about Ulster at this stage.

"We have a huge battle ahead of us.

"The three in-a-row would be gret and it sounds brilliant and all that but all our focus is on getting a performance and seeing where that takes us."

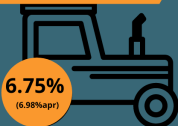
